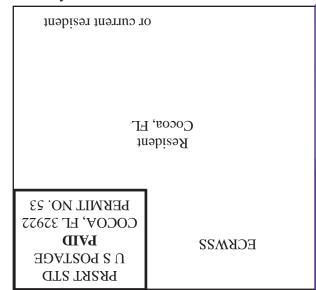

In a January story by Jim Sanders for the News Service of Florida, Florida Power & Light is delaying a \$1.3 billion Cost Recovery Plan until it studies the Tax Overhaul Plan passed recently by Congress and signed by President Trump. They still state they are going to file the Cost Recovery Plan, but want to get more accurate data. According to FPL Spokesman Dave McDermitt in the article, they will have more accurate data by the end of January, so no one should expect an extra charge in their March bill.

Back on October 26, Sun-Sentinel's Contact reporter Marcia Heroux Pounds wrote an article titled, "FPL will seek \$4 to \$5.50 monthly surcharges to recoup Hurricane Irma costs." That article stated, "Florida Public Counsel J.R. Kelly, who represents the state's consumers, said he would likely contest an Irma storm surcharge as high as \$5.50 a month. But he said FPL is within its rights to proceed with a \$4 surcharge for 12 months."

That isn't the only cost FPL is springing on its customers. A December 12 article in Miami-Herald by Jim Sanders for the News Service of Florida, titled, "FPL gets OK to charge customers for cleaning saltwater plume at Turkey Point," said the Florida Public Service Commission approved FPL to collect at least \$176.4 million from customers. The article stated residential customers using 1,000 kilowatts of electricity will

be paying \$1.59 environmental costs for 2018, down from \$2.44 from 2017. It doesn't go into how much less we would be paying without the \$176 million plus the customers are being stuck for payment.

On December 19th, Representative Thad Altman had lunch with representatives from Preserve Brevard, Floridians Against Fracking, Space Coast Chapter of Sierra Club, Space Coast Progressive Alliance, Indian River Lagoon Coalition and myself representing League of Women Voters of the Space Coast. It was a pleasant lunch, which Representative Thad Altman appeared to enjoy.

I read the League's priorities on Natural Resources:



Question: The Florida Water and Land Conservation Amendment of 2014 passed with 75% of voters, but has never been adequately funded. Would you support legislation to mandate that land acquisition have the largest share of funds from the Land Acquisition Trust Fund?

Representative Altman gave a definite yes on co-sponsoring House Legislation, and stated his top priority is funding for both Amendment 1 Land and Conservation Florida Forever.

Representative Thad Altman stated he needs help with a massive public relations campaign to advocate funding Amendment 1. He asks to include letter writing, attending court hearings, collecting a million signatures and making a million calls.

LWV Florida supports full funding of the Florida Forever land acquisition program and proper implementation of the Water and Legacy Conservation Amendment adopted in 2014.

Question: Would you support a statewide ban on fracking, and if not, how do you propose we safeguard our water and natural environment?

Representative Altman gave a definite yes. HB 237 is the House Bill against Fracking & Sen-

ate Bill 462 is its companion Bill in the Florida Senate.

2018 House Bill 237: Advanced Well Stimulation Treatment (Fracking)

Summary: Advanced Well Stimulation Treatment: Prohibits performance of advanced well stimulation treatments; provides that permits for drilling or operating wells do not authorize performance of advanced well treatments; provides applicability. Effective date: upon becoming a law.

HB 237 is assigned to the Agriculture & Natural Resources Appropriation Subcommittee. Representative Altman will speak to Representative Ben Albritton who chairs the committee about the committee hearing the bill.

HB 237 is assigned to the Natural Resources & Public Lands Subcommittee. Representative Altman serves on this committee and will work with the chair, Representative Holly Raschein, to get the bill heard.

LWV Florida supports the band of advanced well stimulation treatment (fracking) including, but not limited to, hydraulic fracturing matrix acidizing.

This was a very interesting and productive meeting. A meeting with seven people representing 7 groups saved a lot of office time. I think our strength was in our unity between the different groups attending with one definite purpose.

White Plague killing Florida's Coral Reefs

A December 9, 2017 story was on Associated Post's website, (no author noted), titled, "Mysterious epidemic plagues South Florida's coral reefs." The article stated the disease started during a three year worldwide coral outbreak called bleaching, where warm ocean water caused many corals to expel the algae that gives them color as well as gives them nutrients through photosynthesis. The article states coral can recover from bleaching, but it weakens them and makes them vulnerable to disease. The Australian Great Barrier Reef was hit hard by this problem. Coral reefs provide 25% of all the worlds marine species habitat even though there is a tiny fraction of the ocean made up by coral.

Troubling was the fact, the article states since 2014 south Florida coast north of the Keys has lost 35% of stony coral.

The article quoted David Gilliam, assistant professor of marine and environmental science at the university's Halmos College of Natural Sciences and Oceanography, "Stony corals are what creates the reef," he said. "If you don't have stony corals, you won't have continued reef growth. If the reef isn't growing, it's slowly dissolving. Without growth, the coral will get lost, and that will affect the entire community, from reef fishes down to lobsters."

Insurance Losses Tops \$7 Billion

A January 8, 2018 Gainesville Sun story by Jim Turner said the estimated insurance claims for Hurricane Irma is \$7.2 billion so far, from 877,843 claims. 83% of the claims were residential. I'm sure this will affect insurance rates in the months to come.

The story said the Florida House Select Committee on Hurricane Response and Preparedness is looking at a number of potential housing changes and other hurricane mitigation ideas for the legislature to review during the next legislative session. Among the proposals brought to the committee were evacuation ideas, such as using passenger trains for evacuation, using a cruise ship for people in the Lower Keys, as well as extending the Suncoast Parkway tolls north of Tampa Bay. Besides that, they are looking at setting up petroleum distribution centers and putting utility lines underground. I will let you know when I hear more on what was decided.

Why lawmakers want to throw opportunities away, for our citizens to pay more dues when they can live at home and earn degrees in nursing or applied sciences, I'll never know.

The bills would create a statewide board to oversee community colleges. The Senate bill, sponsored by Sen. Dorothy Hukill, R-Port Orange, would take away local control and give it to a 13-member State Board of Community Colleges, which makes no sense. Sen. Hukill said she's concerned about graduation rates. But with students starting courses in high school, it explains people graduating early, and for those like my husband who was working during the day, it explains why graduating can take longer. Either is no reason to penalize our residents in trying to better themselves. We need to kill this bill that is trying to make it harder for our residents.

A January 9, 2018 Palm Beach Post story by Jeff Ostrowski titled, "The good and bad of

Currently, Florida has a lower unemployment rate than the nation. The article shows a chart from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, where Florida had a 5.8% unemployment, compared to 5.6% in December 2014. Florida now has an unemployment rate of 3.6% compared to a national average of 4.1% in October 2017. Great!

> A second chart from the Bureau of Labor Statistics shows Florida has always had a lower median average income, but concerned Florida median income lags the U.S. In 2010 there was a difference of \$6,000, \$48,510 in Florida and \$54,525 nationally; and now there is a difference of \$8,000: in Florida, \$51,176 and nationally \$59,039 median income.

In a third chart from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, Florida Poverty continues to outpace the nation. In 2010, Florida had a poverty rate of 16.5%, while the nation has a poverty rate of 15.3%. In the latest year of the chart, 2015, Florida had a poverty rate of 15.8%, while the nation had a rate 14.7%. It's good that Florida poverty has gone down, but Florida decreased poverty by 0.7%, while the nation decreased poverty by 0.6%. Nothing to brag about.

Monthly Tax Update

The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act made sweeping tax changes, virtually impacting all taxpayers. For individual taxpayers and their families, changes include a decrease in the tax rates, repeal of the personal exemption, increase in the standard deduction, modification to itemized deductions, and doubling of the child tax credit. Therefore, all taxpayers need to evaluate their tax circumstances and most likely need to file a new updated W-4 for 2018, which is expected to be released sometime in February.

The tax act repeals the personal exemption, which was \$4,050 in 2017 and zero (\$0) for 2018 through 2025. Instead, your standard deduction is nearly doubled. For tax year 2018, the standard deduction is increased to from \$13,000 to \$24,000 for married filing a joint return; \$9,550 to \$18,000 for head-of-household filers; and \$6,500 to \$12,000 for all other individuals. This means families with four or more exemptions will have at least \$4,900 less deduction than before and the lower tax brackets is supposed to offset the loss of deduction. Your analysis will determine if this is true or not.

Also, these standard deduction amounts will be indexed for inflation for tax years beginning after 2018. The additional standard deduction for the elderly and the blind (\$1,300 for married taxpayers, \$1,600 for single taxpayers) is retained.

As for itemized deductions, there are new limits on mortgage debt for purposes of the mortgage interest deduction. Annual itemized deductions for all state and local taxes, including property taxes, is capped at \$10,000. The threshold for medical expense deductions is lowered back to 7.5% of adjusted gross income (AGI) for tax years 2017 and 2018 and casualty losses will only be allowed for losses in federally declared disaster areas.

For a large number of taxpayers, their total itemized deductions will no longer exceed the standard deduction. On a good note, an enhanced child and family tax credit will make up some of the difference for certain families. As a credit, in contrast to a deduction, the enhanced child credit has been highlighted as one of the provisions lowering overall tax liability for middle-class families.

These are just highlights of the changes and impact of the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act. There is much more to discuss than can be covered here, including changes to the education benefits, alternative minimum tax, and the individual mandate, to name a few. Tax reform is further complicated because many of the changes are temporary, generally ending after 2025. You really need to consult with a tax advisor to conduct an analysis to determine the impact this act will have on you.

Next, the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has announced they will not process any 2017 tax returns until January 29, 2018, and the last day to file your taxes is April 17, 2018.

The IRS also expects taxpayers receiving Earned Income Tax Credit or Additional Child Tax Credit to have the refunds available in taxpayer bank accounts or on debit cards starting on Feb. 27, 2018, if they chose direct deposit and there are no other issues with the tax return.

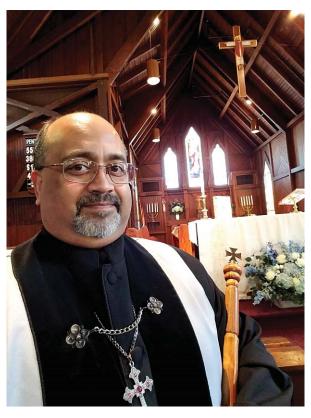

A GOOD NIGHT'S SLEEP IS GOOD FOR YOUR HEART

If you have sleep apnea you may feel as though you sleep through the night; you may feel well and rested, but the truth is your heart will not. Notice that many people think, sleep apnea is not just a sleep problem. Sleep apnea is failure to breathe properly during sleep. This means vital organs don't get the oxygen they need. It is a serious problem, especially for the heart. During sleep, the body should rest. With sleep apnea, the body struggles due to low oxygen levels causing increased stress on the heart.

Lack of Oxygen, Sleep Apnea and the Heart

Because of the lack of oxygen, people with untreated sleep apnea are at a higher risk of developing irregular heartbeats like atrial fibrillation. They also have a higher risk for a stroke and heart attack. In fact, men with untreated sleep apnea have double their risk for a stroke.

A few years ago, I did a sleep study on my father. He stopped breathing 41 times an hour and had two episodes of ventricular tachycardia and a seven second sinus pause. These could have been fatal arrhythmias. As I sat there looking at my monitor, I prayed he did not have any more arrhythmias.

Since the arrhythmias were caused by sleep apnea and lack of oxygen, we started CPAP. Once his oxygen levels came up and we treated his sleep apnea, his heart stayed in a normal rhythm. Unfortunately he was in denial and refused any kind of treatment.

At 53 years of age, one year after his study, my father suffered a heart attack in his sleep and passed away. A person with untreated sleep apnea is three times more likely than the normal population to die of sudden cardiac death between midnight and 6 a.m.

How the Heart Works

Let's think of the way the heart works to understand. The heart has four chambers which make up the right and left sides of the heart. Think of these two sides of the heart as two pumps—the left side of the heart or "body pump" and the right side of the heart or "lung pump."

The lung pump sends blood from the heart to the lungs to get oxygen. After the lungs oxygenate the blood, it is sent to the body pump. Then, the body pump sends this oxygenated blood to the body.

With sleep apnea, the process to receive oxygenated blood does not happen properly. None of the organs, including the heart, receive the oxygen needed. This puts stress on the heart, causing it to have to work harder. It's comparable to a person attempting a marathon with no training or conditioning; very dangerous.

This is the reason there is a higher risk of heart failure with sleep apnea. Usually it's left ventricular heart failure in patients with sleep apnea. Remember, your left side of your heart is your body pump. The body pump works extra hard to move poorly oxygenated blood all the way to the brain and the toes. Since the body pump does not have the oxygen it needs, it has to work even harder. As a result, the heart becomes enlarged and tired and eventually fails.

Men have a 58 percent increased risk of developing heart failure from untreated sleep apnea.

Because the heart has to pump so much harder, blood pressure increases. Medication may help to control high blood pressure, but really it's just a Band-Aid. Patients with sleep apnea run as high as an 85 percent risk of having blood pressure that is hard to control. A lot of times sleep apnea is the cause of high b.ood pressure.

A lack of oxygen to the heart, like a lack of oil to an engine, causes things to misfire and work improperly. The pumps of the heart work from an electrical system. If the electrical system is not getting the fuel it needs, it will begin to fail and have misfires or frayed signals.

Atrial Fibrillation, Sleep Apnea and CPAP

Atrial fibrillation is one of the most irregular heart beats. Atrial fibrillation is a quivering of the atrium, or a bunch of misfires from the top part of your heart. With atrial fibrillation, the b.ood cannot fully leave the top part of the heart; therefore it can clot in the heart. Eventually those clots may move. They could move to the brain, heart or another part of the body.

It's critical to treat atrial fibrillation as soon as possible. By simply treating sleep apnea with CPAP we can decrease the risk of developing atrial fibrillation by 70 percent! No medication can do what CPAP can. This shows there is a direct correlation between atrial fibrillation and untreated sleep apnea.

The words "sleep apnea" are under-valued. Sleep apnea not only impacts sleep, it damages the heart. If you have sleep apnea you may feel as though you sleep through the night; you may feel well and rested, but the truth is your heart will not.

SIGNS YOU MAY HAVE SLEEP APNEA

- Difficulty in falling asleep or staying asleep
- Falling asleep when inactive, during mundane activities (reading or watching TV)
- Heavy snoring combined with gasping or grunting noises during sleep
- Waking up tired, even after a full night's sleep
- Waking up with a headache
- Irritability and short temper
- Feeling very sleepy, perpetually tired, or falling asleep at inappropriate times (during meetings, while reading or watching TV)
- Use of medication or alcohol to fall asleep
- Awakening several times a night from your sleep
- Problems with concentration or memory
- Vivid dreaming at sleep onset

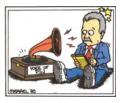

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Heart Attack Symptoms in Women

Heart attacks occur when the flow of blood to the heart is blocked by a buildup of plaque in coronary arteries. The initial cause is often due to certain risk factors, like being a heavy smoker, living a high-stress lifestyle, or being excessively overweight. But others can also be at high risk for heart attack, especially if there is a family history of it.

Q: What are the common symptoms of heart attack?

A: They are:

• Uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain in the center of your chest that lasts more than a few minutes, or goes away and comes back.

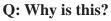

• discomfort.

Other signs such as breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness.

Q: What are symptoms women might have more often than men?

A: Women are more likely to experience shortness of breath, nausea/vomiting, and back or jaw pain.



A: Women may have more subtle symptoms than the obvious crushing chest pain most often associated with heart attacks. That's because they tend to have blockages not only in their main arteries, but also in the smaller arteries that supply blood to the heart — a condition called small vessel heart disease or microvascular disease.

Q: What should someone do if they experience any of these heart attack symptoms?

A: It's easy to tell yourself that it can't be happening to you, but that just wastes time. If you or a loved one seems to be having any heart attack signs or symptoms, you should:

• Call for help immediately. Dial 9-1-1! Make Pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the sure to follow the operator's instructions so you will get help right away.

Shortness of breath, with or without chest • Try to stay as calm as possible and take deep, slow breaths while you wait for the emergency responders.

> • Do not drive yourself, or have someone else care team, Brave Hearts, has set a fundraising drive you to the hospital unless you have absolutely no other choice.

> Q: What happens to my heart over time if I to raise awareness and funds to save lives from don't go to the hospital when I might be experiencing signs or symptoms of a heart attack?



A: Many women show up in emergency rooms after much heart damage has already occurred, because their symptoms are not those typically associated with a heart attack. Your heart and arteries will be damaged over time if you do not go to the hospital, and you may have many more problems as you age. Even if your symptoms are not "bad," you should be checked out — it is better to be safe than sorry. The Emergency Department staff will determine whether it is a heart attack or something that is not life threatening, like heartburn.

A cell phone is a convenience, and while we do want to be able to check in with our kids, parents' texting with their children constantly during the school day is ridiculous.

They don't need 24/7 access to gaming. Too many kids are falling asleep on their school books because of 2 a.m. video or online game playing.

They don't need to keep up with the latest fashion trends. School clothes should be clean,

Strategically ripped jeans for sixty dollars or two hundred dollars for sneakers is just not necessary.

They don't need to be entertained every waking minute. It's okay to be quiet and thoughtful. It's okay to daydream and learn to like oneself. It is essential to learn how not to be bored with only an imagination, or perhaps with only a good book for company.

Mistake number 2 is believing that love means trusting without question. We can absolutely trust our children to be children, young human beings. That means that they will mess up, break the rules, bend the truth a bit, and make bad decisions on occasion, just like all human beings. We need to ask all kinds of questions: Where were you? What is your homework tonight? Who will you be with? What is his mother's phone number so I can make sure that she will be supervising? Do ask questions, and check to make sure that the answers you are getting are accurate.

Mistake number 3 is believing that love means doing everything for your children. This ceases to be true the moment a toddler can pick up toys and drop them into a toy box. Children need responsibilities to learn how important and satisfying it is to fulfill them. They need to learn how to keep themselves and their environment clean, they need to learn how to fix a meal, wash their own clothes, speak with the doctor or with the auto mechanic or with their teachers. If children are not permitted to communicate with adults or advocate for themselves, they become adults who lack those important skills.

Mistake number 4 is believing that love means making excuses for your children. Children must learn to own their own behavior. They may indeed be extra tired, mildly stressed, somewhat sad, or a bit unwell. None of these entitles one to treat others carelessly or to abdicate all responsibilities. People might want to stop the earth from turning once in a while and take a little break, but that is not how real life works. We don't develop fortitude and perseverance without practice, and good manners can't be suspended whenever we are "having a bad day."

As parents, imperfect human beings ourselves, we are bound to make mistakes. I say that the mistakes we make from loving too much are the easiest to forgive.

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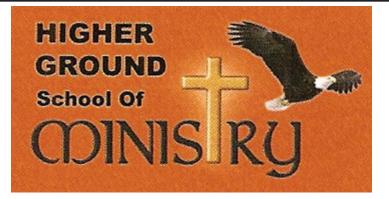
