Most women know it's hard to get a man to see a doctor. In fact, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, men are half as likely as women to go to the doctor. How often a man should go for a preventive checkup depends a lot on age and health. Here are some simple guidelines.

→ MEN AGES 18 TO 39 should have their blood pressure checked every two years. If it reaches a certain threshold, it should be checked yearly.

→ EVERY 3 YEARS

Men ages 45 and older should be screened for diabetes every three years. If they are overweight, the screening should start at a younger age.

→ EVERY 5 YEARS

Brevard County Fire Rescue Offers Hurricane Tips

Brevard County Fire Rescue reminds residents that Monday, June 1st was the official start to the hurricane season. Hurricane season runs from June 1 through November 30. BCFR offers the following safety tips to ensure that your family is prepared before a hurricane strikes, during the storm and in the aftermath of the event.

Before a storm:

Understand how hurricanes can affect where you live and work, and how the weather could impact you and your family.

Develop an emergency plan and practice how and where you will evacuate if instructed by local emergency management officials.

Create and maintain a disaster supply kit complete with enough water, non-perishable food and medications to last several days.

Learn how to properly secure your home against hurricanes. If your home is equipped with hurricane shutters, ensure that they are in proper working order before a storm threatens to strike.



Monitor local weath-NOAA Weather Radio.

During a storm:

Stay inside your home away from windows and glass doors. Find a safe

a closet or bathroom on a lower level.

electricity at the main breaker.

If your home loses power, turn off major appliances such as the air conditioner and water heater to reduce damage.

Do not go outside. Weather conditions can change rapidly with lightning, wind and a multitude of other hazards exist.

After a storm:

Remain indoors until an official "all clear" is given.

Do not touch fallen or low-hanging wires of any kind under any circumstances. Call police or utility companies immediately to report hazards such as downed power lines, broken water ter.org/family/ and create your own family dior gas mains and overturned gas tanks.

Once power is restored, ensure refrigerated er forecasts and obtain a food has not spoiled. Spoiled food is the cause of much sickness two days to a week after the storm.

Do not operate charcoal grills, propane camping stoves or generators indoors for any reason. This includes inside garages, screened area inside your home such as an interior room, enclosures, or near open doors and/or windows.

When it is safe to do so, remove hurricane If flooding threatens your home, turn off shutters from windows and doors. These should not be left in place for any reason. Doing so may prevent early detection of the presence of a fire, hinder firefighting efforts or prevent your family from escaping the home in the event of a fire.

I don't care much for the mainstream famous coffee venues, since I think most of their coffee is overpriced and way too bitter to drink it black. In fact, I believe a good blend of coffee is one that can be enjoyed straight black; not too strong but smooth, and not bitter.

Well, I believe I found the perfect cup of coffee and it's right here in our neighborhood. the sheriff's station on Fay Blvd. And it's open of these again any day. I also ordered an iced daily from 6 am to noon.

It's a cozy place, with all kinds of seating. They have regular tables, tall tables, even a few couches. I'd describe the décor as sorta' upscale/hipster. The whole layout is designed to make you feel comfortable and to just hang out and enjoy that good cup of coffee.

Like I mentioned earlier, I can appreciate a good cup of black coffee. Port St. Java has it and it's called the "Old Bahama" Medium roast. It's flavorful and smooth, and unlike some places that charge over \$4.00 for a cup, this 12oz. cup is only \$1.50. To go with my coffee, I ordered a sausage and egg bagel, which was cooked to order and very tasty.

Instead of me writing about my daughter's meal, I'm going to let her describe it in her own words:

Hurricane Sales Tax Holiday

Need to replace the batteries used during last year's storm season? Discover a generator would have come in handy after Hurricane Irma knocked out power throughout much of Brevard? Residents can use the sales tax holiday to replenish their hurricane kits this storm season.

During the annual sales tax holiday, June 1-7 the state will waive the sales tax on many items needed during hurricane season.

Exempted items include: flashlights under \$20; radios under \$50; waterproof sheeting under \$50; ground anchor system under \$50; gas tank under \$25; batteries under \$30; coolers under \$30; portable generators under \$750; and reusable ice under \$10.

At seven days, the sales tax holiday is more

than twice as long as it was last year. The extension was intended to give people more time to stock up on supplies after a very active 2017 storm season.

Still, it's not nearly as long as Gov. Rick Scott proposed and many lawmakers had hoped. In the wake of the February mass shooting at a Parkland high school, lawmakers made school security a priority, and money initially earmarked for tax cuts instead helped pay for proposals to harden schools. State Rep. Paul Renner, R-Palm Coast, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, said the size of the tax cuts had to be reduced to respond to the shootings. Lawmakers ultimately settled on a one-week sales tax holiday for hurricane provisions that Scott signed into law on March 26.

That law also included a sales tax holiday on school supplies Aug. 3-5.






Protect Yourself from the Life Threatening Condition Called Sepsis

Monthly Tax Update

The tax cuts President Trump signed at the end of 2017 is expected to boost the economy through creating jobs and spurring growth. However, there are some changes you should be aware of resulting in fewer taxpayers itemizing their deductions. The major reason is the standard deduction for single filers is now \$12,000 and married filing joint filers is \$24,000. However, there are also a few more other major reasons contributing to this.


First, far fewer taxpayers will be able to deduct all of their state and local taxes. The new limit is allowing only \$10,000 of deductible state and local taxes.

Second, far fewer people will be permitted to deduct their mortgage interest. The tax cuts lowered the amount of deductible mortgage debt on a new loan from \$1 million to \$750,000. Beware, there could be unintended consequences. It is possible these changes in the deductibility of mortgage interest could affect home values. This may occur since some borrowers accept the higher interest paid resulting in a larger refund. This, in effect, offsets the actual interest paid on the home and this will not be there anymore.

Third, the deduction for personal casualty and theft losses is repealed for the tax years 2018 through 2025, except for those losses attributable to a federal disaster in areas as declared by the President (generally, this is meant to allow some relief for victims of Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria, and future devastating hurricanes, tornados, etc.).

Fourth, miscellaneous deductions exceeding 2% of your adjusted gross income is eliminated for the tax years 2018 through 2025. This in-

cludes deductions for unreimbursed employee expenses, tax preparation, investment expenses and continuing education (not deductible elsewhere). To be more clear, it includes expenses that you incur in your job that you're not reimbursed for, like tools and supplies, required uniforms not suitable for ordinary wear, dues and subscriptions, and job search expenses. It also includes unreimbursed travel and mileage, as well as the home office deduction.

This eliminates only the unreimbursed employee expenses and only affects taxpayers who claim an employee-related deduction on Schedule A. It does not change any business owner expenses, typically filed on a Schedule C. These changes will result in less taxpayers filing Schedule A, since the higher standard deduction will be the better option. Oh, don't forget the personal exemption/dependent deduction has been repealed. So, there isn't any reason to decide as to whether you'll claim a child, grandchild, etc. versus someone else. The decisions will be dealing directly with earned income credit, child tax credit or dependent care.

Next, month, I'll do a brief on business changes involving 100% depreciation, 20% income deduction for corporations, and other interesting tax cuts.

Signs and Symptoms You Shouldn't Ignore

See your doctor if you have any of these...

Both signs and symptoms are signals that something isn't right with the body. It could mean injury, illness or disease.

More specifically, a sign is a signal that can be seen by someone else, such as a fever or irregular breathing. A symptom is a signal that's felt by the person who has it, such as weakness, aching or feeling short of breath. Cancer can cause almost any sign or symptom. According to the American Cancer Society, the signs and symptoms will depend

on where the cancer is, how big it is, and how much it affects the organs or tissues. If a cancer has spread, signs or symptoms may appear in different parts of the body.

When cancer is found early, when it is small and hasn't spread, treatment works best. Often this means a better chance for a cure, especially if the cancer can be removed with surgery.

Here are some general signs and symptoms of cancer you shouldn't ignore:

Unexplained Weight Loss

Most people with cancer will lose weight at some point. An unexplained weight loss of 10 pounds or more may be the first sign of cancer. This happens most often with cancers of the pancreas, stomach, esophagus (swallowing tube), or lung.

Fever

Fever is very common with cancer, but it more often happens after cancer has spread from where it started. Almost all people with cancer will have fever at some time, especially if the cancer affects the immune system.

Fatigue

Fatigue is extreme tiredness that doesn't get better with rest. It may be an important symptom as cancer grows. But it may happen early in some cancers, like leukemia.

Pain

Pain may be an early symptom with some cancers like bone cancers or testicular cancer.

A headache that does not go away or get better with treatment may be a symptom of a brain tumor. Back pain can be a symptom of cancer of the colon, rectum, or ovary.

Skin Changes

Along with skin cancers, some other cancers can cause skin changes that can be seen. These signs and symptoms include:

- Darker looking skin
- Yellowish skin and eyes
- Reddened skin
- Itching
- Excessive hair growth

A Thickening of the Skin or a Lump

Many cancers can be felt through the skin. Any lump that is new—whether in your neck, stomach, breast or somewhere else—needs to be examined. It's important to be familiar with your body.

Change in a Wart or Mole

Any wart, mole, or freckle that changes color, size, or shape, or that loses its sharp border

should be seen by a doctor right away. About 1 million Americans develop skin cancer each year, making it the most common form of cancer in the U.S., according to the National Cancer Institute.

Unusual Bleeding

Anytime you have unexplained bleeding, see your doctor right away. Coughing up blood could mean lung cancer, frequent nosebleeds could signal leukemia, and blood in the stool might be a sign of colon cancer.

The signs and symptoms listed above are the more common ones seen with cancer, but there are many others. It's most important that you pay attention to your body. Take note of any changes in the way you feel and the way your body works. If something just doesn't feel right, or you experience symptoms that last for a long time or gets worse—see your doctor.

On the one hand, if it has nothing to do with cancer, the doctor can find out more about what's going on and, if needed, treat it. On the other hand, if it is cancer, you'll give yourself the chance to have it treated early, when treatment works best.

THE POWER OF SCREENINGS

Being in tune with your body and keeping your doctor apprised of changes are important. "Sometimes, people experience symptoms unrelated to cancer," says Cecil Robertson, MD, Hematology/Oncology, Parrish Cancer Center. Dr. Robertson stresses that cancer can be present without symptoms. "Be proactive in managing your health. Follow recommended guidelines for screenings and other early-detection methods."

"Think of the days before mammograms," he continues. "During that time, early detection was when a woman found a lump during a self-exam. Today, cancer is caught much earlier with mammography. However, the self-exams are still necessary."

Marsha Richardson, Parrish Healthcare director of Oncology Services agrees. "Early detection for cancer allows for earlier treatment which increases chances of survival."

Early detection is key in cancer care. If you catch it soon enough, most of the time cancer can be treated or cured. Today, it's more of a chronic illness that you can live with. It's a factor in your life, not your whole life.

Unincorporated Brevard Fertilizer Restrictions Take Effect June 1

The deadline to apply fertilizer to lawns is fast approaching. Unincorporated Brevard County and many municipalities ban the application of fertilizer containing nitrogen and phosphorus from June 1 to Sept. 30. Also, most ordinances specify that no phosphorus can be applied unless a soil test indicates a phosphorus deficiency.

To determine if a fertilizer contains phosphorus, simply look for the three numbers on the fertilizer label. If the middle number is zero, the fertilizer contains no phosphorus. The first number is always nitrogen, and the last number is always potassium. For example, a fertilizer labeled 0-0-27 contains no nitrogen or phosphorus.

Many ordinances also require that fertilizers contain at least 50 percent slow-release nitrogen.


