Ode to Volunteers



A friend of mine is a member of the Turtle Coast Sierra Club based in Brevard and a regular Some of the original volunteers are still part volunteer at the Tosohatchee Wildlife Management Area. He met with the Tosohatchee WMA manager on the morning of 12/13/2018. From what he heard, the construction of Brightline from Orlando to Cocoa is heating up. The Tosohatchee WMA Manager was contacted by a Brightline contractor about the possibility of placing a temporary construction office at the Lake Charley recreation site. Lake Charlie is a short distance down Fish Hole Road from the SR 528 bridge over Fish Hole Road. The contractor was told that no such facility could be in the Tosohatchee WMA, but staff suggested the contractor contact property owners along Yates Rd. at the south Tosohatchee WMA boundary.

Brightline will not impact Tosohatchee WMA



as it is within the SR 528 right of way. Brightline will be given temporary construction vehicle access on a Tosohatchee WMA service road that parallels the boundary fence. In return for this access, Brightline will install culverts on this service road at Mud - Lake Canal. An old wooden bridge at this location was condemned and demolished over 25 years ago. Installing the culverts will again allow staff and public vehicle access to the eastern most lake that is south of SR 528. Brightline will construct a wildlife underpass at a new location. This underpass will not be functional until SR528 is widened and the underpass extended across the entire SR528 right of way.

Trouble in Paradise

1000 Friends of Florida is a statewide nonprofit organization founded in 1986 to better the future of Florida by increasing our residents' quality of life through building a vibrant environment, creating sustainable communities and protecting our vanishing natural resources. The group's website is http://www.1000friendsofflorida.org. The Natural Resource Committee met in Novem-

ber and the topic was 1000 Friends of Florida's Special Reports.

Nathan Pryor Reed, who recently died, spearheaded the 1000 Friends of Florida Special Report, 'Trouble in Paradise.' "The first sentence of the introduction states Florida's environment provides both the foundation for this state's quality of life and the cornerstone of its economy.

"As noted in the introduction, Trouble in Paradise '...is the work product of deeply concerned members of the Florida environmental community who wish to help elected officials and candidates for office better understand six major statewide environmental issues impacting Florida's natural resources and our residents' quality of life." The six-major statewide environmental issues:

1. Conserving natural lands: Florida was a national leader for land conservation programs. With the Environmentally Endangered Lands program in 1972, the Conservation and Recreational Lands (CARL) program in 1979, in 1990 the Preservation 2000 Act was passed, and in 1999, the Florida Forever Act was passed. The legislature suspended funding in 2008, and in

2014 voters approved the Water and Land Conservation Amendment to the Florida Constitution. Unfortunately, the legislature has been trying to avoid its proper implementation. Fortunately, Florida residents understand the importance of land conservation as it protects our clean drinking water, allows for flood control, protects wildlife habitat, allows for recreation opportunities and protects our state's economic health.

2. Safeguarding water supply: The 1972 Florida Water Resources Act created five Regional Water Management Districts. The core mission areas of the Water Districts are to address regional water supply, water quality, flood protection/floodplain management and natural resource systems. Unfortunately, funding has been cut to the Water Districts significantly and the board (appointed by the Governor) has been influenced by politics instead of being based on protection of the water supplies. The report stresses that since clean water is such a finite resource, Florida's waters must be much better managed to ensure there is a fair balance between the needs of people, maintaining the environment and protecting agriculture needs.



3. Promoting water conservation: A 2016 Study named "Florida 2070 / Water 2070," shows Florida will have 15 million new residents by 2017, more than doubling our water needs. We must reduce our water usage by such ways as less water irrigation, and reduce other household usage such as bathing, laundry and dishwashing. Floridians waste a lot of water, and as stated before, this is a finite resource.

4. Protecting and restoring water quality: Floridians expect safe, clean water to drink, swim, fish and for our environment. At least 2,100 Florida water bodies are deemed impaired and there are even more that are contaminated. Nutrients from fertilizer, manure, septic tanks, and landscaping is endangering our water resources. We continually have outbreaks of algae bloom and red tide posing danger to our health, and causing fish kills, death of wildlife, threatening our drinking water and many other harmful effects.

5. Managing growth: We have 1,000 new residents per day, which accounts for the same as adding a city the size of Tampa every year. The report states "Promoting compact, walkable, mixed-use development in appropriate locations



reduces the pressure to sprawl out into farmland, rural communities and natural lands." This, along with land conservation and accounting for sea level rise due to climate change, will help us towards a better future.

6. Addressing climate change and community resilience: We know as Florida is mostly a low-lying area, we need to think about Climate Change, and proactively protect our communities. We don't know how the impacts of climate change will affect our natural systems, but we do know we have fewer freezes, our aquifers have increased salinity, and our corals are bleaching due to warmer oceans and acidification.

The report has a lot of recommendations to fix these problems using down to earth solutions. We need to ensure every candidate, whether state or federal, are aware of these major issues and are willing to work through the recommendations for each issue's resolutions. If they are not, our future and quality of life will pay dearly.

A 5-star rating is considered excellent. Medicare updates these ratings each fall for the following year.

CarePlus is rated an overall 5 out of 5 stars for 2019 by Medicare. Some of the measurements Medicare considers when determining star ratings are:

• Chronic condition rating: Were you able to get the screenings, tests and vaccines you need to help stay healthy? If you have a long-term condition like diabetes, did you get help from the plan to manage it?

• Part D rating: Were you prescribed drugs safely and in a way clinically recommended for your condition?

• Member experience rating: How satisfied are you with your plan? Did you have a positive experience when you called customer service?

Monthly Tax Update

Wow!!! You're in for a real surprise with the new Form 1040. The Form 1040, as we have known it for years and years, is no longer. Recent legislation has reduced it to a two page "postcard size" document to simplify the tax filing process. The form is now reduced from the current form with 79 lines to 24 lines and now includes six new schedules to report adjustments to income, taxes, tax credits and other pertinent information. In addition, we still have the normal schedules, A through F, which are unchanged, except for changes implemented by the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act.

You will also find forms 1040EZ and 1040A are also replaced with the new postcard size Form 1040. This new form is estimated to permit 30% of the taxpayers to use this form without any additional schedules. About 35% will only need one additional schedule and the remaining 35% will require several schedules or forms to complete the tax filing requirements.

Okay, here's a few side notes for you to generate some thoughts: alimony is no longer deductible for any divorce or separation agreements executed after December 31, 2018, and at the same time, the recipients of the payments do not have to claim it as income; there is a newly created \$500 nonrefundable (this means if you're not subject to any tax liability it won't create one) tax credit for dependent(s) who are 17 or older you're supporting (this could be for your dependent child, adult or relative); there is now a Qualified Business Income Deduction reducing your taxable income; the standard deduction for a married couple is \$24,000 and a single taxpayer is \$12,000. The personal exemption deduction

has been repealed; unreimbursed employee expenses are no longer deductible on Schedule A; a bonus depreciation is now available for businesses when they purchase new or preowned equipment; business meals and entertainment costs are primarily not deductible.

Next, let's talk about who prepares your taxes. Did you know, anyone can be a paid tax return preparer as long as they have an IRS Preparer Tax Identification Number (PTIN). However, these PTIN preparers have differing levels of skills, education and expertise. Also, they may prepare your tax return, but they can't represent you in audit or any inquiry by IRS unless they prepared the return. You may pay more for an Enrolled Agent, CPA, or an attorney, but it's worth it in the long run. Their continuing education requirements can be invaluable. 
Social Security Phone Scams

The Acting Inspector General of Social Security, Gale Stallworth Stone, is urging citizens to remain vigilant of telephone impersonation schemes that exploit the Social Security Administration's (SSA) reputation and authority.

The Office of the Inspector General (OIG) continues to receive reports from across the country about fraudulent phone calls from people claiming to be from SSA. Recent reports have indicated that unknown callers are using increasingly threatening language in these calls. The callers state, due to improper or illegal activity with a citizen's Social Security number (SSN) or account, a citizen will be arrested or face other legal action if they fail to call a provided phone number to address the issue. This is a scam; citizens should not engage with these calls or provide any personal information.

The Acting Inspector General urges citizens to be extremely cautious, and to avoid providing information such as your SSN or bank account numbers to unknown persons over the phone or internet unless you are certain of who is receiving it. If you receive a suspicious call from someone alleging to be from SSA, you should report that information to the OIG at 1-800-269-0271 or online at https://oig.ssa.gov/report.



Only call the fire department if you see visible flames for brush fires. Never call 911 when requesting information. It is ONLY for EMERGENCIES.

This is a very important meeting because it is the election of officers for the following year.
