

July 6th -Thunder Over the Indian River is Back!

Thunder Over the Indian River is back at last and will be held on Saturday, July 6th at the OUC Canaveral plant, corner of Kings Hwy. and US1, again this year. The gates will open at 2:00 pm with music and fun events, starting with Third Generation followed by Mid Life Crisis.

Entertainment continues with the Patriotic Pooch Parade, a Thunder Over the Indian River first. Participating pooches will be judged on the following: Patriotism, cuteness, creativity and overall effect (Wow factor!). If you'd like to enter your pet in the PPP, sign up at Brigdawg's at 6239 US-1, Port St John, during business hours or call (321) 432-2952. Check in time starts at 3:30. Your pet must be current on shots.

This year's event will have a full day with food and cold drinks avail-

able to purchase, and a terrific slate of games, live entertainment, demonstrations and music leading up to the fireworks show at dark (usually about 9:30). Weather conditions may cause the fireworks to be a little early to avoid rain.

No fireworks or alcohol are allowed on the plant property. You are encouraged to bring blankets or lawn chairs to sit on, insect repellent and sun block. It's Florida in July!

The gate to the compound where all the shows, demonstrations and food will be is on Kings Hwy., right across from Capron Rd. (Port St. John Auto Repair is on the corner) and you'll make an immediate right turn toward the river to get through the second gate. We'll have people inside to help you park in an order that will help fit many cars and make it much easier to exit after the fireworks show. We will have some spaces designated for handicap parking, but the entire compound is unpaved. Plan accordingly. And those spaces tend to fill up early with spectators who come early to see the entertainment.

New At the Beach

An inspiring concept of community toysharing boxes at the beach is taking off on Florida's Space Coast, all thanks to a young Eagle Scout hopeful! This simple but genius idea was initiated by a Brevard County Life Scout, Pierson Mauldin, 13, who used his Eagle Scout project to create a solution for one major beachgoing dilemma: no toys! For anyone who has ever lugged bulky toys to and from the beach, or who has come from out of town sans toys in tow- Mauldin's community toy boxes are THE economical and earth friendly solution.

Senate Bill 1278: Biosolids Management introduced by Senator Mayfield would have required the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) to establish a real-time water quality monitoring program concerning lands used for spreading "biosolids" and prohibited land application of biosolids on certain sites. This bill and its sister bill House Bill 405 introduced by Representatives Byrd and Stevenson both died on May 5, 2019.

The House had already showed its cards that it really wasn't interested as the HB 405 had already been modified by a House Committee from banning bio-solids from being spread in the upper St. Johns to just making requirements for spreading biosolids being specified statewide. That was before anyone decided to let it die without bothering more about the issue.

There was a good reason for the biosolid

bills. According to a November 18, 2018 article in Florida Trends by Jason Garcia titled, "Biosolids: Waste to fertilizer to - pollution?", ten years ago biosolids were found to be the cause of Lake Okeechobee's algae problem. When the Legislature stopped permits in that area, the problem only moved north. The upper St. Johns River basin counties (Indian River, Osceola and Brevard Counties) being spread with biosolids increased significantly. DEP approved spreading over 70,000 tons of class B biosolids just in 2016, and these three counties accounted for 75% of the total of all the class B biosolids approved statewide.

Besides the legislature ignoring the problem, there's a new health problem that may be caused by allowing human excrement to be spread across our state as fertilizer. According to an April 17th Treasure Coast story by Tyler Treadway titled, "Hepatitis A outbreak: Is there a link to biosolids that farms spread to fertilize fields?", there could be a link between the two.

In the story, Florida Dept. of Environmental Protection spokeswoman Dee Ann Miller states DEP isn't aware of any connection between biosolids and the number of Hepatitis A in Florida.

"I think there's plenty of data to support a theory that there could be a connection," said Edith "Edie" Widder, founder and lead scientist at the Ocean Research and Conservation Association in Fort Pierce. "I think it's important that people be aware that there's a potential link, anyway."

A story in Planet Natural by E. Vinje titled, "Is your Compost Made of Sewage Sludge?" tells you exactly the danger of what politically everyone now calls "Biosolids" instead of "crap" or "S**t". The article states, "Truth is, 'biosolids' is a marketing term, a euphemism for sewage sludge. Sewage sludge is what remains of everything flushed down the sewers — human and animal feces, industrial chemicals, medical waste, oil products, pesticides, home cleaners — after the water is removed."

Sewage is big business and convincing you that using "Biosolids" is a good thing and blaming septic tanks for all the bad things for terrible water quality keeps government expansion of sewers moving where they want us to go. But the Planet Natural article tells us: "What's wrong with using compost made from sewage in your garden? After all, it's been treated and tested, right? Guess again. Allowing sewage to "cure"





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for a period of time does not remove its toxins. Heavy metals, including lead and mercury, as well as such industrial compounds as flame retardants persist, even concentrate, during the cure (some biosolids are treated to remove a small number of heavy metals). Compost may be heattreated to kill some pathogens. But heat treating doesn't kill them all. And how do you know the compost was treated in the first place?"

Florida Department of Environmental Protection says we have nothing to fear from sewage sludge. But DEP follows the Federal Environmental Protection Agency, and that agency is increasingly criticized for not thinking of protecting the American people.

Diouhy, titled, "EPA Watchdog Questions Safety of Sewage Used as Fertilizer," stated, "According to the probe, the risks of at least 352 pollutants found in biosolids haven't been fully assessed by the EPA. And at least 61 of them have already been deemed hazardous by another federal agency or program."

Why would agencies that are supposed to protect us do the opposite? Florida Phoenix's 06/12/19 article by Alison White titled "For-

mer EPA bosses – 3 dating back to Reagan and Bush – say the agency is deeply troubled under Trump," shows these former agency heads are concerned where the agency is going, being run by former oil and coal lobbyists. According to the article, "The former EPA chiefs — who led the agency under Presidents Reagan, George H.W. Bush, George W. Bush and Obama — all raised concerns about the Trump EPA. They warned that EPA officials are abandoning the agency's mission, ignoring science, pushing out career employees and silencing information about climate change." Later it also said, "This week, the former EPA administrators called on Congress to assert its oversight authority and try to return An 11/15/18 Bloomberg article by Jennifer EPA to its mission to protect public health and the environment."

> With politics the way they are today, how do we trust those who are supposed to protect us? I say we don't. Protecting our water, air and environment around us should be a right we are not willing to give up. Why should we give up our health for the profits of industries? Why should we allow our government to bow to those shortened length of our life?

On June 11, 2019, the Titusville City Council approved having 162 homes on 71.76 acres located approximately 1,500 feet east of U.S. Highway 1 on the north side of Jay Jay Road. Why does this matter to you? This development is only 0.4 miles from the Indian River Lagoon (IRL). The increased runoff from this development has to flow east into the lagoon.

Back in the early 1980's, each county and same people for our diminished quality of life or city had to set up a comprehensive plan to show cont., next page

how many homes could be built in their area of control. From agricultural lands that had zoning of one home per acre or more, down to how many dwellings per acre for apartment buildings based on how high they wanted their buildings, such as setbacks for public areas, how close to allow buildings to be to each other, etc. All of this showed how many roads and other infrastructure we needed for all areas of the county or cites. Even if we did not increase density on what was in the comprehensive plan at the time, the IRL would probably be in trouble, but as areas add the number of homes that can be built (increased density), it adds more pressure on the lagoon.

Under our previous Governor Scott, all this preplanning was considered overkill and developers gave large sums of money to the get the right people elected, and now the primary purpose is to have the most homes to pay for new roads, new sewer systems, law enforcement, fire departments, etc.

The trouble is, for every pro, there is a con, and if we increase homes, it is bad for the lagoon, and cleaning the lagoon becomes harder and harder, especially if we keep pushing more

Any time any city or county increases density at one location, they should decide how it will decrease density somewhere else. The bottom line is you, as a taxpayer, are having to subsidize development not only with your property taxes, but even the self-imposed cleanup of the Indian River Lagoon, and we shouldn't put up with it!

On a similar note, Florida House Bill 7103 is trying to make it easier for developers and harder for us as taxpayers to fight increased densities. The 1000 Friends of Florida, www.1000friendsofflorida.org/veto-hb-7103/, states "House Bill 7103 was passed on the 60th day of the session amid a crush of last-minute legislating. One day before, HB 7103 was amended on the Senate floor with a provision that would gut the ability of Floridians to challenge decisions on growth in their communities." The following also is on the referenced website.

"Supporters of the amendment to HB 7103 said it would deter frivolous lawsuits. But Florida law already gives judges the discretion to order challengers to pay legal fees when they file nuisance challenges to development decisions. This thoughtful, case-by-case approach from judges

makes sense. The amendment's sweeping change in law does not.

Because of this amendment HB 7103 would

Because of this amendment, HB 7103 would make local governments unaccountable for their land use decisions. That outcome would be disastrous for landowners, developers and any other citizens who care about planning in their communities. It would mark the death knell for growth management in Florida, even as the state's population is projected to grow by more than 12 million people over the next half century. The timing couldn't be much worse."



Fact: The more development we have in floodplains and wetlands increases the odds that someone will get flooded; maybe not the



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
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development itself, but the displaced water must go somewhere. Heavy rain with high winds and hurricanes will be getting more intense with the ocean temperature rising.

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

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Monthly Tax Update

Last month I discussed the circumstances involving inherited retirement accounts. This month I'm going to discuss the circumstances involving inherited real property, mutual funds, individual stocks and bonds, outside of any retirement plan.

When one of our loved ones pass away and they have these investments, the beneficiaries will receive the "stepped-up basis" for each type of investment. "Stepped-up basis" is defined as the fair market value of the investment on the day of passing. This stepped-up basis is the value the beneficiary will use to determine if there is a capital gain or loss upon disposing of the investment.

Okay, easy, right, and it actually is. Take for example, if you inherit 100 shares of Ford stock and on the day your loved one passed away, they were worth \$10.00 per share, your basis would be \$1,000 (100 times \$10.00). Then, a month later you decided to dispose/sell, the shares at \$12.50 a share, you would have a long-term capital gain of \$2.50 per share, or a total long-term capital gain of \$250.00 (\$12.50 times 100 equaling \$1,250 minus the \$1,000 basis).

This same concept is applied to any other investment or asset of the estate and it is always long-term capital gain tax treated, since the trans-

fer of the investment or asset was due to death. Therefore, it is important for the Personal Representative/Successor Trustee of the estate to obtain some type of documentation on the value of the investment or asset on the day of passing. Real estate would have a comparative market analysis (CMA) or an appraisal completed. Stocks, bonds and mutual funds would be the closing day value. Collectibles would have a non-related, expert evaluation statement.

Here's another example with real estate. If you inherit the real estate and you know the stepped-up basis, then any additional major improvements or major repairs will be added to the stepped-up basis to arrive at your new adjusted basis. The new adjusted basis will then be subtracted from the selling price, along with the closing cost to arrive at your capital gain or loss.

Here's another scenario involving a married couple. If the married couple owns a piece of real estate and one of them passes away, then the new adjusted basis is determined by the following: take the stepped-up basis, divided by two, plus their original basis, divided by two, and add the two results to arrive at the surviving spouses' new adjusted basis. And this goes for jointly owned stocks, bonds, mutual funds and any other investment or asset.

Another reason for obtaining the stepped basis deals with determining the Estate's inventory. The inventory of the Estate is a requirement imposed on the Successor Trustee/Personal Representative for probate or accounting to the beneficiaries. So, it's in your best interest to obtain the appropriate documentation as soon as possible following the passing of your loved one.



Jess Parrish Medical Foundation, in partner-ship with Hannah's Heroes, Inc. awarded \$5,500 in scholarships to three outstanding North Brevard graduating high school seniors who are pursuing studies in the field of mental health care. "This scholarship honors Hannah and offers the opportunity to deserving students to further their educational dreams in mental health care and start the conversation with future generations," said Lyn Cline.

Initial funding for the scholarship was made possible by the Pilot Club of Titusville. Proceeds from the club's Pretty Woman Goes to Italy fashion show supported Hannah's Heroes and their mission of helping youth mental health in Brevard County.



Space

Firefly Aerospace confirmed plans to launch Alpha and Beta rockets from Launch Complex 20 at Cape Canaveral Air Force Station. Firefly will manufacture rockets at their 150,000 square foot facility at Kennedy Space Center's Exploration Park. These rockets will be designed to lift small satellites, and more than 200 new jobs will be created.

Blue Origin's New Glenn rocket won the fifth satellite launch contract. Canadian satellite operator Telesat announced a deal for multiple launches aboard Blue Origin's New Glenn, which will stand 313 feet tall with the first launch from Cape Canaveral in 2021. On March 22, 2019 Blue Origin announced plans to expand and create a "South Campus." The construction of the new facility will provide for the manufacture and provisioning of commercial space launch vehicles.

Environment - Lagoon:

The Indian River Lagoon Citizen Oversight Committee recommended a plan update that included 23 new projects proposed by the community and reprioritized wastewater, septic and muck removal projects. The 2019 Update includes a \$30 million increase for human waste related projects and a \$27 million increase for storm water projects. Funding for muck removal is reduced from two thirds to approximately half of the available funds while projects that treat human wastewater are increased by more than \$30 million.

Baffle box projects were recently completed at Isaac Campbell Park and US1 at Ojibway Avenue. Other baffle boxes under construction include La Paloma Lane, US1, State Road 405, and Wagner Avenue. These projects will reduce the amount of nitrogen and phosphorus that enter the lagoon by thousands of pounds each year.

Natural Resources is continuing efforts to remove abandoned boats in our waterways. Grant money received from the Florida Inland Navigation District will help supplement the Counties' derelict vessel removal fund. In the future the hope is to determine an effective way to stop boat owners from neglecting their responsibility to dispose of unusable vessels correctly.

Our lagoon restoration has a way to go but it is making progress. Kayakers, fisherman and residents who use the river frequently are reporting clearer water, seagrass coming back and the return of fish. Another indicator of Lagoon health is the horseshoe crabs spawning on the southside of the Titusville Causeway.
