The PSJ Boat Ramp Is Open

The Port St. John Boat Ramp located at 6650 North U.S. 1, has officially reopened, and ahead of schedule. The ramp closed due to safety concerns after receiving substantial damage from Hurricane Irma in 2017 and was targeted to reopen on Wednesday, May 8.

Repairs to the boat ramp started with the removal of pre-existing structures including the concrete sidewalk, docks, piles and


broken asphalt. New construction consisted of three new wooden fixed docks, a new concrete pedestrian ramp, 100' sea wall, 60' new aluminum sheet pile bulkhead to replace a



portion of the existing wooden bulkhead, fill placement and grading, installation of native plants (cod grass), new concrete sidewalk, replacement of damaged parking stalls, resealing of existing asphalt parking lot, and the application of pavement striping.

The Port St. John Boat Ramp provides access for watching wildlife, fishing and viewing launches along the Indian River.

Completion of the Port St. John Boat Ramp marks the 11th of 20 hurricane-related park repairs/rebuilds underway as part of a \$12 million hurricane recovery effort.

According to a May 14, 2019 story in the South Florida Sun Sentinel by Marcia Heroux Pounds, titled, "You're not going to get a break from FPL after all," FPL can keep \$772 million in tax breaks instead of lowering our monthly power bills.

could use the money to offset the \$1.1 Billion cost that led to a 2017 law banning dumping coal ash on island landfills.

> I'm assuming at least one of those cargo ships bringing up to 2,708 train cars full of coal ash will be coming through Port Canaveral, as our port is one of the closest to the JED facility. Double-lined facilities like the JED site are considered safe for coal ash and the JED facility has always accepted coal ash since it was opened in 2004. However, it's not just the design of the facility we need to worry about, but industrial or transportation accidents that could impact the environment, either at the port receiving the coal ash or along the roads until it is accepted at the JED Solid Waste Facility.

According to a March 13 article in "The Na-Thanks to an Osceola County landfill agree- tion" by Michelle Chen, titled, "Confronting Puerto Rico's Coal-Ash Crisis," coal currently makes up 17% of Puerto Rico's electricity generated by AES Corporation, but that seems to be about to change. Puerto Rico's government is now considering making 100% renewable energy by 2050. A tall order, but if achieved, they would at least not be shipping coal ash to Florida.

Brevard County Climate Change Impacts

With the upcoming hurricane season, and all the squirrelly weather going on, there's a lot of talk about climate change. I was wondering how Brevard County would fare against other areas, and hadn't realized Brevard County has been thinking about the consequences all along.

In July 2017, the Space Coast Transportation Planning Organization (SCTPO) partnered with the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council (ECFRPC) on a Sea Level Rise Vulnerability Assessment for our county. The assessment used a Sea Level Planning Tool created by the University of Florida GeoPlan Center and the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT). They assessed how roads and other public service facilities would fare for sea level



rise inundation (flooding) on three projections during the years 2040, 2070, and 2100. The report was presented to the SCTPO Governing Board in February, 2018. The county was trying to figure out "transportation resiliency" (how fast can we bounce back after a disaster), the projections for different heights of water at different year points, with high being the only one closely aligned with United States Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) models.

The report is fairly technical and very interesting. It shows you how many miles of road and which government facilities are vulnerable to sea level rise, and for that matter, what lands are low and subject to flooding. I was surprised how little land is subject to flooding on the mainland.

The link shows National Geographic believes there is overwhelming evidence climate change is happening in their article, "Is global warming real?" It shows why this shouldn't be a political battle, and how we, as humans, are causing it. If anyone doesn't think the insurance companies are adjusting their risk models, you would be wrong. How much more you are going to be paying will depend on your where you live, the distance from

Medical Reminders to Help You Prepare For A Hurricane

June marks the beginning of hurricane season. Make sure your family's hurricane emergency plan covers medical needs.

Make sure that you have a 30-day supply of necessary medications.

Make your medication plan now. This plan should include speaking with a health insurance representative, pharmacist or your physician about options to acquire extra medications. You may need to pay cash for a 30-day supply. Many insurance companies will not authorize the filling of additional days' or months' worth of a medication unless ordered by the state to do so in emergency situations, such as natural disasters. Now is the time to understand your insurance company's natural disaster guidelines.

Call your dialysis center for a temporary plan of care.

If you are on dialysis, call your center to make a plan of action for your care. Try not to miss a treatment prior to bad weather and make sure to follow your doctor-ordered diet very closely. Your physician will provide you with information to assist you and phone numbers to the End Stage Renal Disease Network. Your doctor can recommend if it is medically safe for you to miss treatments and can advise you on whether or not you should be admitted to a hospital during a hurricane.

You may be eligible for care at a special-

needs shelter based on your medical needs and shelter availability. If you are an oxygen-dependent person, be sure to fill your oxygen tanks. You should have a two-day supply.

Think about shelter arrangements before the storms come so you can avoid the last-minute rush. It is vital for everyone to know where the closest shelter is located. County shelters are designated throughout the county and are mostly located in elementary schools. Visit brevardcounty.us/emergencymanagement/preparedness/shelters to find the shelters in your area.

It is my pleasure to give a 'Tip-O-The Hat' to Dads everywhere.

This is partially in response to a short member of my ever repopulating clan's inquiry as to how someone can become a dad. So since he is old enough to read, I thought perhaps I can feed two birds with one peanut.

Well Sweetie, when a man and a woman fall in love with each other, they get married and they love each other so much that they want to have a baby, so...

Whoa! Wait! That's how a Father is made not a Dad... (Wouldn't you have loved to see the newspaper editor's face when he read the above line? I'm sorry, Randy) It has been my observation that male parents have evolved mightily over the past few generations.

In my Grandfather's day, (they rode horses, not dinosaurs), I think the male parents were actually surprised when that smelly, noisy mound of life his wife and sometimes nanny kept in the room upstairs began to walk to the dinner table. Of course when the child did something wonderful it was HIS son, even if he had to ask mom to remind him of the name she bestowed on it.

My father's day brought the male parent who at least knew when mom went to the hospital and would show up with cigars to pass out and smoke in the room. Horses abounded, but cars have invaded the roads now. While the exhausted mom smilingly did her best to not pass out from pain and only wanted to grab a few Z's before the baby woke up again, he would invite everyone he ever met into the room to light a stogie and swig from the bottle being passed about. Diapers, feeding, bathing, late nights, fevers... not in their field of knowledge, much less expertise.

The representative of my kid's male parents' generation, (think hot rods with flames on the fenders, rolled up jeans and T-shirt sleeves), drove me to the hospital in the vehicle that replaced the one with the flames, paced the waiting room floor and rushed into the room – sans tobacco – the moment the nurse allowed. He sat holding the baby until the nurse ran him out, then went home to sleep for the whole next day. My kids' female parent did not have that luxury. This only happened with the first child... subsequent dad carry and deliver, I will remove said hat!

baby feedings were shared, even in the hospital. He could handle certain diaper changes, try to soothe a hungry baby while the bottle was warming, if illness should strike he could 'help' with temperature taking – but neither he nor I wanted to trust his shaky hands at bath time, at least until the child could sit up and hang on in self-defense. But as was the norm in this time period, most of the responsibilities fell squarely on dear old mom's shoulders, as did most of the household duties. Stopping at the store on his way home from work for a gallon of milk and occasional 'baby-sitting' was accepted as mostly the extent of male duties.

I thank the Big Guy for all the male parents in my family these days. My son, sons-in-law and grandsons-in-law are awesome! Each one was in the room for their child's big entrance and were the first to hold them. My son was a very hands on parent from birth and now spends hours every week setting up D&D so he can spend an entire afternoon playing with his teenage boys. Even the one who shall remain nameless at this time is parent medal worthy. Picking up the ball and running with it, he picked the baby up from first day at day care, changed the diaper, bathed and dressed baby for bed while making a special dinner to cheer up a new mother after her tearful first day back to work (the minor detail that he totally forgot a two month old child must be fed in the afternoon being one of the very few oops in his fatherhood history). Grandson-in-law can wield everything from late night bottle to disposable diaper as well as the female parent.

In my eyes, the fact that each of these men don't consider what they do to be special at all is what's most wonderful. Each of them feel they should be just as responsible for child care as the child's mothers. Spooning purple mush into a cherub's mouth only to have it come flying back at their favorite t-shirts, playing a round of cornhole toting a tiny person or excusing themselves from the family table to change a lumpy diaper comes naturally to them and most other male parents of this generation.

I believe this is the real difference between merely fatherhood and Dad-hood. As I said, I tip my hat to each and every one of you.

view is on Victorio's in Mims. I normally try to stay in the neighborhood when doing reviews, but this place has some really good eats, especially their wings and oysters. If you've read any of my past reviews, you know I have a thing for wings.

Victorio's is located in Mims, on US1 just north of Dairy Rd., or about a mile south of highway 46, east side of the highway. I haven't eaten at Victorio's since they reopened in their new building. I thought their food was good back when they were in the old building, but it's just as good today as it's ever been. I remember back in the early 80's when the place was Kelly's BBQ, I don't know if there is a relation, but the food was good way back then as well.

Our work group had a going away party for a co-worker, so we all met at Victorio's. As I walked in, I noticed the wings on a customer's plate and thought, those are nice big wings. Some of my co-workers who frequent Victorio's said the wings are fantastic. So needless to say, I'm ordering wings. They also mentioned that the oysters are another favorite.

I ordered 10 "Jumbo Wings" in medium wet for \$9.99 with a side order of steak fries. The menu also claims their wings are the "Best in Town." I agree these are "Jumbo Wings," they are huge. But I disagree with the "Best in Town." They are probably the best wings in Brevard county. Not only are they huge, but cooked to perfection. They are crispy on the outside, while still being moist and juicy on the inside and the sauce had just the right amount of tanginess and heat for Mediums. I must also mention the steak fries were also cooked to perfection.

Ten wings, fries and a few Coors Lights was the perfect meal for me and I was full. Victorio's also has seafood, burgers, subs, pizza and Italian food since they are basically an Italian restaurant. But most people rave about their wings, oysters and pizza. Maybe next time I'll order some oysters or a pizza, but probably not. I'm really stuck on those wings. I just wish they had Coors Light on tap.

Victorio's is open every day of the week; 11 am to 10 pm on Fridays and Saturdays, and 11 am to 9 pm Sunday through Thursday. I also just found out Victorio's has locations in Oviedo, Apopka and Longwood. I can't say I'll be visiting their other locations, but I will definitely be back to their Mims location.

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Monthly Tax Update

There's an old saying where it is said, there are two things you're going to do in life; pay taxes and die. Well, this month I'm going to discuss the two together.

When someone passes away, their assets and liabilities now become their estate. This is where a Personal Representative is recognized by the probate court to handle your affairs after passing. They are responsible to pay all your debts, lawyers, accountant and court cost associated with dispositioning what you left behind. Once the liabilities have been settled, everyone is paid, according to the will or trust.

The recipients of these assets are receiving inherited property. So, I want to start with discussing traditional Individual Retirement Arrangements (IRA's). IRA's have their own distribution instructions and are not part of the will or trust. These arrangements have different rules for the surviving spouse or the non-spouse beneficiary. The Internal Revenue Code (IRC) provides instructions as distribution rules and how the taxes will be paid. The law takes into consideration the relationship of the beneficiary to the IRA owner and the type of IRA.

taking Required Minimum Distributions (RMD) by December 31st after the year of death of the original IRA account owner. Each year you will have RMDs based on your age and life expectancy and follow the life expectancy table if you choose to take distributions over your life, or your other option is to use the '5-year rule.'

The 5 Year Rule allows you to take distributions over five years, so that all of the assets liquidate from the IRA by the 5th anniversary of the IRA owner's death.

Your other option is to take the RMD over and it is now time to liquidate the final assets your life expectancy and IRS provides a table to follow this option. With both distribution options, the 10% early liquidation penalty from the IRS doesn't apply if you are not 59 ¹/₂ years of age or older.

> If you don't take a distribution, a 50% penalty will be assessed on the undistributed amount and it will be applied by the IRS at tax time. The distribution will be taxed at your tax rate when you file your annual Form 1040 return.

One other item of interest involves transferring the assets from one advisor to another. This may only be accomplished as a custodian to custodian transfer. You are not permitted to take the First, let's cover a non-spouse beneficiary. If distribution and roll it over within sixty (60) days,

you are a non-spouse beneficiary, you must start unless you are the spouse of the decedent, where you may accomplish this once in a calendar year as a spousal rollover.

> Now let's turn our thoughts to a Roth IRA. Roth IRAs have no RMD for the original owner. However, when a Roth IRAs is inherited, RMDs do apply. 

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Brevard Hospitals Get Ranked for Patient Safety

Patients have higher risks of complication or even death depending on the quality of care they receive at hospitals.

A new report card on hospital safety and quality gave multiple Brevard County hospitals C grades or lower, while only three area hospitals got As. The Leapfrog Hospital Safety Grade Report is compiled by the non-profit Leapfrog Group, a watchdog organization seeking to foster positive change in U.S. health care, according to its website.

While Brevard hospitals received overall mediocre grades from Leapfrog, the nonprofit found medical care in general is improving across the nation. Around 160,000 people die each year from avoidable medical errors, a drop from the 205,000 avoidable deaths estimated in 2016, its research shows. Patients at low-rated US hospitals, including Melbourne, face a greater risk of avoidable death.

Hospitals are scored by a panel of doctors from universities across the country using various publicly and privately reported measures of safety. Leapfrog assigns letter grades from A to F to hospitals and claims it is a tougher grader than the federal government, which doesn't issue failing marks. The report cards are based on data provided to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, the American Hospital Association and voluntarily to the nonprofit.

Leapfrog said its spring 2019 report card grade; with 26 percent receiving a B; 36 percent a C; and 6 percent getting a D. Less than 1 percent of all graded hospitals received a failing grade. Here's how Brevard hospitals ranked:



Brevard County Fire Rescue Offers Hurricane Tips

Brevard County Fire Rescue reminds residents that Monday, June 1st was the official start to the hurricane season. Hurricane season runs from June 1 through November 30. BCFR offers the following safety tips to ensure that your family is prepared before a hurricane strikes, during the storm and in the aftermath of the event.

Before a storm:

Understand how hurricanes can affect where you live and work, and how the weather could impact you and your family.

Develop an emergency plan and practice how and where you will evacuate if instructed by local emergency management officials.

Create and maintain a disaster supply kit is given. complete with enough water, non-perishable food and medications to last several days.

Learn how to properly secure your home against hurricanes. If your home is equipped with hurricane shutters, ensure that they are in proper working order before a storm threatens to strike.

NOAA Weather Radio.

During a storm:

Stay inside your home away from windows and glass doors. Find a safe area inside your home such as an interior room, a closet or bathroom on a lower level.

If your home loses power, turn off major appliances such as the air conditioner and water heater to reduce damage.

Do not go outside. Weather conditions can change rapidly with lightning, wind and a multitude of other hazards exist.

After a storm:

Remain indoors until an official "all clear"

Do not touch fallen or low-hanging wires of any kind under any circumstances. Call police or utility companies immediately to report hazards such as downed power lines, broken water or gas mains and overturned gas tanks.

Once power is restored, ensure refrigerated food has not spoiled. Spoiled food is the cause



Treatment Advances Making Pancreatic Cancer A Less Deadly Disease

Advances in chemotherapy and cancer monitoring can dramatically extend the lives of almost one-third of pancreatic cancer patients with tumors previously considered inoperable, researchers report. It's good news for patients with a particularly deadly form of cancer that's been highlighted by the recent diagnosis of "Jeopardy!" host Alex Trebek with stage 4 pancreatic cancer.

About 35% of pancreatic cancer patients are diagnosed with tumors that have started to grow outside the pancreas and involve many critical blood vessels surrounding the organ, explained lead researcher Dr. Mark Truty. He is a cancer surgeon at Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN. Those patients have historically been told that their cancer is inoperable, and that they have only another 12 to 18 months left to live, the researchers said.

But new chemotherapy regimens have given these patients a fighting chance when delivered appropriately in conjunction with radiation therapy and surgery, Truty and his colleagues found. Patients who had three specific chemorelated factors in their favor tended to live much longer, the results showed.

The three factors were:

- The amount of chemotherapy each patient received. "The more chemo they got, the longer they lived," Truty said.

- Blood levels of a chemical called CA19-9, which is released by pancreatic cancer cells. Low levels indicated that the chemo had done its job well, rooting out hidden pockets of cancer cells.

- A tumor that, when surgically removed, was found to be all or mostly dead due to chemotherapy. Positron-emission tomography (PET) scans were best at detecting when chemo had worked.

The prognosis for pancreatic cancer tends to be dire because it spreads rapidly, most often to the liver, lungs or abdominal cavity, Truty explained. Only about 15% of patients are diagnosed with tumors that haven't spread beyond the pancreas. However, there's another third of patients whose cancer has spread to blood vessels but no other major organs, and researchers

> The new study followed 194 Mayo Clinic patients over seven years who received chemo followed by radiation and surgery. About half of those patients came to Truty after being told elsewhere their cancer was inoperable. The research team found people were more likely to live longer if they received more cycles of chemotherapy, enough to successfully kill their tumors.

> About 29% of patients had all three factors, and their average survival time has not yet been calculated because more than half are still alive, the study authors said. Another 29% had two of the factors and their median survival was just under five years, the findings showed.

> To tell whether the chemo was killing cancer cells, researchers turned to two tools -- the CA19-9 test and PET scans. CT scans are advanced versions of traditional X-rays, but PET scans are different -- they track the movement of radioactive tracer materials in the body that are drawn to living cells.

"If the PET scan of the tumor turned cold following chemotherapy, even if the CT scan was the same, that highly predicted that when a pathologist looked at the tumor following surgery, that cancer would be completely or mostly dead," Truty said.

This strategy produced impressive results, said Dr. Igor Astsaturov, an associate professor at Fox Chase Cancer Center in Philadelphia. Astsaturov said it was "remarkable" that 94% of the patients in the study had no living cancer cells in the tumors that were surgically removed.

However, this sort of treatment is not available at just any hospital, Astsaturov warned. Cancer doctors should consider using PET scans and the CA19-9 test to determine how well chemo has worked for a patient before proceeding to radiation therapy and surgery, Truty explained. "Right now," he added, "no one uses PET scans in pancreas cancer surgery and insurance providers typically don't cover it, but we found it was the most predictive" of patient survival.

The Social Security Administration (SSA) and its Office of the Inspector General (OIG) launched a joint Public Service Announcement (PSA) campaign addressing a nationwide telephone impersonation scheme. Social Security and the OIG continue to receive reports from across the country about fraudulent phone calls from people falsely claiming to be Social Security employees. Calls can even "spoof" Social Security's national customer service number as the incoming number on the caller ID.

"We urge you to always be cautious and to avoid providing sensitive information such as your Social Security number or bank account information to unknown people over the phone or Internet," said Nancy A. Berryhill, Acting Commissioner of Social Security. "If you receive a call and are not expecting one, you can always get the caller's information, hang up, and contact the official phone number of the business or agency the caller claims to represent. Do not reveal personal data to a stranger who calls you."

Social Security employees do occasionally contact people--generally those who have ongoing business with the agency--by telephone for business purposes. However, Social Security employees will never threaten a person or promise a Social Security benefit approval, or increase, in exchange for information. In those cases, the call is fraudulent and people should not engage with the caller. If a person receives these calls, he or she should report the information to the OIG Fraud Hotline at 1-800-269-0271 or online at https://oig.ssa.gov/report.

"These calls appear to be happening across the country, so we appreciate SSA's partnership in this national public outreach effort," said Gail S. Ennis, the Inspector General for the Social Security Administration. "Our message to the public is simply this: If you or someone you know receives a questionable call claiming to be from SSA or the OIG, just hang up."

Apollo 11 Bronze Memorial

In commemoration of the 50th anniversary of the Apollo 11 mission, Rocket Mortgage by Quicken Loans, the nation's largest mortgage lender, and Kennedy Space Center Visitor Complex today announced a new partnership to create a one-of-a-kind bronze statue honoring the legendary crewmembers of the spaceflight that landed the first two people on the moon. The detailed statue will be the centerpiece of the new Moon Tree Garden at the Apollo/Saturn V Center. The garden includes 12 Moon Trees that were provided by Rosemary Roosa, daughter of veteran Apollo 14 astronaut Stuart Roosa, and president and chief executive officer of the nonprofit Moon Tree Foundation. The foundation was created in honor of Roosa's father, who



took various tree seeds on his space mission. The seeds, which have all orbited the moon, were later germinated and planted around the world to share the story of the mission. Since then, the Moon Tree Foundation continues to fulfill its mission by planting second-generation "Moon Trees" all over the world. The 12 trees in the Moon Tree Garden will represent each crewed Apollo mission to the Moon.

Other changes at the Apollo/Saturn V Center will include dramatic projection mapping set against the side of the majestic Saturn V Moon rocket, the focal point of the experience. The addition of a 1969 period living room and bar will replicate what it was like to watch the Moon landing at home. There will also be updates to the Lunar Module 9 and Touch the Moon exhibits, a new Fisher Space Pen legacy display, and the ability to get a closer look at the Command Service Module-119.

There are a number of events that will take place throughout the summer to mark the Apollo 50th anniversary: the July 15 opening of the reimagined Apollo/Saturn V Center, a July 16 "flashback" celebration at which visitors will be able to view original footage of the lift-off, a July 20 extravaganza to mark the 50th anniversary of the lunar landing and a final welcome home event on July 24 to commemorate the day the Apollo 11 astronauts returned to Earth.

Local Girl Protects U.S. Navy Forces in the Middle East

Petty Officer 3rd Class Alyssa Murphy, a Cocoa native, joined to have a different path in life. Now, two years later and half a world away at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain, Murphy serves as the leading-edge of the Navy the nation needs.

"There are not many people here and we do a lot of work of a higher pay grade, giving us better training opportunities," said Murphy. Murphy, a 2016 graduate of Cocoa High School, is an equipment operator at NSA Bahrain, forwarddeployed to the Arabian Gulf region in the Navy's U.S. 5th Fleet.

"We, as equipment operators, are responsible for the execution of line haul operations, moving weapons, gear and personnel for special warfare and Marine Corps commands at home and those deployed," said Murphy. Murphy credits success in Bahrain, and in the Navy, to many of the lessons learned in Cocoa. "I learned time management growing up," said Murphy.

U.S. 5th Fleet directs naval operations to ensure maritime security and stability in the Central Region, which connects the Mediterranean Sea and Pacific Ocean through the western Indian Ocean. They work with partner nations to ensure freedom of navigation and the free flow of commerce in international waterways. NSA Bahrain enables the forward operations and responsiveness of U.S. 5th Fleet and allied forces in support of Navy Region Europe, Africa and Southwest Asia's mission to provide services to the fleet, warfighter and family.

"We are responsible for moving equipment around to different locations and providing maintenance on the vehicles," said Murphy.

The Navy's U.S. 5th Fleet area of operations encompasses about 2.5 million square miles of ocean, and includes the Arabian Gulf, Gulf of Oman, Red Sea and parts of the Indian Ocean. This expanse, comprised of 20 countries, includes three critical choke points; the Strait of Hormuz, the Suez Canal and the Strait of Bab al Mandeb at the southern tip of Yemen.

Serving in the Navy means Murphy is part of a world that is taking on new importance in America's focus on rebuilding military readiness, strengthening alliances and reforming business practices in support of the National Defense Strategy.

E15 Fuel Warning

Recreational Boaters Urged to Send Message to EPA to Stop the Summertime Sale of E15 Fuel

In an action that many are seeing as antienvironment, anti-consumer and a big nod to the ethanol lobby, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is moving toward permitting the sale of E15 (15% ethanol) fuels during the summer ozone season (June 1 to September 15). E15's summertime ban was implemented years ago to address concerns over its contribution to ground level ozone (smog) on hot days.

The nation's largest boating advocacy, services, and safety group, Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS), offers an easy way contact the EPA by going to http://bit.ly/2UyyMFV.

Boaters have no love for ethanol in their gas because its proven to damage boat engines and fuel systems. If they had their choice of fuel, more than four out of five boat owners (83%) would choose E0 (ethanol-free) fuel – if it was available. Because of the harm it causes, E15 is prohibited by federal law for use in recreational boat en-



gines and voids many marine engine warranties. Most recreational boat-

ers refuel their vessels at roadside gas stations where pump-labeling requirements are minimal. BoatUS believes the risk of misfueling will increase and, with it, instances of expensive repairs to boat engines and fuel systems.

The push for the summertime sale of E15 and adding more ethanol into the nation's fuel supply is a result of the Renewable Fuel Standard (RFS). When it was passed in 2005, RFS assumed that America's use of gasoline would continue to grow. Since then, however, gasoline usage has not increased as forecast, which now forces more ethanol into each gallon of gas.

To keep up with the RFS mandate and avoid hitting a "blend wall" in which the volume of ethanol production exceeds consumption and infrastructure constraints, in 2010 EPA granted a waiver to allow E15 into the marketplace but limited its sales to colder months to protect air quality.
