

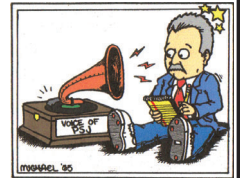

Good Day! by Maureen Rupe
Good Day,

I didn't get to write my "Good Day" last month. I was hospitalized with heart issues. After five days of monitoring, I had surgery to give me a pacemaker. The joke among friends was I had outpaced my heart. So I was resting instead of writing for Happenings. That was worse than the surgery. Thanks to my doctors and nurses at Parrish Medical Center.

I am also on a Community Health Networking Committee at Parrish Medical Center. We had some great presentations from local non-profit groups. One great presentation was from the Mobile Response Team (MRT): 321-213-0315. They are available 7 days a week, 24 hours per day. They serve youth or young adults, 25 and under, but are available to anyone who calls; parent, relative, foster family, school, medical personnel, child and adult protection staff, or law enforcement.

MRT's goals are to avoid the need for emergency departments, or criminal justice, hospitalization, de-escalating crisis situations, stabilizing the family, maintaining children with their fam-

ily, family support and connecting family with resources.

Their pamphlet states the following: "The MRT is designed to address a wide variety of situations to include suicidal and homicidal behaviors, drug and alcohol abuse, disruptive behaviors related to thought, mood and anxiety disorders, individuals displaying hallucination, family/peer conflicts, and escalating behaviors without immediate intervention. The individual is likely to require a higher intensity of services."

They try to respond within 60 minutes, and best of all they do all this for free.

The Women's Center deals with all Domestic and Sexual Violence; 321-607-6809 for Domestic Violence, 321-784-4357 for the Rape Crisis Center. There were 12,000 individuals who called last year and many more are not reported.

Brevard Public Schools gave a presentation on vaping. JUUL are the most popular and can be easily mistaken for an USB Drive. Cartridges contain the nicotine content of 1 pack of cigarettes and kids are using 1 to 3 cartridges per day. As a matter of fact, e-cigarettes or vaping has increased 78% among high school students. Over

2 million teens are currently using vaping devices in the USA. They are sometimes modified to smoke THC or heroin, or sometimes flavored by using dangerous chemicals. For example, caramel flavors contain diacetyl and acetoin. Diacetyl is linked to 'popcorn lung,' an incurable lung disease.

Kids are hiding them in their backpacks. Please get involved with your kids. Vaping nicotine is now the largest jump in substance abuse in over 40 years.

Florida legislatures moving slow on Septic Tanks

I've found two articles, one from Florida Phoenix, and an editorial in Florida Today from the Naples editorial board telling us our legislature is ignoring our septic tank (biosolid) problem in the state. Unfortunately, our Florida legislature seems more worried about raising the percentage to make it harder to bring proposals to change the Florida Constitution by our citizens, as well as preventing ex-felons from gaining back their voting rights. At the same time, they're not addressing issues that impact our Florida Waters.

Florida destroying home rule with an environmental cost

A Senate bill, SB-588 by Sen. Travis Hutson, Augustine, and a matching House bill by our so-called Representative Randy Fine, would prevent cities and counties from banning the use of plastic straws, and would prevent the use of plastic straws until at least after a study is complete in 2024. I assume our representative does not care about the miles and miles of plastics polluting our oceans and getting into our ocean food source.

An Editorial Board Opinion in the Palm Beach Post states Post SB-588 even threatens city or county governments with a \$25,000 fine if they stop the sale of certain sunscreens. Key West was the only city that had banned sunscreens containing oxybenzone and octinoxate. It didn't matter that scientific evidence showed the ingredients

left coral bleached and dying. Senator Hutson said he was for the environment, but local governments shouldn't be telling businesses what to do. I guess it doesn't matter if Key West's economy dies with the coral. Apparently our representative is trying to help destroy home rule.

Florida's Sewer Crisis

Our Brevard County Commission is wanting to start a grant program to assist in helping those close to the lagoon to hook up to sewer. We all have heard horror stories of sewage plant accidents where thousands of gallons or millions of gallons of sewage or grey water is dumped either on the ground or in the lagoon. A story at Jacksonville.com by Daphne Chen of Gatehouse Media titled, "Sewer Crisis in the

state of Florida," shows Brevard sewage spills are just the tip of the iceberg. The whole state has left our infrastructure to fall into disrepair. Data gathered since 2009 shows the state has had 23,000 spills in the last 10 years due to aging pipes and infrastructure; roughly 6 spills per day. 1.6 billion gallons of wastewater have been released into our estuaries or ocean, and of that, at least 220 million gallons was raw sewage. To give you an idea, the story stated, "The systems leaked enough human waste to fill about 2,400 Olympic-size swimming pools." Now how do you feel about swimming in Florida waters?

It's not just broken pipes. It can be a power outage where sewage starts running out into the streets and canals, or a clogged pipe because people dump fats and wipes down the sewers and clog up the system. The story went on: Utility officials recognize the problem, but say their hands are tied. They're trying to extend the life of sewers with patchwork repairs. That's because it could require hundreds of billions of dollars to bring the state's older infrastructure up to modern standards, experts estimate.

Bill Riebe, Utilities Director for the city of Sarasota said, "It boils down to money. The pipe is all underground, so it's out of sight, out of mind. Nobody bothers with utilities until they don't work." The story also stated, "Human wastewater contains hazardous hydrogen sulfide, created by the human body during food digestion and responsible for the odor from decay. Hydrogen sulfide can be highly corrosive, eating away at sewer pipes over time. Depending on when a municipality was developed, many of these sewers are now flirting with their 75-year lifespan."

Apparently, this is a national problem, not just in Florida. Believe it or not, according to the story, "The nation's wastewater infrastructure was rated as a D+ on a report card from the American Society of Civil Engineers. Florida was given a C."

Florida has hundreds of miles of pipes and many miles of old clay pipes nearing that 75-year lifespan. Brevard County might be trying to put a band-aid on a problem that has been overlooked for a very long time. Our representatives are asking for an extra \$50 - \$100 million to help

our \$300 million, but if our neighbors don't do the same, there won't be a safe place to swim or boat anywhere in the state.

On a separate, but important note, I received a presentation by Gary Roderick, an environmental consultant who did an April, 2019 study on "A Topic for Concern Related to Florida Surface Waters Hepatitis A and Possible Correlation to Biosolids." His study was based on Florida's Department of Health website at www.floridahealth.gov on hepatitis A. His study seems to show a correlation between biosolid dump sites like those in the rear of Port St. John and the amount of hepatitis cases in the surrounding areas. It showed the 265 hepatitis A cases reported in Central Florida had the highest hepatitis A activity level, where since 97% of cases were likely acquired locally in Florida.

Cell Phone Charging

It's true most of us leave our cell phone charger plugged into the wall even when we're not using it. The good news is that while the charger does use a tiny bit of power when left plugged into the outlet, it's only about 23 cents a year for

an FPL residential customer.

This small amount of energy use is called "phantom energy." Power adapters, like cell phone chargers, aren't the only items that use a little bit of energy when they're plugged in. In fact, many electronic items are in "standby" mode when turned off, helping them turn on faster or respond to a remote control. Devices with lit digital displays use power too, albeit a very small amount. You can avoid this by unplugging unused items until needed or using power strips to cut power to multiple items with one switch.

Cell phones use very little electricity even when you are actively charging them. The annual cost of charging your phone eight hours a night is just 65 cents if the phone is off while charging or \$1.30 per year if it's switched on. Not bad for a convenience most of us can't live without.

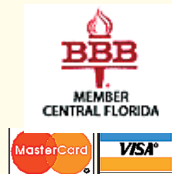

We have some pretty good restaurants in Port St. John. You can get some good fried chicken from Dogs 'R Us or Publix, you can get a delicious burger from Kelsey's or Jabbers, a great pizza from either Troy's or Luna Blu, a steak from Beef 'O Brady's or seafood from Old Florida Grill & Oyster House. I've always said we need a Mexican restaurant in PSJ. Well, we sort of do now.

It's the new place on Fay Blvd. beside the tracks called Souza's. It's not entirely Mexican cuisine. They actually consider themselves to be Latin American cuisine and advertised as, "A taste of South America."

My wife and I have eaten at Souza's twice now and both times we have been extremely satisfied with what we ordered. I think the prices are reasonable and the portions are just right. As we opened the menu, we noticed they have dishes from Cuba, Mexico, Brazil, Chile, Argentina, Puerto Rico, Peru, Columbia and Venezuela.

On our first visit my wife ordered empanadas and a beef and rice burrito. The burrito was huge and we ended up taking half of it home with us. She said the burrito was really good and the empanadas were the best she has ever had. On our second visit, she got the Chicken Fajitas. The fajitas are not on the menu, but they had a sign out front advertising Fajita Fridays. She said the fajitas were delicious, well-seasoned and the meat was very tender.

I ordered tacos on both my first and second visit. I wanted to try something different, but if I really like something, I stick with it. I'm bad about that. Although I did try a bowl of Cuban Black Bean Soup on my second visit, which was fantastic. Since I was in the mood for Mexican food, I wanted some chips and salsa. I didn't see it on the menu, so I asked if they offered it. The waitress said they did and brought it out to us while we were waiting for our meal. The chips were homemade, warm and cooked to perfection. The salsa was superb, very flavorful and just the right amount of kick.

I highly recommend Souza's. I know we'll be back, probably for Fajita Fridays if they still offer it. They're open Monday through Saturday, 11 AM till 9 PM and closed on Sundays. You can

Monthly Tax Update

You either filed your taxes on time or filed an extension and owe taxes. It's not unusual for taxpayers who owe taxes to file an extension to prevent collections from beginning. However, it may be of interest that the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) offers several payment options. Here are some key points to keep in mind.

Never send cash. Electronic payment options are the quickest and easiest way to pay your tax. Check out IRS Direct Pay or EFTPS to pay directly from your bank account. It's secure and free. You'll get instant confirmation that you have submitted your payment. You can pay taxes electronically 24/7 on IRS.gov. Just click on the payments tab near the top left on the home page.

If you filed an extension, you may be able to pay through your tax software when you file the return.

Another method is to choose the option to pay with a credit or debit card. This is accomplished by going to the irs.gov website and be advised that the company processing your payment will charge a processing fee. You may be able to deduct the credit or debit card processing fee on next year's return. It's claimed on Schedule A, Itemized Deductions.

You may enroll in the Electronic Federal Tax

Payment System (EFTPS). The EFTPS method permits you to pay your federal taxes electronically. You have a choice to pay using the internet, or by phone using the EFTPS Voice Response System.

If you can't pay electronically, you can still pay by a personal check, cashier's check or money order. Make it payable to "United States Treasury." Be sure your name, address and daytime phone number appears on the front of your payment. Also, write the tax year, Form 1040, and your Social Security number in the memo section of the check and you'll use the social security number shown first if it's a joint return payment. You will also send a completed Form 1040-V payment voucher in the envelope with your payment or mail it with your tax return the IRS. Make sure you send them to the correct address listed in the instructions for the Form 1040-V. This will help the IRS process your payment and post it to your account correctly. You can get the form on IRS.gov/forms at any time.

If you can't pay your tax in full, the IRS urges you to still file your tax return on time. You should pay as much as you can with your tax return. This will help keep your penalty and interest costs down. If the amount you owe is more than you can pay in full, then establish an

installment agreement which will allow you to pay the balance overtime. There will be a processing fee charged by IRS when you establish this arrangement. There is an Online Payment Agreement tool on IRS.gov that makes it a real easy way to apply if the amount due is under \$50,000.

Finally, if the amount is more than you can handle and you know there isn't any way that you'll ever pay it off, you may feel enticed to call one of the scammer advertising entities that will charge you unbelievable fees and never settle the debt. I would advise you to determine if an Offer in Compromise is possible first. You can go to the website "http://irs.treasury.gov/oic_pre_qualifier/" to determine if an offer in compromise is possible. If you find you fall within the parameters, I recommend you seek the assistance of a local Enrolled Agent, Certified Public Accountant, or an attorney to prepare the documentation and settle the debt. Steer away from the "We can reduce your tax liability" nationwide advertising solicitors due to excessive billing techniques.

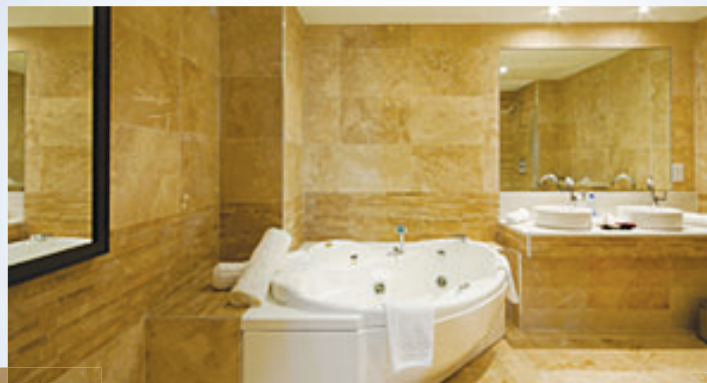

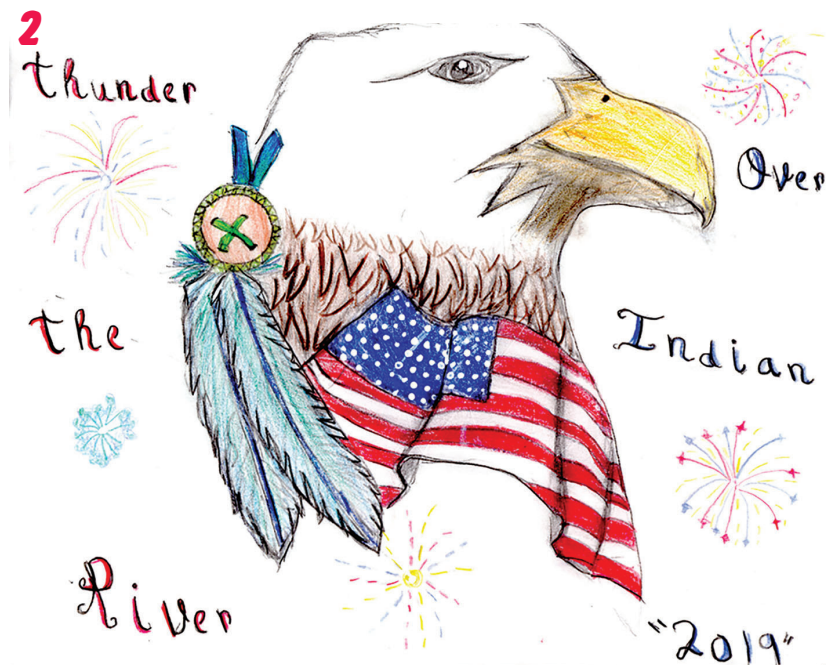

Florida House Passes Memorial To Make Florida Home To U.S. Space Force

House Memorial 1281 by Representative Tyler Sirois (R- Cocoa) was passed unanimously today by the Florida House of Representatives. The memorial requests Congress to approve the creation of the United States Space Force and establishment of its headquarters in Florida. The memorial follows a recent White House proposal by President Donald Trump, and Governor Ron DeSantis' call for the Space Force to be headquartered in Florida.

To determine the location, the U.S. Department of Defense is conducting a study on the merits of each proposed location. Representative Sirois reached out to officials at the Pentagon for further information on the study. During his remarks on the House floor, Representative Sirois invited President Trump to visit Florida's Space Coast to review the spaceport infrastructure and to meet with the area's workforce.

In a letter to President Trump, Representative Sirois wrote: "Florida is the ideal choice to serve as headquarters for this new branch of our nation's armed forces. Within Brevard County, on Florida's Space Coast, we have the Kennedy Space Center and Cape Canaveral Air Force Station, the Naval Ordnance Testing Unit at Port Canaveral, and Patrick Air Force Base—home of the 45th Space Wing. We have a robust and growing commercial aerospace sector that promotes a culture of innovation and agility. We have a civilian workforce highly skilled in avionics, advanced manufacturing, and modeling, simulation, and training."

In remarks on the House floor, Sirois added: "As Florida finds itself competing with other states for the many workforce and economic benefits that accompany a new military installation, I believe Florida is the ideal choice for the headquarters of this new military command. I think Floridians, more than any other state, recognize the space program as an enduring symbol of American leadership—or as Michael Mitchell, a Space Shuttle Engineer put it: a personification of "what a great people can do."

Upon approval by the Florida Legislature, copies of the memorial will be delivered to Members of Congress and President Trump.

Target, etc. are also welcomed. For those who wish to attend but are perhaps unable, Jon's Fine Jewelry, Pet Pros in Rockledge and Melbourne, any of the four Molly Mutt Thrift Store locations, along with the Brevard Humane Society's Cocoa & Merritt Island Adoption Centers will all gladly accept gifts/donations before and after the shower.

Most importantly, the Brevard Humane Society hopes to remind the public with this event that the easiest way to reduce the number of unwanted kittens each year is to spay and neuter. Patrons wishing to control the pet population, may also indicate their donations be utilized for the Humane Society's "Spay It Forward" program, which helps provide free spays and neuters to animals in need.

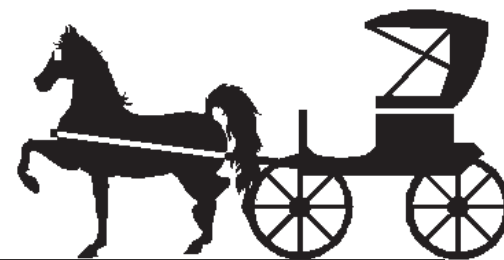

Waste Management was at the meeting and gave a presentation and answered all questions that the group had. They explained what some of the problems that they are having with the recycling program are. The major problem is people putting plastic bags and some other items into the barrels. This causes break downs and delays. Items need to be put in the barrels loosely, not in plastic bags. They provided handouts to show what is allowed in the recycle container and what is not. Barrels need to be out on the roadside by 6 a.m. It is best is to have it out the night before. Just because you normally get picked up in the afternoon does not mean that it will always be that way. If they are delayed, they will get to you the next day.

The containers need to be placed with the wheels facing the house and the opening facing the street.

Yard waste is not to be placed in the recycle container. It is to be placed in containers no larger than 35 gallons and not weigh more than 50 pounds. Paper bags / containers are not acceptable because they can be mulched at the county landfill.

If you call a contractor in to remove trees and other brush, they must take it to the landfill. They will tell you that they will do it cheaper if they do not take it to the landfill. Code Enforcement may fine you and have you pay to have it removed, and this may be at a higher rate.

A Brevard County Sheriff's Deputy was there but had to leave on a call. He did advise that the crime rate was lower again last month. People are still leaving their vehicles unlocked and items in them. This is causing crimes of opportunity like burglary and theft. Remember to call if you see something that they need know. The Groves is a large area and they can not be everywhere. We are their eyes and ears.

Virgin Trans USA, formerly Brightline and All Aboard Florida, is planning to have the train

running from Miami to Orlando within two years.

The city of Cocoa has no plans to add another way in or out of the Summer Breeze development at the south end of Alan Shepard.

Signs or items in the right of way was brought up. The only things that are allowed in the right of ways are United States postal boxes, county signs, trash containers and yard waste. All signs must be off the right of way. The yard sales signs that go up and down may not be enforced. Political signs fall into a different category. It is illegal to post any sign on a utility pole or street sign.

Brevard County Commission is going to allow Conex (storage trailers) containers. There are limits to the number, size of the property they are allowed on and uses. It is best to call the Brevard County Building Department for all the requirements and uses.

Now is the time to remove brush and hazards from your property, Hurricane season starts June 1st.

The area wide yard sale was a success. There were many great deals. It was also a great time to meet your neighbors.

It was nice to see new people at the meeting. The next meeting is May 9, 2019 at 7 p.m. at Discovery Church on Grissom Pkwy.

New for 2019 -

Brevard County Youth Football and Cheerleading Association is requiring Florida State Identification Cards for every athlete. This card may be obtained through the Department of Motor Vehicles and is replacing the requirement for a birth certificate to be provided to register.

Original, renewal and replacement ID cards are \$25.00, regardless of the age of the customer. Children ages 5 through 14 are eligible for an ID card and it is valid for four years. The fee for the State ID is waived if you can provide proof of EBT via card/letter.

You will be required to produce one item from (1) Primary Identification and one from (2) Proof of Social Security for the athlete. Two items are required for the parent/legal guardian from the (3) Proof of Residential Address.

You should schedule an appointment online <https://www.flhsmv.gov/locations/> as soon as possible to get this completed prior to the season beginning.

1. Primary Identification

An original or certified copy of one of the following documents:

- U.S. birth certificate, including some U.S. territories and District of Columbia (birth certificates from Puerto Rico must have an issue date after July 1, 2010);
- Valid U.S. passport or passport card;
- Consular Report of Birth Abroad;
- Certificate of Naturalization, form N-550 or form N-570; or

- Certificate of Citizenship, form N-560 or form N-561.

NOTES

- Only a birth certificate issued by a county health department or the CDC Bureau of Vital Statistics will be accepted. Hospital birth certificates are not considered a certified document and will not be accepted.

2. Proof of Social Security

An original of one of the following documents with complete name and SSN:

- Social Security card (with the customer's current name);
- W-2 form (not handwritten);
- Pay check/stub;
- SSA-1099; or
- Any 1099 (not handwritten).

3. Proof of Residential Address

Customers may not use their current driver license or ID card as proof of residential address. Customers must submit TWO different documents with their residential address (printouts or faxes of these documents are acceptable).
