#### Good Day! by Maureen Rupe Mosaic, The Power behind the Secrets

The Mosaic Overview states, "The Mosaic Company (NYSE: MOS) is the world's leading integrated producer and marketer of concentrated phosphate and potash. We employ nearly 9,000 people in six countries and participate in every aspect of crop nutrition development."

It went on to say they mine phosphate rock on almost 200,000 acres they own in Central Florida. It is this New Wales Facility in Mulberry, Florida, where a number of news agencies, including Rod Nickel in a September 17 story titled, "Florida sinkhole at Mosaic fertilizer site leaks radioactive water" at Reuters.com, where a 45-foot sinkhole opened and leaked 215 million gallons of "slightly radioactive water," reported by a company spokesman. The article stated there was enough leaked water to fill 300 Olympic swimming pools. Jacki Lopez, the Florida Director of the Center for Biological Diversity, stated, "Specific environmental and health concerns are the release of uranium, radium and radon gas.

Once contaminants reach the aguifer, which extends from central Florida to Georgia, they can potentially travel hundreds of miles."

According to a Tampa Bay Times story by Christopher O'Donnell on September 16 titled, "Mosaic plant sinkhole dumps 215 million gallons of reprocessed water into Floridan Aquifer," the leak was discovered on August 27th, when the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and Polk County were notified, but no one notified the public for 3 weeks. At the time, Mosiac said it was containing the contamination on site, so they didn't notify the public. But there were those who disagreed in the Tampa Bay Times Story.

"Water in the aquifer is laden with sand and sediment and flows slowly. Nonetheless, extracting all of the contaminated water and sediment before it spreads will be extremely difficult," said Robert Brinkmann, a professor of geology and environmental sustainability at Hofstra University and author of Florida Sinkholes: Science and Policy.



"That's the bad thing about this: The aquifer is like Swiss cheese and it's interconnected," Brinkmann said. "Contamination can be very rapid. They must be working very hard to figure out where this is going."

The Tampa Bay Times story went on to say just last fall Mosaic was fined \$2 billion to clean up six Florida sites and two sites in Louisiana. Mosiac was apparently mixing highly corrosive materials with solid waste and wastewater against federal and state guidelines. This is also the second sinkhole at the New Wales Plant. A 120' wide sinkhole opened in 1994. They pumped water out the same way as they did this time.

Again, according to the story: "Still, a second potential contamination of the aquifer shows that phosphate production puts water supplies at risk, said Tania Galloni, managing attorney for the Florida Office of Earthjustice, an environmental nonprofit group."

"These phosphate companies are playing roulette with our public waters," Galloni said. "They cause devastation so severe that the scars







can be seen clearly from space."

Very concerning is the fact our Governor has removed the scientists from Florida DEP. Now the agency seems to be more concerned about keeping friends with industry than keeping our water safe.

Great news from someone that hasn't normally worried about the environment.

#### **Hurricane Related Sewer Spills**

We were extremely lucky that neither our cities nor Brevard County had a sewage spill during Hurricane Matthew. But not everyone in Florida has escaped millions of gallons of sewage being spilt in their local waterways. Jacksonville.com, in a story by David Bauerlein, reported seven sewage spills in the city of Jacksonville, the biggest being 5 million gallons into the Ortega River, where the city is arguing that only 2.9 million





gallons were sewage and the rest was rain and storm water. Still ridiculously high. How many septic tanks would have to fail to dump that much sewage into the Indian River Lagoon?

Tampa Bay Times (TBO.com) reported Hurricane Hermine caused even more problems on the west coast of Florida. According to the story, Tampa Electric Co. spilled 938,000 gallons of sewage into Hillsborough Bay. Tampa's system had two pump stations overflow into the Hillsborough River, in which Eric Weiss, Tampa's wastewater director, said they didn't know how much was actually spilt. St. Petersburg's Mayor said their city dumped partially treated sewage into Tampa Bay to prevent it from backing up into homes or streets. He didn't say how much, but did say it was millions of gallons. Clearwater was saying the amount of sewage was still being determined. Largo was still determining their estimate. Pinellas County utilities estimated 60,000 gallons were spilled; assuming that it was raw sewage, as they also stated they dumped 7.3

million gallons of mostly treated sewage into Joe's Creek. Tarpon Springs, Brooksville, Port sewage Richey and Hernando County all reported spills, but amounts are not available. Hillsborough County survived the storm without overflows. There were a total of 28 spills and dumps reported over the region.

I reported this a couple of months ago when defining septic tanks as sewers can cause a lot more damage in a short amount of time, especially during these storms.

The one really nice thing following our two back to back Florida hurricanes is learning Floridapolitics.com reported Gov. Rick Scott asked the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to investigate the spills and find out how we can Dead Economy! prevent them in the future. Gov. Scott also implemented a requirement to report spills within 24 hours due to the Mosiac Spill.

#### **Monthly Tax Update**

A number of you will be looking to start your own business during the next two months. I'm going to give a little information on one of the issues that may become important to you. This involves your start up expenses and how much is immediately deductible. You may be spending a considerable amount of cash and going into substantial debt to finance this new business activity. It is important you understand that all these expenses may not be fully deductible in this year or even next year.

Nevertheless, there are steps that you may take to accelerate deductions in certain instances. First, in accomplishing this, you need to understand how the rules work. Here's a summary of the tax laws for your consideration permitting you to potentially deduct all of your start-up expenses.

There are three categories of expenditures. Taxpayers starting a new business may incur expenses which are cur-



rently deductible, capitalized, or eligible for the 60-month amortization election; business expenses that are ordinary and necessary in carrying on a trade or business are currently deductible.

However, the Internal Revenue Code specifically prohibits an immediate deduction for the expenses connected with the buying or creating an asset with a useful life extending beyond one year. These expenses will have to be deducted over the life of the asset and spread out over time, usually in the form of a depreciation deduction.

Lastly, there are expenses incurred before a trade or business is operational and therefore, unable to be classified as a "trade or business" expense. These expenses must be capitalized,

unless a special start up expense treatment is elected, and amortized. This special election allows the business to, potentially, deduct the start up expenses immediately rather than amortize them over a minimum period of at least 60 months, beginning with the month in which the active trade or business begins.

This overview is just the tip of the iceberg when dealing with all the permutations possible with the deductibility of business start-up expenses. There are many other issues that deal with deducting inventory, equipment, leasehold improvements, vehicles, etc. and when deductibility begins.

You should also consider what type of entity

is best for your situation; sole proprietorship, partnership, corporation, or possibly a limited liability company, and give consideration as to the type of tax return that will be filed.

Also, don't forget insurance, worker's compensation, and payroll concerns. My advice, work up a business plan and this way you'll have given consideration to most of the important aspects for your new endeavor.

If you have any questions about how the rules apply to your particular situation, or if you'd like to consider more aggressive tax planning in connection with your current expenses, you need to contact a tax professional for assistance.

#### 2016 PSJ Christmas Parade

Dear Neighbor,

This letter is to invite your organization to participate in the 26thAnnual Port St. John Christmas parade. The parade

will take place on December 17, 2016, 11 AM, in Port St. John. The parade route will be east along Fay Blvd. from Waterloo Ave. to Carole Ave. We are hoping for 80-90 entries again this year. Please send your entry in early.

This year's parade theme will be "A Space \bigcup Age Christmas." Floats and decorations should be planned toward the theme. All entries will be judged and plaques awarded. Categories include Theme, Christmas Spirit, Creativity, Marching Musical and Marching Non-Musical.

Floats should be no more than 17' high to clear power lines, and be 8' wide or less to travel to and from the staging area. They can be wider on the parade route. Marching groups should plan for a 20' wide roadway.

#### **Space Walk of Fame Museum Grows**

The U.S. Space Walk of Fame Museum in led the world in building things. Titusville is reaching for the stars as it implements a makeover of all galleries and exhibits, a new web site, a new digital venue for honoring space workers and a dynamic new approach to STEAM education. The facility is also unveiling the region's first "STEAM Shop," featuring kits, games, activities and books all tied to Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Math for ages Kindergarten to adult. The Director explained that the new STEAM Space project will be a multi-phase initiative that begins with the development of five additional STEAM classes, rocketry and computer camps, mentoring/entrepreneurial opportunities, and hands-on learning through a new Makerspace.

The Makerspace concept is rooted in the reality that humans are not living up to their full potential unless they are creating something. Makerspaces allow young and old alike to build, design and create. It could be a nuts-and-bolts project or it could be something digital. Either way, it harkens back to the days when our nation

STEAM Saturday classes will take place on the second Saturday of each month. Meanwhile, museum staff and educators are building five new classes for 2017. Likewise, two three-day camps are planned - a Rocketry Camp on Jan. 3, 4, and 5, and a Computer Camp in June of 2017. Museum officials are looking for teachers and other professionals interested in developing curriculum and programming or mentoring students.

STEAM Space was chosen by LEAD Brevard as one of its 2017 Leadership Action Projects and the project has already attracted the support of the Parrish Medical Center Foundation, which is funding the start-up with \$25,000.

To support the museum refresh, STEAM Space and other projects, the museum is seeking grants, new members and donors or sponsors. They are also implementing new projects that will help them preserve space history. Among these projects are:

The museum's new web site - www.spacewalkoffame.org - was made possible by a grant

from the Brevard Cultural Alliance.

The new "Space Worker Hall of Honor," is a joint project between the museum and Titusville mayor Jim Tulley. The digital hall allows space workers past and present to be recognized for their contributions. "It is absolutely free," Engel said, "and family members can post a page honoring someone who is no longer with us. This is one more way we can preserve our space history and recognize those men and women who literally changed the world." Go to www.spacehonor.org or enter the site through the museum's web site.

The museum will hold its second charity memorabilia auction in October through the online auction house www.Invaluable.com. On-line bidding will open one month in advance and will culminate with a live auction at the museum on Oct. 29. "Our Collections Analyst tells me we have some pretty amazing items," Engel said. Lots are not from the museum but are consigned by astronauts, former workers and collectors.



#### **Out On the Town**

After two days without power due to Hurricane Matthew, we awoke on Sunday morning starving for some real comfort food. We had about all we could take of cold hard-boiled eggs and instant coffee, but where in PSJ could we get a hot breakfast and who still had power? We recalled from an earlier conversation with our 7 year old granddaughter, Madison, that the Country Cookin' Diner had really good food. Of course, what does a 7 year old know about good food? Evidently a lot!

Sure enough, they were open for business and the parking lot was packed. I guess others who were out of power had the same idea we did. I was really hungry, so I ordered the Sampler Platter for \$7.79. It includes 2 eggs any style, 2 sausage links, 2 strips of bacon, ham, choice of grits or home fries, and either toast or biscuits and gravy. The home fries were made with new potatoes and had a very good flavor. I ordered my eggs over easy and they were cooked perfectly. The biscuits appeared to be homemade and although the gravy wasn't the best I've ever had, it was still fresh, hot, and tasty.

My wife ordered the two-egg meal with two catfish filets, grits, and biscuits and gravy. Her eggs were scrambled and the catfish had a cornmeal batter and was fried to perfection. After staring at her with a sad look in my eyes, she felt sorry enough that she gave me one of her filets. I must say, I was so happy she did because that was probably the best fried catfish I had ever tasted. Her grits were made just the way she likes them, creamy and buttery and not of the instant variety.

All in all, we enjoyed our breakfast. The service was quick even though they were extremely busy; the coffee and tea we ordered was fresh; and the portions were more than sufficient. We left the restaurant with the feeling you get when you've been served good food, plenty to eat and at a good value.

The Country Cookin' Diner was opened in 2009 and is located at 704 West Avenue in Port St. John in the strip mall between Fay Blvd. and Winn-Dixie. They are open 7 days a week, from 7 am to 9 pm and serve breakfast anytime. They also have a 'Senior Section' on the menu for breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Takeout is also offered. Their website, www.country-cookin.com,

is full of information, including the menus, maps of their three locations, and the Country Cookin' Diner's history.

We plan on returning in the near future; maybe we'll invite Madison.

The local blood bank is in need of donations during the busy traveling



#### FALL COOK'S CORNER.....

Pulled Pork with Caramelized Onions

Traditional pulled pork is barbecued, which gives it a smoky flavor. But the slow cooker happens to be the absolute easiest way to cook pulled pork—and you can get a hint of smoke by adding chipotle chile. Serve the pulled pork with potato salad, collard greens and grits. Or make it into a sandwich and serve it on a bun with coleslaw.



Ingredients - 8 servings

3 large onions, sliced

1/3 cup raw cane sugar, such as Demerara or turbinado (see Notes)

4 cloves garlic, minced

1 tsp dried oregano

1 teaspoon freshly ground pepper

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/3 cup cider vinegar

1 cup chili sauce

sauce (see Notes)

3 pounds boneless pork shoulder or blade (butt) roast, trimmed

Preparation - Ready In 9 hours

Heat oil in a large skillet over medium-high heat. Add onions and cook, stirring occasionally, until they begin to soften, 3 to 6 minutes. Add sugar and continue to cook, stirring constantly, until the onions are golden brown, 6 to 8 minutes more. Add garlic, oregano, pepper and salt and cook, stirring, for 1 minute. Add vinegar and bring to a boil. Cook until mostly evaporated, 30 seconds to 1 minute. Remove from the heat and stir in chili sauce and chipotle to taste.

Place pork in a 4-quart (or larger) slow cooker and cover with the sauce. Cover and cook until the pork is almost falling apart, about 4 hours on High or 8 hours on Low.

Transfer the pork to a cutting board and shred using two forks. Stir back into the sauce.

Variation: Turn 3 cups leftover pulled pork into Pulled-Pork Torta. Preheat oven to 375 °F. Coat a deep-dish pie pan or other 9-inch round baking dish with cooking spray. Heat 3 cups finely shredded Pulled Pork with Caramelized Onions (including sauce) just until warm. Drain one 14-ounce can no-added-salt diced tomatoes (reserve juice); combine with 1/4 cup diced Spanish-style chorizo (see Note) or pepperoni in a bowl. Mix well. Spread about 1/2 cup of the mixture in the prepared pan to cover the bottom. Top with one 8-inch flour tortilla (preferably whole-wheat). Spoon one-third of the remaining mixture over the tortilla. Top with another tortilla. Repeat twice, topping with a fourth tortilla. Drizzle the reserved tomato juice over the top and cover with foil. Bake for 20 minutes. Remove the foil, sprinkle 3/4 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese on top and continue baking until the cheese is melted and the torta is bubbly, about 20 minutes more. Let cool for 10 minutes. Serve

Equipment: 4-quart or larger slow cooker

Notes: Raw cane sugar (such as Sugar in the Raw) is steam-cleaned, coarse-grained and light brown in color, with a slight molasses flavor. Find it in the natural-foods section of large supermarkets or at natural-foods stores.

Chipotle chiles in adobo sauce are smoked jalapeños packed in a flavorful sauce. Look for the small cans with Mexican foods at large supermarkets. Once opened, they'll keep up to 2 weeks in the refrigerator or 6 months in the freezer.
