Sugarloaf Key Finds a Friend in Space Coast

Swirling around the paralyzing tension and gripping fears of Irma is a story of two schools that illustrates how the power of a hurricane pales in comparison to the forces of kindness.

Along with millions of others, Mrs. Sylvia Mijuskovic (a.k.a., "Mrs. M"), the principal of Space Coast Junior Senior High School, closely monitored Irma's path as it relentlessly huffed, puffed and poured its way across the center of the Keys and eventually churned its way up the western coast of Florida.

During the storm, Mrs. M had managed a school shelter to ensure the safety of families in her community. Relieved the Space Coast area did not sustain the debilitating damages that had been forecasted as possible, she immediately turned her attention to other areas she could potentially help.

As post-storm reports gradually captured the widespread devastation Irma left behind, Mrs. M came across a Facebook post requesting fundraising adoptions of affected schools that were in dire need. Anxious to help, Mrs. M decided to include students, teachers and staff at Space Coast in committing to a school-wide adoption of the Sugarloaf School Sharks in Monroe County, Florida.

Sugarloaf Key had been pummeled by sustained everything they held dear to Irma. With so many winds upwards of 130 mph. Irma's impact caused short-term challenges such as power outages, limited access to food and water, and empty gas tanks. A much longer-term impact was the loss of hundreds of homes, with roughly four out of five Sugarloaf Key residents facing the daunting reality of having nowhere to call home.



"There is not enough lodging for all of the displaced people here," said Maria Allen, an Administrative Assistant at Sugarloaf School.

Many Sugarloaf School staff and students lost

families facing housing shortages, nearly 100 students who attended Sugarloaf before the storm have had to seek schooling in other areas, and several staff members have also struggled to find a new place to live.

As Irma battered the Keys, Sugarloaf School housed over 500 residents seeking refuge from the storm. In the storm's aftermath, Sugarloaf School extended lodging beyond campus walls with huge tents. It also formed a distribution center where supplies are collected, packaged and distributed for families and schools in need.

Sugarloaf School's principal, Mr. Harry Russell, described how the distribution center aimed to meet the diverse needs of families. "We sent home letters to families asking them what they needed, and we sent supplies out to help those families."

"Our donation center is not only for our Sugarloaf families but also for the public," said Ms. Allen. "You can get anything on the supply list. We're having a huge fundraiser for the community this Saturday. The Police Athletic League will help us distribute and open up a donation center to all residents of the Florida Keys." - More inside

Good Day! by Maureen Rupe Port St John Advisory Board Survives

At the October 5, 2017 Brevard County Planning & Zoning Meeting, agenda item VI, New Business under Miscellaneous, there were two items:

F.1. Legislative intent and permission to advertise ordinance dissolving the Port St. John Dependent Special District Board.

F.2. Same wording dissolving the North Merritt Island Special District Board.

I told you about this coming before the County Commission last month. I only knew the date a few days before, as the meeting was originally cancelled due to Hurricane Irma. There were only Wendy Porter and myself from PSJ. Wendy is a member of the Port St. John Advisory Board. There were quite a few people present for the North Merritt Island Board, so both supported each other. Plus, Thank You to all who called or wrote the County Commission with your support.

Commissioner Tobia first gave his reasons, 1) Basic Conservative Government Principles (less government); 2) Slows down the process. Both boards should be immediately and permanently dissolved.

I spoke and asked why Commissioner Tobia would want to exclude residents from giving their input on their own quality of life. Commissioner Tobia said the boards were sunset in 2003 and why were they still in operation. Someone from Merritt Island pointed out that the sunset had come before the County Commission in 2003, and the County Commission authorized the boards to continue without another sunset. Commissioner Tobia then called me a "wonderful woman," which had to be sarcasm. It was on the tip of my tongue to say; "Please tell us how you really feel!" I hesitated and the moment was lost.

Both requests to dissolve each board were voted down 4 to 1, with Commissioner Tobia being the lone vote. None of the other Commissioners seem to agree with any of his reasoning. North Brevard Economics Zone Comes Through for PSJ/CG

Canaveral Port Authority with Big Dream

"Our Port" was built with Tax Payer funding, based on being a Special Taxing District. The Port has not taxed our District since 1986 (31 years ago), although by current State Legislation, it would only take 3 votes of the 5 Commission total.

I went along on October 16th to the Community Meeting to give public comment, until I realized the Port Authority was not in session and there would be no public comment to verify by minutes of a meeting. We would just walk around the foyer and look at maps and ask questions of the staff of Bermello Ajamil and Partners, and then fill in a card with our comments. Same as last year, when the plan was in its infancy. At that last meeting, the plan was to ship containers from the Port down the Banana River, transfer them to a train, transport them over U.S.1 at Kings Highway, and then catch a train at the old Orlando Utilities Power Station going north or south through Brevard.

What I heard at this meeting was a massive plan, cost at \$2.54 billion, besides \$700 million for maintenance projects. Seems more like \$4 billion in my opinion, to be able to accomplish what they had on their plan.

The Port seems to have no money from the amount of borrowing they have already done. How much more must they borrow while this is being built, as it's not finishing until 2022/2023 for the new cruise terminals, and 2027 to 2030 for the new inlet and inner harbor?

The nearly new Exploration Tower will be adjacent to a Conference Center. I thought last year the Exploration Tower lost money, something close to \$400 million.

New restaurants near the Conference Center/ Exploration Tower. A Fish Market, 3 Parks and an area for Space Industry and storage for Liquid Natural Gas (LNG). Projects like new offices, etc. I would feel a lot better if this project was a private investment.

that bringing back taxes was off the table. Like I said in Florida Today, "If finances don't meet South. projections, a tax could be put on the table for considerations by a future group of Commissioners." Remember it would only take 3 votes!

Did I mention all the trucks on the road? The County cannot afford to repair our roads, but hasn't charged an impact fee on new construction since 2008. Just think, a Transportation Center that would connect the Port to Orlando. Plans have been made for State Road 528 to include every form of transportation you can think of, except having Ricshaws and a train. I still think before Kings and Emperors. Some will say, "I a train along SR528 may become a reality.

east boundary line of Brevard County, Florida, with the south boundary line of Township 25





Monthly Tax Update

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has now released the 2017-18 travel per diem rates. These special per diem rates took effect October 1, 2017, include the special transportation industry rate, the rate for the incidental expenses only deduction, and the rates and list of high-cost localities for purposes of the high-low substantiation method. The special meals and incidental expenses rates for taxpayers in the transportation industry are \$63 for travel within the continental U.S. and \$68 for anywhere outside continental U.S. The rate for the incidental expenses only deduction remains at \$5 per day for any locality within or outside the continental U.S. For the high-low substantiation method, the per diem rates are \$284 for travel to any high-cost locale and \$191 for travel to anywhere else within the continental U.S. The amount of the \$284 high rate and \$191 low rate treated as paid for meals is \$68 for travel to any high-cost locality and \$57 for travel to any other locality within the continental U.S. The per diem rates in lieu of the rates for the meal and incidental expenses only substantiation method are \$68 for travel to any high-cost locality and \$57 for travel to any other locale within the continental U.S. See Publication 463 for more information.

Okay, let's move back to thinking about Hurricane Irma and what you need when reconstructing records lost because of the hurricane or disaster. The reconstructed records might be needed to prove your loss and it's essential for tax purposes, getting federal assistance or insurance reimbursement. Here are ways to help you reconstruct your records: A free tax return transcript is available by using the "Get Transcript"

tool on IRS.gov, or use your smartphone with the "IRS2Go" mobile phone app. You can also call 800-908-9946 to order them by phone.

You need to establish the extent of the damage by taking photographs or videos as soon as possible. You can contact the title company, escrow company, or bank that handled the purchase of your home to get copies of appropriate documents. In addition, you should review your insurance policy to find where the value of a building was established to base the figure for replacement is reflected.

If you made improvements to your home, you may be able to contact the contractor(s), who did the work, to see if records are available. If possible, you should get statements from them to verify the work and cost. You can also get written accounts from friends and relatives who saw the house before and after any improvements.

For inherited property, you can check court records for probate values. If a trust or estate existed, you can contact the attorney who handled the trust. Another place to look is with the county assessor's office for old records that might address the value of the property.

Several other resources are available to help you determine the current fair-market value of most cars on the road, like Kelley Blue Book, or

National Automobile Dealers Association.

You can look on your mobile phone for pictures showing the damaged property before the disaster or look it up on Google's street view map. You can support the valuation of property with photographs, videos, canceled checks, receipts, or other evidence. If you bought items using a credit card or debit card, you should contact your credit card company or bank for past statements. And, if photographs or videos of your property aren't available, a simple method to help remember what items lost is to sketch pictures of each room impacted.

Hopefully, these suggestions aren't needed and we hope you weathered the storm better than you thought you would.

"The community is coming together to support one another and to help each other," said Mr. Russell.

Ms. Allen agrees. "Everybody is looking to each other as a brother or a sister. It brought us more together. If you needed a shoulder to cry on, you had four or five people ready to give you a hug."

Facing an arduous path to the return of normalcy, perhaps most impressive is how Sugarloaf students have responded. "Kids are resilient," said Mr. Russell. "Many of them were used to living in a house or an apartment, and came back to find they don't have a home. But they have handled that incredibly well. They have been great."

Much progress has been made, but due to the magnitude of the storm and the severity of obstacles it left behind, fundraising efforts must continue to surge forward.

"This is going to be a long recovery for people," said Mr. Russell. "This is a year or two year process, at least."

Grateful that Sugarloaf School has received ample classroom and school-related supplies, Mr. Russell emphasized a need for the donation of gift cards to Publix or Home Depot to personalize the act of giving. "With gift cards we can say to families, 'Here's a gift card for you to go get whatever it is you need.' It reinstalls a feeling of independence so families can pick up something that they need."

Mrs. M and Space Coast Junior Senior High School stand firmly behind Mr. Russell and Sugarloaf School. "My goal for Sugarloaf is that we don't just do a one shot deal upon the sudden impact of the hurricane," said Mrs. M. "We want to keep them in our thoughts and prayers throughout the year as we do fundraising events so we can provide for them throughout the holidays that are coming up and throughout the year as it will take a long time for them to recover."



Water At Last?

Coming across an old article dated January 2004 in the Happenings, it reminded me that the residents and property owners in West Canaveral Groves are a hardy lot. Most of them living out there back then are still there. Some, the good Lord has called to his Heavenly pastures, but the majority are looking forward to having the final, most important item tackled; city water.

No more ground water dug out through individual pumps, or water carried in from outside sources in various containers. Four months ago, before the fall hurricanes approached, we were looking forward to a contract being let out to a local company to accomplish this feat. According to Brevard County's department in charge of this project, Ms. Marcia Newell said several permits had to be obtained yet. The next month we learned that DP Development of the Treasure Coast had been awarded the contract for the job, ALL RIDES & SHOWS ARE FREE WITH but several legal items had to be clarified yet. After this was accomplished, we heard that the first pre-construction meeting had been held, but two more meetings were needed before the line could be laid. The big surprise was the fact that the line would start at the Pine and Palmetto St. intersection, not, as expected, at Highway 520 going north.

But two more months and hurricanes have come and gone. Hopefully, the final two meetings have been held, although the expected start dates of late July ~ early August have long gone.

According to Ms. Newell, the hurricane cleanup will cause some more delay, but by early 2018, city water should be flowing along Palmetto, Cherven and Satelite Boulevard.



Solid Waste Collection Fee

Homeowners in unincorporated Brevard County were recently mailed a Brevard County Solid Waste Assessment notice regarding a proposed increase in the annual solid waste collection special assessment for curbside solid waste collection service.

In 2013, following a competitive bidding process, the Board of County Commissioners entered into a seven-year contract with Waste Management, Inc. of Florida, for curbside solid waste collection services. This contract does not include solid waste collection for hurricane debris. The county contracts hurricane debris collection to other contractors and must comply with FEMA rules.

effective on Oct. 1, 2013, and provided Waste Management with a Consumer Price Index (CPI) increase, not to exceed three percent per year, for the life of the contract. At that time it was determined that the income generated from the existing solid waste collection assessments paid by homeowners would be less than the County's costs to provide the solid waste collection service.

However, the Board of County Commissioners was fully aware of the impact of the economic downturn on homeowners and, therefore, no rate increase has been imposed on homeowners for several years. Instead the Solid Waste Management Department was authorized to use a portion of its hurricane reserves of \$5.5 million to make up the difference. Due to the low rate of inflation of 0.7 percent since 2013, along with drawing down the reserves, the Board has not raised the annual assessment rate for several years. It was understood, however, that within three to four years of the new contract, the Board would have to revisit the collection assessment rates and make adjustments to stabilize the reserves.

In 2016, Brevard County suffered the ef-The Waste Management contract became fects of Hurricane Matthew and the remaining \$4.1 million in Solid Waste reserves were not sufficient to cover the cost of the massive yard waste debris cleanup. A loan of \$10 million was approved by the County Commission to pay hurricane debris contractors until the County received FEMA reimbursement. "The Solid Waste Collection Enterprise Fund funded by the annual solid waste collection assessments and

used to pay off solid waste collection services can no longer be sustained out of reserves and the Board of County Commissioners will need to revisit the collection rates and adjust them to stabilize the reserves" said Solid Waste Management Department Director Euripides Rodriguez.

The Board of County Commissioners held a public hearing on August 22nd to consider a proposed Solid Waste collection assessment rate increase of 4.8 percent. Based on the assessment notice mailed out, whatever direction the Board takes in setting the rates, the citizens of Brevard will have the lowest rates of surrounding counties and among the lowest rates in Brevard.
