A New Low; Term Limits on Volunteering?

According to a March 9th - 10th Florida Today story by Dave Berman titled, "Brevard County Commission Rejects Term Limits for Volunteer Advisory Committees," the story discussed the March 10 Brevard County Commission meeting

Advisory Boards. I am not against terms for elected officials, as we see many in the legislature who have made a career of government. In fact, when I was on one of the Charter Review Commissions, I voted to bring in term limits to the elected officials in Brevard. That went to ballot and was voted in by the people.

But volunteer Advisory Boards are different from elected officials. Volunteer boards represent the public, as they advise the County Commissioners, and allow the people interested in various subjects to present their wishes, instead of giving their three minutes in front of the County Commission. These Advisory Boards ensure transparency on issues.

Commissioner Tobia brought the idea up. It was voted down, 3 against term limits and 2 for term limits. Commissioner Pritchett, District 1 Commissioner said, "We have a hard time right now getting enough volunteers on some of our boards, and some of them are really good," Pritchett said. "I've got, like, 1 percent of the community willing to do most of the work, where Commissioner Tobia for District 5 brought and I don't want to lose that workforce because



they're really good workers and great people." Jim Barfield, District 2 Commissioner said, "We have to remember these are volunteers, and a lot of times it's hard to get people to volunteer for certain committees. I just know how it is with volunteers."

Pritchett noted, though, that she would "have no problem, if somebody is not doing their job on a board, removing them."

Commissioner Curt Smith, District 3 Commissioner said though he was, "very much in favor of term limits," he disagreed with term limits on volunteer boards. He also said, "I understand the idea of clearing out dead wood, but the Commissioners themselves have that ability. You just have to make that tough decision. It comes with the territory. You can't be squeamish ... if opportunity arises." I absolutely agree.

Commissioner Isnardi, District 5 said, "We have too many boards, and I will be the first to say it." She also said she wanted term limits to get fresh perspectives. Unfortunately, I have been on too many boards where you get new people in and you lose all that experience, and the new people won't talk for the first year while they are

trying to get up to speed on all the issues.

Commissioner Tobia said he would bring it Legislature School Safety Bill has No Money up another time. You can see where he's going, trying to get rid of advisory boards, as he feels A couple of months ago, Commissioner Tobia asked the County Commission to disband the Port St John Special District Advisory Board and the Merritt Island Special District Planning and Zoning Board. Tobia obviously doesn't think we should have a say in our quality of life. Once again, Commissioner Tobia has made it plain, it will come back in the future. Does he mean he is trying to get Trudie Infantini back into office in November, 2018? If he does, there will be a three vote majority where Tobia, Infantini and Isnardi would control the County Commission. If that happens, forget about quality of life issues. From discussions, you can see he's not in favor of libraries, parks, ball fields, advisory boards and the environment.

The story stated, "Statewide, another 1,500 deputies would be needed for every school campus to be staffed, according to the Florida Education Association, a teachers union. Florida's Cost per Student Station," there were 3,070 K-12 Florida Schools at that time. So it's very easy to see why the Florida Sheriffs Association said it would cost about \$360 million to comply.

"Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Act requires one safe-school officer at each school. Districts can meet the requirement with any combination of deputy/SRO or a guardian/staff and faculty.

Guardians training to carry guns on campus: The training agreement between a school district and sheriff must:

Specify Criminal Justice Standards Training Commission certified instructors and include an 80-hour block based on CJSTC Law Enforcement Academy training model; 16 hours in firearms precision pistol; 8 hours of firearms discretionary shooting; 8 hours on an active shooter or assailant response; 8 hours on defensive tactics; 12 hours of legal or high liability; and optional 16 hours of additional precision pistol training

Eligibility requirements for a school guardian:

Port St. John FL, 32927

Candidate must be licensed to carry a con-

cealed weapon, pass criminal background check, drug testing and psychological evaluation; Achieve an 85-percent pass rate on firearms training and complete 12 hours of diversity training.

I found a News 4 Jacksonville story about Duval County talking about cost being the impeding factor concerning hardening schools. It only talked about two factors; metal detectors and fences. Duval County has 197 schools and the article was saying metal detectors cost between projects/education/CostPerStudentStation.pdf \$1000 and \$30,000; a moderate one would cost about \$4,000. Given Florida has about 3,070 schools, it would cost \$12,280,000; installation cost would probably double that cost. It would also cost \$32,000,000 to fence all 197 Duval and some are not.

Bullet proof glass isn't discussed, but warranted, at least near entrance areas, and better protection while kids are playing outdoors. Remember, the state legislature only gave \$98 million for hardening schools and \$97 million for resource officers. Neither is enough to protect our children. And what do we do? Create a fortress for our schools? What will be next? Our

Shopping Malls? Our Parks? Will we have to have ID to get into Publix? What has happened to our freedom?

Florida Legislature Passes Bill Allowing Reclaimed Water Pumped into Aquifer

The Florida Senate voted 27 to 10 to approve House Bill 1149. The House bill allows millions of gallons of reclaimed water to be pumped every day into the surficial aquifer and the lower Floridan aquifer, the same aquifer many Floridians depend on for drinking water. The bill had already been passed by the House of Representatives, voting 86 for and 21 against. The Bill is now being sent to Governor Scott for his signature.

The sponsors of the bill say that the sewage effluent that will be pumped into the aquifer will have to meet all required standards. The real problem is that there are no standards for many of the pollutants that sewage contains, such as pharmaceuticals and numerous toxic/carcinogenic chemicals. It also contains pathogens that are not destroyed by the chlorine added. Remember this is reclaimed water. It contains high levels of nitrogen and phosphorus, where cities use it for fertilizing lawns because it isn't clean enough to drink. Many cities tell their citizens to keep their children and pets off of the yard for a time period after using it on their lawns.

I was appalled that the legislature would approve such a terrible bill that allows treated sewage water that contains high levels of nitrogen of phosphorus. But I was more appalled to find out from reading the bill, the state has been allowing this to happen since 1983. The bill states: (d)

The provisions of this subsection do not apply to treated or untreated effluent currently discharging into the Floridan Aquifer or Biscayne Aquifer on June 22, 1983. However, any expansion of existing facilities on or after the effective date of this act are subject to the requirements of this subsection.

Brevard County Fire Rescue (BCFR) launched their new mobile application, PulsePoint last month. PulsePoint is aimed at providing bystander CPR and Automated External Defibrillator (AED) assistance to those in immediate need.

PulsePoint works by notifying application users, including trained citizens, visitors and healthcare professionals if someone nearby is having a cardiac emergency, while local paramedics and firefighters are simultaneously dispatched. The app also directs citizen rescuers to the exact location of the closest publicly accessible AED.

Cardiac arrest is a leading cause of death in the United States, accounting for an estimated 424,000 deaths each year, or more than 1,000 deaths per day. The American Heart Association estimates that effective bystander CPR, provided immediately after cardiac arrest, can double or triple a person's chance of survival. However, less than half of cardiac arrest victims receive bystander CPR, or CPR administered by a trained person on scene, or the use of an AED.

cardiac arrest cases, early CPR and defibrillation is the key to survival. Brevard County Fire Rescue and our municipal partners are committed to improving the chain of survival," said Brevard County Fire Chief Mark Schollmeyer, "and ultimately positive cardiac arrest outcomes, through the use of technology and citizen engagement."

Brevard County Fire Rescue was able to initiate the PulsePoint project and application launch with the receipt of the State of Florida EMS Trust Award, through which Brevard County Fire Rescue was awarded \$23,000 of initial funding, and \$13,000 of funding per year guaranteed for the next 5 years.

PulsePoint and Brevard County Fire Rescue, along with partner agencies, are providing our community with a unique opportunity to build a partnership between citizens and first responders. Through this collaboration, BCFR is determined to bring immediate CPR and AED assistance to anyone in need.

Easily Get Replacement Social Security Tax Forms Online

Tax time is fast approaching. Preparing your documents can seem overwhelming. Some forms and paperwork might be difficult to track down. Social Security has made it easy to track down your annual Benefit Statement.

An SSA-1099, or your annual Benefit Statement, is a tax form Social Security mails each year in January to people who receive Social Security benefits. It shows the total amount of benefits received from Social Security in the previous year so people know how much Social Security income to report to the IRS on their tax return. You should receive your SSA-1099 by January 31, 2017.

For noncitizens who live outside of the United States and received or repaid Social Security benefits last year, we'll send form SSA-1042S instead. The forms SSA-1099 and SSA-1042S are not available for people who receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI).

If you currently live in the United States and need a replacement form SSA-1099 or SSA-1042S, we have a way for you to get an instant replacement quickly and easily. Go online to www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount and request an instant replacement form. The online replacement form is available now. Every working person in the U.S. should create a my Social Security account. The secure and personalized features of my SocialSecurity are invaluable in securing a comfortable retirement — for today and tomorrow.

Monthly Tax Update

This month I want to discuss Internal Revenue Service (IRS) communications. In the past, you have been told time after time the IRS will not call you and this still stands true to a certain extent. I recommend the following actions when IRS contacts you personally, by mail, or telephone. The IRS initiates most contacts through regular mail delivered by the United States Postal Service (USPS). However, there are special circumstances in which the IRS will call or come to a home or business.

Visits are usually conducted when a taxpayer has not responded on an overdue tax bill, to secure a delinquent tax return or a delinquent employment tax payment, or during criminal investigations. Upon arrival, you will want to verify they have valid identification cards and then inquire as to what their purpose for the visit is. They will explain their requirements and at this point, I would recommend you call my office or your tax advisor for how to respond to their requirements. I would suspect your tax advisor will request you have them contact your tax advisor directly. This will require you to complete a power of attorney for your tax advisor, and then let your tax advisor handle all future communications with the representatives. IRS will provide

your tax advisor the professional courtesy time to secure the documents or information required and relieve the pressure and stress you'll experience when they arrive.

The next step by the IRS is the task of collecting taxes established from their visit. If this is so, they will initiate communications again by mail delivered by the USPS. If securing the tax liability fails due to your failure to respond, it may result in them utilizing a new private collection program from a select four contractors. The groups are: CBE Group of Cedar Falls, Iowa; Conserve of Fairport, N.Y.; Performant of Livermore, Calif.; and Pioneer of Horseheads, N.Y. The taxpayer's account will only be assigned to one of these agencies, never to all four. Also, no other private group is authorized to represent the IRS.

Again, the IRS will always notify a taxpayer before transferring their account to a private collection agency (PCA). The IRS will send a letter to the taxpayer and their tax representative informing them that their account is being assigned to a PCA and giving the name and contact information for the PCA. This mailing will include a copy of Publication 4518, What You Can Expect When the IRS Assigns Your Account to a Private Collection Agency. Be advised, I recom-

mend you listen carefully to what they have to say, request their name and contact information, and tell them your tax advisor will contact them to resolve the collection issue.

In both of these circumstances, my main point is that you don't give them any personal information, financial information or what action will be taken. Let your tax advisor handle the situation to validate the requirement requested and advise you on the proper action to resolve the situation.

PUT YOUR BEST FOOT FORWARD

It's time to show a little love and respect for the body part most of us take for granted

ur poor, neglected feet. From morning to night, they take us everywhere we need to go, yet we rarely seem appreciative.

Maybe the truth is that we take our feet for granted because they almost always get the job done without a hassle. But when something is amiss, our feet let us know. This raises the question, are we treating our feet with enough TLC?

"Poor footwear choices, poor hygiene or personal foot care, and lack of exercise, cause most of the problems," says Parrish Medical Group's Jonathon Lubitz, DPM. "Things like arch height, propensity for bunions and foot shape and size are inherited. However, these are just anatomical features. They don't cause problems."

While some foot woes are painful and others are just uncomfortable, they all can lead to bigger concerns if not dealt with early on. With this in mind, here are some rules to help you put your best foot forward. And keep it there.



Wear Shoes Around the House

Forget about leaving them at the front door; wearing shoes at home is a suggested habit for foot care. Shoes protect you from the environment (heat and cold) and man-made surfaces, like cement and other obstacles that can damage the foot. Dr. Lubitz recommends wearing specifically designed supportive sandals around the house.

Practice Good Hygiene

Consider how much time you spend washing your hair versus your feet. Now ponder this: According to the American Podiatric Medical Association (APMA), each of your feet has more than 250,000 sweat glands and can produce four to six ounces of perspiration a day if you're active.

Combat the stench by washing your feet, including between each toe, with warm, soapy water and a washcloth, and dry them thoroughly. (This will help remove dead skin and bacteria and prevent nail fungus.) And for goodness' sake, change your socks and shoes.

Wear Shoes that Fit

Many foot conditions—bunions, heel pain and hammertoes are three of the most common—are aggravated by ill-fitting footwear.

"Your shoes should offer plenty of support and be wide enough to accommodate the ball of your foot," Dr. Lubitz says." The back should be cushioned and not dig into your heel or touch your anklebone."

It's also important to match the shoe to the activity. There are some shoes, such as running shoes that can be used for walking or aerobics; but if you do a sport three or more times a week, you should purchase a specialty shoe.

Get Regular Exercise

You already know that stretching can help you stay flexible, and that regular exercise can build stronger bones and muscle and help maintain your weight. Being fit also keeps your feet happy. "Obesity is associated with plantar fasciitis [heel pain] and tendinitis—especially the posterior tibial tendon that supports your arch and the Achilles," says Dr. Lubitz.

ORTHOPEDICS

Poor footwear choices, poor hygiene or personal foot care, and lack of exercise, cause most of the problems, says Parrish Medical Group's Jonathon Lubitz, DPM.

Observe and Report Problems

Examine your feet daily, looking for minor changes such as redness, irritation, calluses and toenail fungus, and don't ignore pain. If you have pain in your feet that lasts for two or more days—even with rest, ice and simple over-the-counter cushions and anti-inflammatories—you should see an orthopedic foot and ankle specialist.

WHAT'S YOUR FOOT TYPE?

ou put weight on your feet 1,500 to 2,500 times each day. Does having a flat or arched foot make the stress harder to bear? And how do you know which type you have? Hop out of a pool and step onto the concrete or walk in the sand.

"A good way to see what foot type you have is by examining your footprint," says Dr. Lubitz. "There are three types of arches, flat, high and average. A footprint showing a lot of contact with the floor is a flat foot. A footprint showing contact with the ball of the foot and the heel is a high arch. Finally a footprint showing contact with the outside the ball of the foot, the heel area and the edge of the foot is an average arch."





Residents Urged to Report Fish Kills to FWC

Brown tide conditions on Indian River Lagoon, especially in the Banana River and Sykes Creek, have prompted a reminder for residents to report any sighting of fish kills to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission. The state agency administers a toll-free Fish Kill Hotline (1-800-636-0511) for reporting the locations of fish kills and/or diseased or abnormal fish. When reporting an incident, the following additional information is helpful:

- Condition of the fish (include pictures if available)
- · Date and time the incident was first noted
- Location
- · Species of fish
- Water color abnormalities

Reports can also be submitted on the FWC website. If calling after hours or on the weekend, a biologist will return your call on the next business day. There is also an FWC phone app where the fish kills can be reported: http://myfwc.com/news/news-releases/2018/february/19/ sighting-app/

Isolated fish kill events occur most often during the spring and summer as temperatures rise. The most common cause is low dissolved oxygen in the water. Algal blooms, like the brown tide currently blooming in the Indian River from Port St. John to Vero and throughout the Banana River, consume oxygen at night and during cloudy days, sometimes leaving insufficient oxygen for fish and other marine life. Algal blooms are fed by excess nutrients often related to human activities.

Residents can play a role in helping avoid fish kills. That includes keeping leaves and grass clippings off the streets, canals and out of storm drains; following local fertilizer ordinances; preventing over irrigation; maintaining septic systems; and repairing leaky sewer pipes.

In response to the record-breaking fish kill of March 2016, Brevard County residents voted to impose a half-cent sales tax to fund a 10-year plan to cleanup and restore health to the Indian River Lagoon.

The Save Our Indian River Lagoon Project Plan is updated annually and posted online at http://www.brevardfl.gov/SaveOurLagoon. To date, six projects have been completed and over 60 projects are scheduled to begin this year. After many decades of allowing too much pollution to enter the lagoon, it will take hundreds of projects and years of cleanup to reduce the risk of severe algae blooms and associated fish kills.

Parrish Medical Center Recognized at World Patient Safety, Science & Technology Summit

A world conference held in London, England on patient safety, science and technology recognized Parrish Medical Center (PMC) as the world's first hospital to commit to a series of lifesaving patient safety goals and presented a humanitarian award to the PMC official leading the hospital's work on the safety project.

The Patient Safety Movement Foundation's 6th annual World Patient Safety, Science & Technology Summit, co-convened by the European Society of Anesthesiology, took place Feb. 23 - 25 in central London with healthcare practitioners and industry members attending from at least 25 countries. PMC was recognized as the world's first hospital to earn the Patient Safety Movement Foundation's 5-Star Hospital Ranking, which acknowledges PMC for implementing the Foundation's 13 Actionable Patient Safety Solutions (APSS). The Patient Safety Movement seeks by 2020 to eliminate preventable hospital errors, thereby saving an estimated 1,000 lives every day in U.S. hospitals.

Edwin Loftin, PMC's senior vice president of Integrated and Acute Care Services and chief nursing officer, received one of two humanitarian awards presented by the Foundation for his work at PMC in implementing the APSS. The conference's other humanitarian award was presented to Rt. Hon. Jeremy Hunt, a member of the British House of Commons and Secretary of State for Health and Social Care.

"These are events of great pride and even more satisfaction for PMC's 1,300 care partners," said George Mikitarian, PMC president and chief executive officer. "Pride in that their efforts have

once again merited international recognition, and even greater satisfaction in making patient safety a lifesaving, care-improving, priority within PMC's mission of healing experiences specific patient safety accomplishments were for everyone all the time."

Joe Kiani, Patient Safety Movement Foundation founder, said at the London presentation years. that the staff was taken aback when PMC first announced its intention to meet all Actionable Patient Safety Solutions. "Parrish made so many commitments to implement processes that were proven to reduce medical error that our staff

believed it was an error," Kiani said. "However, when we spoke with Edwin, his response was "Why wouldn't we make all these commitments?"

Kiani visited PMC in January 2018 to personally present the 5-Star Hospital Ranking Award to PMC's board of directors, administration, and care partners. During his visit he also used Twitter to commend PMC and said, "We can get to zero (preventable hospital errors) worldwide if every hospital plans for zero by implementing all of the processes."

PMC has in recent years been named Florida's safest hospital by Consumer Reports; by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services as Florida's No. 1 hospital for patient safety, quality

of care, and patient experience; and has earned multiple other care and safety honors.

During Kiani's January visit, some of PMC's noted:

- Zero ventilator-related pneumonia in 12
- One catheter-related urinary tract infection in 10 years.
- One central-line associated bloodstream associated infection in 10 years.

When PMC committed itself to meeting all 13 Actionable Patient Safety Solutions, Mikitarian charged Loftin with implementing the program hospitalwide.

"It was George Mikitarian's vision to make PMC not just a nationally, but internationally recognized hospital for patient safety," Loftin said.

Loftin, accepting his award, told the conference, "One of the first questions I am often asked is 'why?' followed closely by 'how?' Why do we commit to patient safety? That's easy. Every patient's life, every person's life, matters. Committing to zero by 2020 is the right thing to do, and like most things worth doing, it isn't easy. It takes hard work. The commitment our care partners make to apply every Actionable Patient Safety Solution comes from the heart and from a deep love and respect for our community."

The conference's keynote speaker was former U.S. President Bill Clinton, who has undergone several heart procedures, including open-heart surgery. The Patient Safety Movement Foundation's website says that for 2017, 81,533 lives have been saved worldwide through the implementation of processes such as APSS.

Add Gardening Space, Beauty and Ease with Elevated Gardens

Elevate your gardens to waist high level for convenience and easy access. Elevated gardens are easy on your back and knees and are perfect for the patio, balcony, deck or any area where a bit of planting space is desired. Place them near your kitchen door, grill or table for easy cooking and serving access. You'll be able to plant, weed and harvest with minimal bending or even from a chair.

Purchase one on wheels or add casters to the legs of your elevated garden for added mobility. Then wheel it into the sun or shade as needed each day or out of the way when you entertain.

Set the garden in place first. Once it's filled with soil, it will be very heavy and difficult to move. Those gardening on a balcony should confirm the space will hold the weight of the elevated garden you select when filled with soil and mature plants.

Make sure you have easy access to water. Since this is basically a container, you will need to check the soil moisture daily and water thoroughly as needed. Fill the elevated garden with a well-drained planting mix that holds moisture while providing needed drainage.

Incorporate a low nitrogen slow release fertilizer like Milorganite (milorganite.com) at planting. It contains 85% organic matter, feeding the plants and soil. Slow release fertilizers provide plants with needed nutrients for several months, eliminating the need for weekly fertilization.

Grow a variety of your favorite herbs and vegetables like basil, parsley, compact tomatoes, and peppers. Support vining plants or try compact ones like Mascotte compact bush bean. Add color and dress up your planter with flowers like edible nasturtiums and trailing herbs like thyme and oregano which will cascade over the edge of the planter.

Maximize your growing space by planting quick maturing vegetables like radishes, beets



and lettuce in between tomatoes, peppers, cabbage and other vegetables that take longer to reach their mature size. You'll be harvesting the short season vegetables just as the bigger plants need the space.

Further increase your garden's productivity with succession plantings. Fill vacant spaces that are left once a row or block of vegetables are harvested. Add more planting mix if needed.

Select seeds and transplants that will have time to reach maturity for harvesting before the growing season ends. Broccoli, cabbage, compact Patio Pride peas, lettuce, spinach and other greens taste best when harvested in cooler fall temperatures.

Once you discover the fun, flavor and ease of waist high gardening, you'll likely make room for more elevated planters for your future gardening endeavors.
