

#### Good Day! by Maureen Rupe Port St. John Drainage Problems

On new construction and drainage issues in Port St. John, Canaveral Groves and Windover Farms, Brevard County and District 1 Commissioner Rita Pritchett are working diligently for solutions. This is becoming a huge problem and the county has a new ordinance to implement some new policies and procedures.

I was given a copy of Brevard County's 22-48 – Lowest floor elevation and lot drainage. The first paragraph, Purpose and Intent, states the purpose of this section is to ensure new residential construction and additions to existing residential structures increasing the floor area footprint provide for drainage of surface water away from structures to protect buildings from flooding and to maintain ground stabilization for supporting foundations. Paragraph (C), Site drainage plan, required (4), The drainage plan must clearly indicate the flow direction of proposed surface water drainage and show the location(s) of surface water from the lot, and (7), The drainage plan must include the floor elevations of existing dwellings on abutting properties. Since it does

list these two sections, these sections should be enough to prevent any concern that a new house is going to flood you, his neighbor.

see with lot heights way above neighboring lots. Type A drainage, (rear to front), has to have floor elevation at least 24 inches above the crown elevation of the street. Type B drainage, (Split), has to be at least 18 inches above the crown elevation of the street. Type C drainage, (front to rear), doesn't list a minimum height, but states it has to be sufficiently high to provide flood protection. Again, although this new requirement implies it's preventing flooding your neighbor, there's nothing in these requirements preventing the lot being six feet or more above their neighbors. That's a huge difference in lot height and almost guarantees the lower lot will be flooded by the higher lot.

The new polices and procedures require sufficient infrastructure for low spots in the street and require onsite storm water retention, or French drains.

The county is requiring more maintenance when a septic is higher than a neighboring house

on a lower lot. There is a house at 6825 Grissom Parkway that has received more calls from residents concerning whether it is legal or not. The None of these sections describes issues you county is investigating and I assume they will try to assure neighbors they will not be impacted. The problem seems to be that new construction is permitted at one elevation for septic from the state, and another elevation is permitted for the building from the county.

#### **Bio-Solids: A Load of Crap**

Do not be fooled by semantics. Bio-Solids is Human Waste (excrement; defecation). Nutrients is another positive word. The state uses it for Nitrogen and Phosphorus, which may be good for plants, but sure isn't any good for our waters. Everywhere you read in the news these days, politicians keep talking septic tanks as the bane of our Indian River Lagoon. They want sewer systems repaired and expanded, forcing everyone on a septic tank onto sewer systems, or at least those close to our crucial water bodies like our springs, lakes and lagoons. Everyone keeps forgetting we still need to mitigate all the existing waste. Sewer systems don't magically turn our waste into saw dust, or anything else that is safe



for our sacred water bodies. They add chemicals to either make it a little safer, or a lot safer from a human health perspective, not necessarily safe for our surface water. We then either take it to the County Dump, or better yet, spread it across our farms, or deliver to nearby counties to spread across their farm land. Look at a map of Florida. What used to be swamps have been turned into lakes by developers. They may not look connected, but a few feet down is groundwater and groundwater does moves around.

TCPalm.com did an investigative report by Lucas Daprile on April 26, 2017, titled "Experts: Florida should sell, export human waste, not dump it on farms." It states Florida disposes of 320,000 tons of treated human waste every year, and spreads the majority across Florida farmlands, at least in 2013 (the last DEP report). The article stated Florida only exported 723 tons of Class AA waste, and even imported 20,657 tons of Class AA waste. Gary Roderick, a former DEP administrator in the Port St. Lucie office, stated nitrogen and phosphorus in human waste is not consistent, and may be off the chart levels, especially in unneeded phosphorus that easily runs off


into surface water. The trouble is, human waste bio-solids is a lot cheaper to use on Florida's farmland as chemical fertilizers cost 10 to 100 times more. According to the article, the state even imported 21,000 tons in 2013, enough to fertilize 35 square miles of Bahia grass. Florida's counties and cities have loads of this stuff and they have to get rid of it. It's much easier to ship it locally instead of spending the dollars needed to ship this high-weight product out of state, even though there are at least 33 states that have nutrient deficient soils.

reports like the one above, the Treasure Coast Regional Planning Council released a report by the same Gary Roderick as above, titled "Florida Biosolids," on December 08, 2017. The presentation doesn't have lot of text, but it did state data showed failing septic tanks were not the main source of nutrients. The presentation seemed to imply Bio-solids were doing our water bodies the most harm, and it's a lot easier and cheaper to treat the bio-solid and ship it out of state, than to clean the extra nutrients out of our surface water. The presentation gave an example of a

"Biosolid Bio-energy Omni Processor," which converts biosolids into electricity - ammonia (NH3) – water – elemental phosphorus ends up in final ash. "The Omni Processor eliminates the need for anaerobic digestion, aerobic storage ponds, composting and landfill disposal," and more than anything, eliminates the extra nitrogen and phosphorous being put into our crucial water bodies like the Indian River Lagoon. We do need to explore this option.

What is most terrible is 2013 seems to be the last year the Florida Department of Envi-Probably due to the TCPalm investigation ronmental Protection has collected and reported where our cities and counties are spreading and/ or exporting this muck. I also found there's a self-reporting Florida form, called the "Biosolids Site Self-Evaluation for Permittees," which each farm completes to say they are complying with the rules, but when they don't, fines are fairly low as they are for most environmental violations. There has been talk about increasing fines, at least for municipality sewage spills, but with Florida, I'll believe it when I see it. Florida is not known for large fines when it comes to

environmental protection. Even with human health, like restaurant inspections, the state has had a hands off approach, not even ensuring state inspections are completed regularly, until there's an accident where people die and/or a lot of sick people are involved.

#### **Water Quality Matters**

I read an Opinion editorial in the Orlando Sentinel on Nov. 11/2018; "Red Tides: an unwelcome reminder that water quality matters," by James Gianttina, a member of the Environmental Protection Network, and formerly the Water Protection Division Director for Environmental Protection Agency's Southeast Regional Office in Atlanta, Georgia. He reminded everyone Florida has some very beautiful beaches and if we lose these, a lot of people probably won't return. The recent red tide is a reminder that water quality matters. James Gianttina stated this is an especially troubling time and that, "The Trump Administration seeks to weaken federal protections guaranteed under the Clean Water Act by narrowly defining 'waters of the United States'." Excess nutrients are contributing to much of www.sun-sentinel.com/opinion/editorials/fl-opthis algae. "At the same time this Administration is considering changes to federal law that would remove many wetlands and small streams from protection – the very waters that play an important role in filtering nutrient pollution and protecting downstream waters."

Florida has wetland mitigation laws to move wetlands from areas they want to develop and allow developers to buy wetlands in areas that people don't want to develop. It takes away the filtering wetlands from where it protects the Indian River Lagoon, for example, and buys land in a mitigation bank that restores or saves a wetland in some adjoining county. We lose the wetland benefits here but save them someplace else. There's a lot of debate on wetland mitigation banks, but there's also a problem with what's happening in

Central Florida. They connect all the wetlands and lakes, as it moves water to the south, where it eventually runs into Lake Okeechobee, which is becoming a huge algae pit.

We haven't seemed to learn from our misdeeds and I'm wondering if we ever will.

#### Out On The Town GG's Roots

We have a new place to eat in Port St. John. Located right up front in the same small strip mall as Discount Beverage is GG's Roots. GG's is authentic Puerto Rican cuisine. And how do I know that? I asked my Puerto Rican co-workers and they said so.

In fact, Louie told me that the dishes reminded him of his family's cooking back in Puerto Rico and the Pernil Roasted Pork tasted just like what his grandfather used to cook. With all these praising accolades, I had to try this place for myself. Besides, I'm always looking for something a little different to break up the monotony of the same ol', same ol'.

My wife and I arrived and couldn't decide what we wanted, probably because we really didn't know Puerto Rican cuisine. The staff at GG's is exceptionally friendly and took the time to explain what each dish was. Even after that, we still couldn't decide because we wanted to try everything.

GG's has basically 2 prices; small and large. A small platter is \$6.95 and comes with 1 meat and a side, the large platter is \$8.95 and comes with 1 meat and 2 sides. My wife got the roasted chicken, yaca cassava, rice and beans, and an empanada. I got the Pernil Roasted Pork, vegetable medley, rice and beans, and an empanada.

Everything was very tasty and the portions were large. We really enjoyed the empanadas and the Habichuelas (red beans over rice). The chicken had a very good unique flavor, but the pulled pork (Pernil Roasted Pork) was out of this world. I've eaten a lot of pulled pork in my lifetime, but this pork had a whole different flavor. Not only did it have great flavor, it was moist and juicy. In fact, I liked it so much, I may call them up to see if I can get a few pounds of the pork to go.

GG's is also an ice cream shop. They offer hand dipped ice cream, cones, malts, milkshakes, sundaes, floats and more.

#### **Monthly Tax Update**

The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has reminded employers and other businesses of the January 31st filing deadline that now applies to filing wage statements (W-2's) and independent contractor forms (1099-Misc's) with the government. These forms need to be filed with the Social Security Administration and mailed to the recipients by January 31st. This deadline makes it easier for the IRS to verify income individuals report on their tax returns and helps prevent fraud. Failure to file these forms correctly and timely may result in penalties. In the past, these penalties have not been issued, but this is changing. One of our clients has been penalized over \$3,000 for being one day late. You are also urged to take advantage of the accuracy, speed and convenience of filing these forms electronically the day before they are due. You should start at the beginning of December to verify current and terminated employees' information. This includes names, addresses, Social Security or individual taxpayer identification numbers. Also, be sure to verify your own information is correct and active with the Social Security Administration before January.

Don't forget, if paper Forms W-2 are going to be used, then you should order early. If you think an extension of time may be needed to file, it's no longer automatic. The IRS will only grant extensions for very specific reasons.

Now, when getting prepared for the new year, remember to evaluate if you are an eligible tax-payer who may now deduct up to 20% of certain business income from domestic businesses operated as sole proprietorships or through partnerships, S corporations, trusts and estates. The deduction may also be claimed on certain dividends. Eligible taxpayers can claim the deduction for the first time on the 2018 federal income tax return they file in 2019. This provision is the result of tax reform legislation passed in December, 2017.

Here are some other things business owners should know about this deduction: The deduction applies to Qualified Business Income. Qualified Business Income is the net amount of qualified items of income, gain, deduction and loss connected to a qualified U.S. trade or business. Only items included in taxable income are counted. The deduction is available to eligible taxpayers, whether they itemize their deductions on Schedule A or take the standard deduction. The

deduction is generally equal to the lesser of these two amounts: 1) 20% of qualified business income plus 20 percent of qualified real estate investment trust dividends and qualified publicly traded partnership income or 2) 20% of taxable income computed before the qualified business income deduction minus net capital gains. Eligible taxpayers require taxable income computed before the qualified business income deduction not exceeding \$315,000 for a married couple filing a joint return, or \$157,500 for all other taxpayers, the deduction may be subject to additional limitations or exceptions. These are based on the type of trade or business, the taxpayer's taxable income, the amount of W-2 wages paid by the qualified trade or business, and the unadjusted basis immediately after acquisition of qualified property held by the trade or business. Note: Income earned in a C corporation or by providing services as an employee is not eligible for the deduction.

Now, let's turn to 2019 tax changes. The standard deduction for married filing jointly rises to \$24,400, up \$400 from the prior year. For single taxpayers and married individuals filing separately, the standard deduction rises to \$12,200, up \$200, and for heads of households, the standard deduction will be \$18,350, up \$350. The personal exemption for tax year 2019 remains at 0, since, this was eliminated. And the, the foreign earned income exclusion is \$105,900, up from \$103,900. The annual exclusion for gifts remains at \$15,000.

It has been a great 2018 and there is so much in our lives to be thankful. A special thank you to all the men and women who have served our refurbishment facility. This \$60 million facility great nation in the military.

I appreciate your support as we continue to gain momentum in this season of growth. We certainly are enjoying economic recovery in Brevard County.

#### Let's Talk – Space

We have worked hard to diversify our industries, but in light of this, the space presence in our community is totally awesome. It is wonderful to live on the Space Coast and be a part of the North Brevard projects are underway, which history and future of space exploration.

NASA informed us that there are four companies building manned space vehicles: SpaceX, Boeing, Lockheed Martin and Blue Origin, right here in our backyard. SpaceX plans to launch every 13 days and will be launching a manned flight in March/April of 2019, followed by Boeing. The smile has not left my face.

Astro Pak facility on Grissom Parkway has completed reconstruction on their 38,000 square foot building. This facility will enable them to create 17 new jobs once it is fully operational.

In addition to Blue Origin's 750,000 square foot New Glenn rocket assembly facility, they plan to build an additional rocket testing and will be on the same lot as their current rocket facility and will be the second largest building in Exploration Park. Blue Origin anticipates creating approximately 50 new jobs. Blue Origin has recently been selected by United Launch Alliance to provide the main engine for its next generation Vulcan launch vehicle.

#### **Let's Talk - Environment**

Lagoon: Our ½ cent sales tax is at work and are in Canaveral Groves, Cocoa, Mims, Port St. John, Scottsmoor and Titusville. Projects include Living Shorelines (oyster beds), muck removal, septic to sewer conversions, numerous baffle boxes and storm water projects. The Osprey Water Reclamation Facility in Titusville received an \$8,000,000 nutrient removal upgrade from the lagoon funds. This project will significantly improve the removal of nutrients (nitrogen) from reclaimed water, which in turn will reduce the amount of nitrogen passed from ground water into the lagoon. Many lagoon projects are still

in the beginning stages. Don't forget, each of us can help in this effort by watching what we put in our water. Don't fertilize in the summer when there is the highest rain, pick up after your dogs and do not wash grass clippings into storm drains. Again, I am so proud of Brevard County and the great efforts to clean up our lagoon. We are the only county making a significant financial contribution toward this effort.

Nature: The north side of our causeway is a critical destination for spawning Horseshoe Crabs. As hard-armoring of the Indian River Lagoon's shoreline increases, sandy beaches will become ever more important for the survival of these ancient arthropods, which are among the oldest living creatures on earth. Good news... the county is submitting an application for Tourist plus Lagoon Grant Funds to conduct a feasibility study for shoreline stabilization in this area.

Our 22nd Annual Space Coast Birding and Wildlife Festival will be held January 23 – 28, 2019 at Eastern Florida State College North Campus in Titusville. This festival proudly hosts over 2,000 tourists in our community for a total economic impact for our area of \$957,124.00. Please make these Birders feel welcome in our

Solar News: In March the Brevard County Commissioners voted to waive permit fees for homeowners who install solar power generation equipment. This could save homeowners an average of \$175.00 per project.

#### Let's Talk - Economy

In our last news update we looked back at where we had been and how far along we had come since the economic downturn. As 2018 comes to a close, we can be thankful for the 9% growth in property values and 53% increase in new construction throughout Brevard County. A monumental increase in commercial property values was here in North Brevard. All of the 16 cities and towns in unincorporated Brevard County witnessed taxable values increase. The increases in taxable value and new construction will translate into a broader tax base and hopefully lower the burden on homeowners. Taxes for the second year in a row have remained stable. The Commissioners have been dedicated to keeping taxes low.

Last year the County exceeded the goal of resurfacing 55 miles of roads and was able to resurface 64.2 miles countywide. 14.7 of those

miles were in North Brevard. With the current budget, the goal this year is to resurface 61 miles countywide and 13.85 in North Brevard.

#### PMC Using New Impella CP Heart Pump<sup>TM</sup>

Parrish Medical Center is now using the new, minimally invasive technology called the Impella CP Heart Pump<sup>TM</sup>. The medical device was first used by PMC's Cardiovascular team in August to reopen blocked coronary arteries of a patient who had suffered three heart attacks while in route to the emergency department. #### **New Guinea Flatworm**

First it was pythons, then iguanas -- now, something else is invading the Sunshine State. It's called a New Guinea flatworm, and the Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission said it is so concerned about its spread that there's a New Guinea flatworm hotline.

The creature has already made its way into Central Florida. If you see one, authorities say don't touch it. This creature could make you very sick. A University of Florida report said not only are they an invasive species that can cause real environmental damage, but they also are known to carry a parasite called rat lungworm that can cause a form of meningitis in humans. They issued the following statement: "This flatworm produces toxic secretions that may trigger an allergic reaction in some people."

Already, there have been 17 reports of flatworms in Indian River County, just a few miles from Grant, and they've been spreading in South Florida for a couple of years now. They're often found in landscaping and plant pots.

UF researchers advise that the best way to kill the two-inch worms, which can reproduce without a mate, is to pour boiling water on them.
