

Good Day! by Maureen Rupe Indian River Lagoon Timeline: It is going to take a long time to fix it

I found a 2013 Treasure Coast article by Staff Report, titled "A timeline of the Indian River Lagoon crisis." It made me realize how long the problem has been with us, and it's not going to be fixed in a year or two. I'm not copying all of it, only what pertains to Brevard. On request, I will send the article in its entirety.

"1980s

April 17, 1985: About 100 gallons of processed sludge leaked into the Indian River Lagoon when a pump failed at the Fort Pierce Utilities Authority Wastewater Treatment Plant.

Dec. 3, 1986: Indian River Lagoon cleanup under study by various environmental agencies and municipalities.

July 22, 1989: One of Florida's leading environmentalists wrote to the state Department of Natural Resources to oppose a plan that would allow the construction of marinas over sea grass in part of the Indian River Lagoon.

Sept. 6, 1989: South Florida Water Management District officials said at a public hearing they will develop long-range programs to monitor water quality and come up with proposals to save the lagoon.

1990s

April 21, 1990: President George H.W. Bush announces the Indian River Lagoon has been added to the National Estuary Program, marking a major victory for local environmentalists trying to preserve the estuary.

Aug. 17, 1990: A new state law promises to stop the discharge of treated sewage into the Indian River Lagoon basin by July 1, 1995. (This was legal for a number of cities in the lagoon).

Jan. 9, 1993: A malfunction at a Fort Pierce Utilities pump station causes 40,000 gallons of untreated sewage to pour into the Indian River Lagoon, but utilities officials say the spill created no health risks.

Jan 6, 1994: Designating the Indian River Lagoon off-limits for sewage discharge by boaters will help in cleanup and improvements of the waterway, said the management committee of the Indian River Lagoon of the National Estuary Program.

March 25, 1994: Florida House of Representa-

tives OKs waterway cleanup proposal because of sewage in Florida waters.

April 9, 1994: State officials approve a license plate that will show a snook and cost an extra \$15, which will pay for cleanup of the lagoon.

Aug 8, 1994: The Fort Pierce municipal sewage treatment plant is scheduled to stop pumping effluent into the river and instead begin pumping it into the city's deep well injection system.

July 16, 1995: River water quality is poor in Indian River County, possibly due to runoff from the land and creeks, use of septic tanks in some areas and stormwater runoff carrying grease, oil, heavy metals, pesticides and herbicides straight into the lagoon.

Aug. 29, 1996: Too much nitrogen is entering the Indian River Lagoon water because of fertilizers, dying vegetation and sewer discharge promoting algae growth.

Sept. 2, 1996: An algae bloom is suspected in fish kills in the Indian River Lagoon near Sebastian because residents reported dead fish in reddish-colored water.

Oct. 19, 1996: A kidney virus causes a speciesspecific fish kill; samples reveal hemorrhaged

fins, inflamed kidneys, spleens, livers and lesions, but researchers do not know what caused the virus.

Dec. 12, 1996: The Corps advances a St. Lucie ooze study because muck depletes oxygen in water and may help restore the Indian River Lagoon.

April 6, 1998: River cleanup proves complex because responsibility flows through many agencies.

April 20, 1998: The Department of Environmental Protection investigates the fish kill in St. Lucie County; it isn't known whether it is related to the recent epidemic of sick fish in the St. Lucie River and the Indian River Lagoon.

Oct. 2, 1998: Lesion-covered fish continue to region. show up in area waters because of a combination of excess freshwater and low levels of light can severely damage marine life in the St. Lucie River and Indian River Lagoon.

2000s

June 3, 2000: Water samples taken from the Indian River Lagoon show the lowest levels of oxygen in the past 10 years, making conditions ripe for a massive fish kill, the director of the Marine Resources Council says.

Oct. 17, 2000: The Indian River Lagoon bounces back from previous damage caused by sewage effluent running into the waterway. Legislation outlawing sewage discharge was passed in 1994 and all public utilities were to be compliant by 1997.

We must thank the voters of Brevard for the tax to save the Lagoon, but as we have polluted the Indian River Lagoon for many years, we must now be patient. Beach Access Denied to the Public?

The Beach Access Law, House Bill 631. signed by Rick Scott, has the attention of beachgoers, as it could give rights to property owners who built on the beach, limiting or even denying access to the public. First, what entity decided the beach could be bought? It doesn't make sense.

Even wise words from the Bible state you should the United States Constitution. The ordinance not be building your house on sand.

I'm sure money was the basis of this stupidity. The Florida Constitution Article X, §11 reads: "Sovereignty lands. The title to lands under navigable waters, within the boundaries of the state, which have not been alienated, including beaches below mean high water lines, is held by the state, by virtue of its sovereignty, in trust for all the people. Sale of such lands may be authorized by law, but only when in the public interest. Private use of portions of such lands may be authorized by law, but only when not contrary to the public interest.

What does this mean? They say wet sand is public and dry sand belongs to the property owner. Local governments have permitted, collected impact fees and real estate taxes, so apparently this is now private property.

We also have the Bert Harris Act. This act may be cited as the "Private Property Rights Protection Act." The state determined that some laws, regulations and ordinances may burden, restrict or limit private property rights without amounting to a taking under the State Constitution or

says if it can be shown, the property owner can ask for relief, or payment of compensation. Environmentalists have lost many battles when property owners have said an environmental rule has caused undue burden.

Under the current law, if a "beach owner" wanted to deny access to the public, it could be the courts giving the rights to be owner. If approved, how on earth would this be enforced? Would the owner call the police every time someone walked on the property? It's going to be a busy time for law enforcement. I guess they will have to hire beach cops.

In Britain, where I was born and raised, all beaches are owned by the Department of Defense and all have public access. Our forefathers didn't give out property rights to our beaches. They were a bit smarter than in our current times.

On the other side, should we be required to pay for sand renourishment? Should we be required to subsidize for beach property insurance? Or is the property owner going to sue us for not paying for either of these through the Bert Harris Act.

Commissioner Tobia an Environmentalist?

I reviewed Commissioner Tobia's record of Environmentalism while serving on the Florida House of Representatives. Commissioner Tobia voted for fracking in Florida. While with the County as a Commissioner, he wanted libraries and parks downsized to pay for his roads. This was during the same time they still had a ban on impact fees on developments, which has been in place since 2008. Since that time, infrastructure is paid for by county taxpayers.

Just reviewing his state and county record, it's easy to see Commissioner Tobia is not an environmentalist. The recent controversy on

Monthly Tax Update

You either filed your taxes on time or filed an extension and owe taxes. It's not unusual for taxpayers who owe taxes to file an extension to prevent collections from beginning. However, it may be of interest that the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) offers several payment options. Here are some key points to keep in mind.

Never send cash. Electronic payment options are the quickest and easiest way to pay your tax. Check out IRS Direct Pay or EFTPS to pay directly from your bank account. It's secure and free. You'll get instant confirmation that you have submitted your payment.

You can pay taxes electronically 24/7 on IRS. gov. Just click on the payments tab near the top left on the home page. If you filed an extension, you may be able to pay through your tax software when you file the return.

Another method is to choose the option to pay with a credit or debit card. This is accomplished by going to the irs.gov website and be advised that the company processing your payment will charge a processing fee. You may be able to deduct the credit or debit card processing fee on next year's return. It's claimed on Schedule A, Itemized Deductions.

You may enroll in the Electronic Federal Tax Payment System (EFTPS). The EFTPS method permits you to pay your federal taxes electronically. You have a choice to pay using the internet, or by phone using the EFTPS Voice Response System.

If you can't pay electronically, you can still pay by a personal check, cashier's check, or money order. Make it payable to the "United States Treasury." Be sure your name, address

and daytime phone number appear on the front call one of the scammer advertising entities that of your payment. Also, write the tax year, Form 1040, and your Social Security number in the memo section of the check. Use the social security number shown first if it's a joint return payment.

You will also send a completed Form 1040-V payment voucher in the envelope with your payment or mail it with your tax return the IRS. Make sure you send them to the correct address listed in the instructions for the Form 1040-V. This will help the IRS process your payment and post it to your account correctly. You can get the form on IRS.gov/forms at any time.

If you can't pay your tax in full, the IRS urges you to still file your tax return on time. You should pay as much as you can with your tax return. This will help keep your penalty and interest costs down. If the amount you owe is more than you can pay in full, then establish an installment agreement which will allow you to pay the balance overtime. There will be a processing fee, charged by IRS, when you establish this arrangement. There is an Online Payment Agreement tool on IRS.gov that makes it a real easy way to apply if the amount due is under \$50,000.

Finally, if the amount is more than you can handle and you know there isn't any way that

will charge you unbelievable fees and never settle the debt. I would advise you to determine if an Offer in Compromise is possible first. You can go to the website "http://irs.treasury.gov/ oic pre qualifier/" to determine if an Offer in Compromise is possible. If you find you fall within the parameters, I recommend you to seek the assistance of a local Enrolled Agent, Certified Public Accountant, or an attorney to prepare the documentation and settle the debt. Steer away from the "We can reduce your tax liability" nationwide advertising solicitors due to excessive billing techniques.

A Step by Step Guide to a Healthy Heart



What you can do
daily, weekly,

to have a healthy lifestyle



eart disease claims the lives of 2,150 Americans every day, making it the No. 1 killer in the United States.

But along with that sobering statistic comes encouraging news: The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimates that a quarter of deaths related to heart disease and stroke are preventable.

Knowing your risk factors and getting them under control, can play a major role in preventing heart disease. Yet even if you know that making lifestyle changes can improve your heart, taking action can feel overwhelming. We're here to help you improve heart health, one step at a time.

To do: Daily

Follow a healthy diet: A diet high in saturated fats and trans fats (common in fast food) has been linked to an increased incidence of heart disease.

"When you change your diet, you affect your blood sugar, cholesterol levels and blood pressure," says Shelly Radford, clinical coordinator of Parrish Medical Center's Cardiac and Pulmonary Rehabilitation. "If you're eating too many high-carb, high-sugar foods, you also increase your risk of type 2 diabetes, which is a risk factor for heart disease."

To reduce your risk, Radford suggests eating fruits, vegetables, whole grains and fish instead of processed foods, high-fat foods and sugar-sweetened drinks.

Avoid secondhand smoke: Smoking is a major risk factor for heart disease. If you're still lighting up, talk to your doctor about smoking cessation programs to kick the habit. Secondhand smoke also puts you at risk. In fact, nonsmokers who are exposed to secondhand smoke are up to 30 percent more likely to develop heart disease.

Reduce stress: Stress levels in overdrive can affect your heart health.

Stress hormones increase inflammation, destabilize plaque in the arteries, damage blood vessels, increase blood pressure and, in extreme cases, trigger a heart attack, according to Radford.

"Chronic and acute stress are both bad for our bodies," she says.

Find an effective stress management technique like deep breathing, exercise, yoga, meditation, reading or playing fetch with your dog.

To do: Weekly

Work up a sweat: Exercise is essential for reducing the risk of heart disease.

In addition to helping you maintain a healthy weight, exercise minimizes the likelihood of developing other conditions like high blood pressure, high cholesterol and diabetes, which raise the risk of developing heart disease.

Experts recommend exercising for at least 30 minutes five days per week. Aim for moderate-intensity exercise, which Radford describes as "activity that increases your temperature, causes a bit of perspiration and makes it a bit difficult to carry on a conversation."

Jogging, swimming, biking, brisk walking, and aerobics or dance classes are moderate-intensity activities. If squeezing in a 30-minute workout feels daunting, set a goal to do at least 10 minutes of heart-pumping exercise three times per day.

To do: Monthly

Check your blood pressure: High blood pressure damages the walls of the arteries, causing them to trap more plaque. The damage increases the risk of narrowing and hardening of the arteries, along with developing blood clots.

Your blood pressure reading consists of two numbers: the systolic pressure (the top number) and the diastolic pressure (the bottom number). A normal blood pressure reading is 119/79 or lower, while 140/90 or higher is considered high.

If you have high blood pressure or are at risk for heart disease, regular monitoring is essential.

Refill medications: If lifestyle changes are not enough to reduce your risk of heart disease, your doctor may prescribe medications. Radford says it's important to be "consistent and compliant" about taking prescriptions, such as beta blockers, anticoagulant and antiplatelet medications, ACE inhibitors, and statins. "Drug therapy can play a critical role in reducing your risk," Radford says.

Every month, check your medications and call the doctor or the pharmacy when it's time for a refill.

To do: Yearly

Schedule an annual exam: Your healthcare team plays an important role in creating a treatment plan that reduces your risk of heart disease.

During an annual checkup, your doctor will ask about your family history, assess your risk factors for heart disease and perform a complete medical examination. In addition to blood pressure, your doctor may also measure your cholesterol and triglyceride levels. Medication and lifestyle changes can control elevated levels, helping to reduce your risk of heart disease.

Parrish Medical Center Cancer Program Reaccredited

Parrish Medical Center (PMC) has extended its streak as the area's longest continually accredited cancer program by again earning certification from the American College of Surgeons Commission on Cancer (CoC). The PMC program, first accredited in 1989, is one of only two CoCrecognized programs in Brevard County.

PMC's already-accredited cancer treatment program expanded to even broader patient care dimensions and services in 2016 when PMC and OMNI Healthcare, Brevard's only physicianowned and managed multispecialty group, partnered in Titusville to open the Parrish Cancer Network, also works with Mayo Clinic to bring Center.

To earn CoC accreditation—denoting quality assurance based on American College of Surgeons' standards—a cancer program must voluntarily meet 34 CoC care quality standards, be evaluated every three years, and maintain levels of excellence in patient-centered care.

George Mikitarian, PMC president and CEO, said that accreditation sends to patients and families an important message about our commitment to quality care.

"They can have confidence – particularly in the demonstrated excellence over three decades - in the objective measurement, accomplishment, and results of PMC's cancer treatment program," Mikitarian said. "It's all part of our PMC vision: healing families, healing communities."

She informed me that Scoops has salads, hot On April 5 of this year I had the honor of dogs, tacos and subs, besides ice cream. So, off to Scoops I go for a review.

> As small as the place is, they have an extensive menu. The clerk was right. Not only do they have old fashioned hand dipped ice cream and sherbet, they have soft serve ice cream, hot dogs, salads, nachos, soups, subs, hot subs and wraps. They have over 30 flavors of hand dipped ice cream and all their subs are made with Boar's

> On two different visits we tried; a combo sub, a Cuban sub, 2 salads, one large grilled chicken salad and a taco salad, a few tacos and ice cream for desert (a hand dip and a soft serve cone).

> The grilled chicken salad was large and had plenty of meat, but really nothing to brag about since it used iceberg lettuce. Maybe some romaine would have improved it considerably. The Taco salad came with what tasted like salsa out of the jar and the tacos came with salsa in condiment packs. Some freshly made salsa would be nice. Maybe the Mexican food should be left to the Mexican restaurants.

> Now for the best part; their subs are fantastic! The combo sub was loaded with meat and so was the Cuban. In fact, The Cuban was one of the best Cuban subs I've ever had. It came pressed and warm with the traditional pickles.

> The hand dipped ice cream is probably their other specialty besides subs, a good high-quality ice cream. The soft serve was good but tasted more like ice milk than ice cream. In my opinion, if you want hand dipped ice cream or a great sub, Scoops is the place.

NovusAGENDA Provides Full Access to County Meeting Agendas

A new process implemented at the Brevard County Government Center will provide visitors to Board of County Commissioners' meetings full and indepth access to meeting agendas and the supporting documents on items under consideration, debate and potential approval.

A four-member Lean Six Sigma Agenda Development Process team made up of County employees was chartered to significantly reduce the amount of paper, time and staff resources expended during the agenda development process. After months of preparation, the team selected the NovusAGENDA software solution, a cloud-based application and database.

Agendas, individual items, attachments and background documents are available to citizens online at www.BrevardFL.gov/OnlineAgendas.

Agendas can run anywhere from two to eight pages or more, but add to that the extensive background documents on particular items of legislation, along with maps, diagrams, photos and other data and it becomes the equivalent of lugging around a file cabinet. From a general public standpoint, printed agendas are made available to those who attend board meetings, yet those do not include the more extensive background items that Commissioners have at their fingertips. While BOCC agendas posted on the County website do include those background materials, until the redesign and implementation of NovusAGENDA, they were not readily accessible on mobile devices to those attending board meetings.

For citizens who attend BOCC meetings, a kiosk has been setup in the lobby outside Board Chambers, located on the First Floor of Building C at the Government Center in Viera, that will provide finger-touch opportunity to review the agenda and look up particular items and background materials. Additionally, the agenda can be downloaded to a mobile device to follow electronically during the meeting.

NovusAGENDA is an application that's being used or implemented in other counties and municipalities throughout Central Florida. It saves money; it saves paper; it saves trees.

Recreational Red Snapper Season

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) and Gov. Rick Scott are excited to announce a 40-day recreational red snapper season for both Gulf state and federal waters.

"Florida is a premier fishing destination and saltwater fishing in the Gulf of Mexico has a

\$7.6 billion economic impact in our state every year," said Gov. Rick Scott. "Adding additional opportunities for anglers to enjoy Florida's world-class fishing not only benefits our visitors but also our Gulf Coast communities. I am pleased to announce this extension today, and encourage visitors and residents to start planning their summer fishing trips."

Other Gulf states set longer seasons than what Florida had initially proposed. FWC worked collaboratively with NOAA Fisheries to come up with a season that would provide access to all of those that choose Florida as their fishing destination.

Florida will be setting the season in 2018 and 2019 in both state and federal waters through a fishery-management pilot program (also referred to as an Exempted Fishing Permit). The 2018 proposed season would open June 11 and close July 21.

This recreational season will include those fishing for red snapper from private recreational vessels. For-hire operations that do not have a federal reef fish permit are also included but more information, see plenti.com. are limited to targeting reef fish in Gulf state waters only. This Exempted Fishing Permit will not apply to commercial fishermen or for-hire operations with a valid federal reef fish permit.

Shred Event

PLENTi Program Is Ending

The Plenti program will end on July 10, 2018. At that time, any unredeemed Plenti points will expire. You should use your Plenti points by July 10, 2018. Here are a few important things you should know:

Earning Plenti Points

• You can continue to earn points on eligible purchases at participating Exxon and Mobil gas stations and BI-LO, Fresco y Más, Harveys, and Winn-Dixie supermarkets through July 10, 2018.

Using Plenti Points

- You can use points for savings on eligible purchases at Macy's and participating Chili's restaurants through May 3, 2018.
