Good Day! by Maureen Rupe New High Tech Uses of Bio-solids

As I have mentioned many times in the past, sewage plants are not as good as some politicians imply. The leftover biosolids after treatment may contain pathogens (Class B) or may not (Class AA). Class B biosolids are spread in designated areas (like the west end of Ranch Road in Port St. John), or with Class AA, treatment plants spread it by liquid (reclaimed water) around our cities, and it gets sold to farmers to spread on their ranches. They don't even have to track where they spread it. Hopefully it's not close to our rivers, lakes and lagoons.

As our Florida's waters are becoming overrun by algae throughout the state, the government is starting to listen to the residents, but only just. They are now talking about setting up rules for where these bio-solids are put. There's even talk of shipping it to other states that are nutrient deficient, like Nevada.

What I don't understand is why are we just moving the problem to someone else? In Brevard County, the County Commission set up a ban that only applies to new application requests. That sounds great, but as there are so many application requests already approved and in place, the ban is essentially eye candy that only makes folks feel like something was accomplished. It wasn't.

What we need is thinking outside the box. We can't just move our problems to someone else. We need high tech solutions. What are the other solutions people are trying?

Construction:

The construction industry is carrying out various studies to use biosolids for construction. An article by Lisa McDonald found on The American Ceramic Society titled, "Do the environment a (bio)solid—use bio-bricks!" told about one option using biosolids to make bricks.

About 1,500 billion bricks are made every year around the world. "More than 3 billion cubic metres of clay soil is dug up each year for the global brickmaking industry," Abbas Mohajerani, lead investigator and associate professor in RMIT's School of Engineering, says in an RMIT University news release. "Using biosolids in bricks could be the solution to these big environmental challenges."

It was found that bricks made with biosolids

had more insulation abilities, another benefit. They even found they could use all biosolids in the world by using them just in building bricks.

"Based on the results found in this comprehensive study, this paper proposes the inclusion of a minimum of 15% biosolids content into 15% of brick production in order to completely recycle all the approximately 5 million tons of annual leftover biosolids production in Australia, New Zealand, the EU, the USA and Canada."

A Technical Paper on the American Society of Civil Engineers by A. Arulrajah, M. M. Disfani, V. Suthagaran and M. W. Botitled Laboratory Evaluation of the "Geotechnical Characteristics of Wastewater Biosolids in Road Embankments" told about another study testing the use for road embankments, but it was found at least untreated biosolids didn't have sufficient bearing capacity to use as a fill material unless it was mixed with an additive or a high-quality material to enable it as an engineering fill material. They also found special protection would have to be done to prevent leaching of contaminants such as nitrogen, phosphorus and total organic carbon, especially near water bodies. An article by



Associate Professor Kartini Kamaruddin on the Research Management Institute RMI website titled, "Turning Sewage Sludge into Concrete," told about research in Malaysia where they found biosolids could be used as partial replacement for concrete. They dried and ground biosolids into powder and added the powder to concrete in various quantities such as 3%, 5% 7%, 10% and 15%. It did show more resistance to salt, but unfortunately, they found both water absorption and water permeability increased as percentage increased.

A paper prepared by Goce Vasileski and published by the Canadian Water and Wastewater Association told of a project in Japan where the paper stated, "Where Eco-cement is a new type of Portland cement being developed not Everett restored 1.25 acres of land to its previonly to solve the municipal and industrial waste problem caused by limited availability of landfill sites, but also to contribute to the protection of the environment by providing a complete recycling system of wastes that would otherwise be dumped. This new cement is designed to use municipal waste incinerator ash as up to 50% of

main components as normal Portland cement and process a complete recycle system for municipal and industrial wastes. The recently constructed Eco-cement plant, in Ichihara, Japan, will use incinerator ash from 26 cities and municipalities, and has a production capacity of about 350 metric tons per day using the Eco-cement process."

Land and Mine Reclamation

The Canadian Water and Wastewater Association paper covered a number of areas for land and mine reclaimation. In King County, Washington, the paper stated, "The Mountains to Sound Greenway Trust applied GroCo biosolids compost to revegetate scars in logging roads in the foothills reclaimed water, but that seems to be the way of the Cascade Mountains."

In Everett, Washington, it stated, "the City of ous wetland characteristics by using biosolids, biosolids compost and yard debris compost. The nutrient-rich organic material provided an excellent growth medium for native wetland plant species while stabilizing slopes." I hope it was treated to at least Class AA.

In Palmerton, Pennsylvania, two smelters raw materials. Eco-cement consists of the same have produced zinc and other products since

1898. There were 33 million tons of residuals at this Palmerton Superfund site. Due to the emissions, there were over 2,000 acres of lost vegetation. Metal levels were so high it stopped all microbial action in the soil, which left a wasteland.

Energy Recovery

The same Canadian Water and Wastewater Association also discussed many other aspects of using biosolids. Many of the ideas are the same old ideas we are using now, such as spreading on agriculture land and even human agriculture, I assume being more higher grade Class AA and Florida is using it, so I'm not going into these areas.

But I will go into Energy Recovery, first by Incineration. In Abby Wood, United Kingdom, they have a Sludge Powered Generator by Thames Water which has been generating power since 1998. The Sludge Power Generator can produce up to 5 Megawatts – about ³/₄ of the site's electricity requirements. The generator is started with natural gas burners, and once the

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

Water and Electricity:

A Science Times April 30, 2019 article by Diwakar Methil titled, "Turning Sewage into Drinking Water" tells us about the Bill Gates Foundation's 2015 investment behind the Janicki Omniprocessor. The Janicki Omniprocessor, built by a Washington state company called Janicki Bioenergy, changes human waste into clean, drinkable water and electricity; enough electricity to run the Janicki Omniprocessor plus enough to send electricity back to the grid. In developing countries, it's pretty much a miracle.

According to a few articles, they stated, "Today at least 2 billion people use latrines that aren't properly drained, and diseases caused by poor sanitation kill some 700,000 children every year." This is both a water plant and a sewer plant. It even generates electricity, so it's three plants in one. In space, astronauts do the same, and even if you don't want to use it for drinking, the



water can be used for bathing, washing, or even biomaterials/do-the-environment-a-biosolidwatering our plants.

I found a Treasure Coast TCPalm.com article by Lucas Daprile, titled, "Janicki Bioenergy tries to sell Florida on drinking water from wastewater," where it stated that back in 2017, "Janicki's scouts have met with officials from DEP. Florida Gov. Rick Scott's office. Miami-Dade Water and Sewer Department, Village of Wellington and Royal Caribbean Cruise Lines, according to sales official Greg Akers. None have signed a contract, but Akers said it's an educational process.

According to the article, the plant is approximately three-quarters the size of a professional basketball court and can cost between \$3 million and \$19 million, depending on the processing capacity. Based on a plant handling 10 tons of dry sewage a day, it would take 88 plants to process all human waste generated in 2013.

Due to climate change and humans continually contaminating our ground water, it's not going to take too many more years before we need all the extra clean water we can get.

Monthly Tax Update

Tax filing deadlines have now passed. This means in a couple of months everyone will need to evaluate if filing a tax return is required or not. Yes, most of us do, but some of us have special circumstances where a decision to file is required. Here are a couple of reasons you should file:

- You, your spouse or dependents received advance payments of the Marketplace health insurance premium tax credit to help cover medical insurance premiums. A tax return must be filed to reconcile these amounts.

- If you are an independent contractor and you made, after expenses, at least \$400 from self-employment income. While you might not technically have made enough to require filing for withholding taxes, you still have to file in order to pay the self-employment (SE) tax on these independent earnings. The tax due here, calculated on Schedule SE, is the self-employed person's version of the payroll taxes going towards your Social Security and Medicare, aka FICA.

- Not all of your tips earned were reported to the employer. You will need to file a return and to pay the SE tax on those gratuities. The same SE tax is due just as if you received a paycheck, but the employer didn't withhold the FICA taxes.

- If you had Federal income tax withheld and no tax is due, which would result in a refund. The only way to get any of this excess money back as a refund is to file a Form 1040.

- You qualify for the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC). This tax break for lower- and middle-income workers is, as the name says, a credit, which means it reduces any tax you owe dollar-for-dollar. It's also a refundable credit, meaning you can get a tax refund even if you don't owe any tax.

- You qualify for the refundable portion of the child tax credit (CTC). Like the EITC, this additional CTC means you could get money back—as much as \$1,400—even if you do not owe any tax.

You qualify for the American opportunity tax credit. This educational tax break would give you a credit of up to \$2,500 and a portion of it - up to \$1,000—is refundable to some qualifying filers.

- You received a Form 1099-B, Proceeds from Broker and Barter Exchange Transactions. Even if you are not required to file a return, if you

received this document (or substitute statement) you might want to file a return. Especially if the cost (or basis) of the sold items is not reported to the IRS. All they will see is the sale price and you'll need to provide how much you paid for the capital asset and when it was purchased.

- And the most important reason to file a return is to start the audit statute of limitations clock ticking. IRS generally can go back three years to tions and support in a welcoming environment. look at your old tax filings. This three year look back period doesn't start until you file your tax return. So, even if you didn't make quite enough to trigger the filing requirement, you might want to make sure the IRS cannot come back to ask IRS. PMC Primary Stroke Center Re-certified

Parrish Medical Center (PMC) has earned The Joint Commission's Gold Seal of Approval® and the American Heart Association and American Stroke Association's Heart-Check mark for primary stroke care. PMC's recertification as a Primary Stroke Center extends its first-in-Brevard County achievement for area patients endangered by stroke's potentially debilitating effects.

"Primary Stroke Center Certification recognizes health care organizations committed to fostering continuous quality improvement in patient safety and quality of care," says Mark Pelletier, RN, MS, chief operating officer, Accreditation and Certification Operations, and chief nursing executive, The Joint Commission. "We commend Parrish Medical Center for using certification to reduce variation in its clinical processes and to strengthen its program structure and management framework for stroke patients."

"We congratulate Parrish Medical Center for this outstanding achievement," says Nancy Brown, chief executive officer, the American Heart/Stroke Association. "This certification reflects its commitment to providing the highest quality of care for stroke patients."

Stroke is a leading cause of death in Florida. Growing research shows, however, that stroke patients' outcomes can be significantly improved when they receive treatment from an organized stroke system of care.

"The Joint Commission established the Primary Stroke Center program to set a care standard to protect and saves lives," said George Mikitarian, PMC president & CEO. "Meeting that standard takes tremendous commitment, resources, and work, but we have long dedicated ourselves to providing the highest levels of patient safety, clinical quality, and healing patient experiences on behalf of the people and communities we serve."

"This Joint Commission's Gold Seal affirmation of PMC's quality stroke care means that patients and families can have confidence in the objective measurement, accomplishment, and results, of PMC's treatment program," Mikitarian added.

In 2010, PMC became the first hospital in Florida to participate in the Mayo Clinic telestroke program. Via a remote presence robot that stands five feet tall, neurologists at Mayo Clinic's Comprehensive Stroke Center in Jacksonville can remotely evaluate

acute stroke patients and assist with diagnosis and treatment.

Quick administration of a drug called tPA to dissolve a stroke-causing blood clot and restore blood flow is part of The Joint Commission's standards followed by PMC, said Gregory P. Cuculino, MD, FACEP, emergency department medical director.

"In many cases the drug results in the patient having minimal or no neurological damage from the stroke," said Dr. Cuculino, "It's one aspect of our approach to stroke care, which includes prevention, treatment and rehabilitation while always working as a team."

Hospitals began to apply voluntarily for PSC certification from the Joint Commission in 2003 in response to proposed organized stroke system of care by the Brain Attack Coalition in 2000. The proposed stroke system of care promotes EMS routing acute patients to Primary Stroke Centers (PSCs), and Comprehensive Stroke Centers able to provide proven stroke care reliably and rapidly.

In 2004 PMC became the first health system in Brevard and third in the state of Florida to earn The Joint Commission's PSC certification. And, every two years since 2004, The Joint Commission has evaluated and recertified PMC's PSC. The most recent evaluation, in 2019, resulted in the latest recertification.

Effective July 1, 2019, Senate Bill 1460 mandates hospitals to be stroke certified by a nationally recognized certifying organization that is approved by AHCA by July 1, 2021. The Joint Commission PSC certification meets this requirement.

It has been a great summer in Brevard County and in District One. As a community we are making great progress bringing in upgrades to our community and new businesses. It's a great day in Brevard County and especially in District One.

The 2020 budget was approved and the tax rate is 7.65% below the aggregate of the current year's budget. The 2019-2020 budget includes increased funds going to the County Sheriff and deputies to continue to keep our community safe. Thanks Sheriff Ivey!

Property values continue to rise as the county's economy continues to grow. The approved 2020 Brevard County millage rate of 5.8447 remains lower than surrounding counties: Orange 6.6650, Seminole 6.9062, Indian River 6.1192 and comparable with Volusia at 5.6944.

Brevard County's population has increased from 560,683 in 2016 to an estimated 596,849 in 2019, which is a 2.15% increase. North Brevard's growth is slightly higher than the overall county growth. In 2020 the United States Census will be taking place. This will give us more accurate numbers of the new population in Brevard County. Smart Growth.

In March, 2019 collection of tourist tax dollars hit a record high, which means more people are visiting Brevard County. The 5% tourist tax collected on hotel rooms and other short-term rentals generated \$2.1 million. This is more than a 6% increase from the same time last year. These funds go to projects that include maintenance, restoration and construction of facilities that are designed to enhance the experience of visitors to Brevard County. The funds are also used for the promotion and advertising of Brevard County as a world class tourist destination. Tourism is vital to keep citizens enjoying lower taxes.

Boeing is moving their space division headquarters from Arlington, Virginia to Titusville. Boeing's choice to move to the Space Coast has a lot to do with the momentum and energy currently taking place in Brevard County. They have a commercial crew based at NASA's Kennedy Space Center, now in the former Space Shuttle hangar. The plan is to have a crewed test flight by the end of this year. The Starliner is the first ever commercial spacecraft built here in Brevard.

Blue Origin is investing more than one billion dollars. They have plans to double the size of the Blue Origin campus at Exploration Park. This site will work as both a manufacturing center and launch control for future missions. The plan is to launch from Cape Canaveral Air Force Station sometime in 2021.

Lockheed Martin held a traditional flag raising ceremony on July 30th to mark the transition of moving its Fleet Ballistic Missile Program headquarters from California to Titusville. The transition will create hundreds of job opportunities in North Brevard. Lockheed Martin has already moved 350 jobs to Titusville and has plans to invest \$40 million into the Titusville Campus.

Brevard County Road and Bridge has been hard at work in our community. The work continues on the phased work plan for Windover Farms, Port St. John and Dalehurst Ranches, as well as in all areas of District One. I would like to commend Susan Jackson, Assistant Public Works Director and her team for all of their substantial work on improving the drainage for our District One community. This summer compared to previous, we have seen less standing water due to this work. The water tables have been high, as past years, and the rain has been plentiful. Brevard County Public Works team's strategy is making a positive impact.

Brevard County is accelerating the process to improve the quality of the sewer system throughout the county to combat the sewer discharge into surrounding waterways from the inability to process stormwater. Recently, 68 miles of sewer lines were lined and 103 miles of gravity lines have been assessed for repair. Smoke testing has also been completed in sewers that connect to 10,000 homes. We need homeowners to fix these leaks. It is important that fats and grease are never put in drains; it is especially important for restaurants and food processing plants to discard fats, oils and grease properly to prevent clogged drains. A revised process for streamlining the way restaurants and food processing plants discard these items is in final stages. Brevard County sewer customers currently pay approximately 20 to 30% less for utility services than surrounding water/sewer charges. These fees most likely will need adjusting in the future to fix failing infrastructure and increase capacity that is maxed out.

The Brevard County Environmentally Endangered Lands program has 8 sanctuaries in District One for residents to visit. These sanctuaries have 3 functions: conserve natural resources, offer educational services and provide an area for recreation that includes hiking, biking and horseback riding. The sanctuaries are a great place for families to spend time learning about protected plants and animals through exhibits, educational programs and guided tours for all ages. These sanctuaries offer a great Florida outdoor experience. In Titusville, you can visit the Enchanted Forest Sanctuary located at 444 Columbia Boulevard; Diceranda Scrub Sanctuary located at 4900 Melissa Drive; and Fox Lake Sanctuary at 4400 Fox Lake Road. In Mims, you can visit the South Lake Conservation Area at 4500 Lancaster Lane: North Buck Lake Conservation Area at 4077 Cinnamon Teal Drive; and Indian Mound Station Sanctuary at 4001 Parrish Road. Sanctuaries located in Scottsmoor are Scottsmoor Flatwoods Sanctuary at 6000 Magoon Avenue and Scottsmoor Flatwoods West Sanctuary at 500 Rose Marie Place. Hours of operation vary. Please visit https://www.brevardfl.gov/EELProgram/home to view the hours.

As part of the Save Our Indian River Lagoon Project Plan, oyster bars are being constructed in several locations to help improve the health of our lagoon. Oyster bars help filter excess nutrients like nitrogen and phosphorous. They also promote the growth of good bacteria that breaks down the nitrogen releasing it from the lagoon. Although nutrient filtration is the main function of the oyster bars, the bars provide a place for many other species like mussels, snails, toadfish and marine worms to live. These species are a food source for fish that live in the lagoon. The bars can also act as a wave break, which is essential in reducing shoreline erosion.

The ball fields at Chain of Lakes were fixed and upgraded prior to the start of the season. Five acres of the soccer fields are being re-sodded, new player benches were installed and the fields will be ready for the fall season. The Titusville Soccer Club has begun their season with approximately 500 participants and offers competitive and recreational clubs for all ages. Thank you to the Titusville Soccer Club for all that you do in North Brevard.

New exercise equipment was installed at Sandpoint Park in June and a wheelchair accessible swing was installed in July. Along with these additions, the exercise trail was widened from 5 to 8 feet and the parking area and main road was resurfaced. Thank you, Parks and Recreation!

Scottsmoor Landing boat ramp opened this summer along with the Port St. John, Parrish Park and Mims boat ramps. Work is currently in progress at Kennedy Point Park, Rotary Park, Space View Park, Titusville Veterans Memorial and Tom Statham Park. We will keep you updated on the status of these projects and estimated completion.

New signage along the Rail Trail was added to give direction to the Harry T. Moore Cultural Complex, Cuyler Park and Chain of Lakes. The trails are a great biking experience and now offer access to the wonderful sites along the trail.

Luna Trails apartment complex is currently under construction, located at the corner of Sycamore Street and South Deleon Avenue.

Kennedy Space Center Visitors Complex

Having grown up and raised my family in Merritt Island, I admit to a special pride in the Kennedy Space Center. Especially since an older neighbor shared his experiences of living on the property when he was a child and assisting in the rolling, then floating of his one room family home on pine logs when the government bought all the land as far as the eye could see and then some.

When me and Fred Flintstone roamed the dirt roads of Angel City, the only way you knew a rocket was going off was when your windows rattled, dishes slid off the shelves and the roar made you think a freight train was feet away. Everything was hush-hush and very mysterious. Us kids were sure that thing tearing through the sky overhead was going to fall on us one day.

Not so these days! The Visitors Center is a sight to behold and there is so much for the whole family to see and do, you'll need at least all day and possibly two. Nerdness is absolutely not necessary!

If you haven't been in a while you will be pleasantly surprised. I advise taking a leisurely drive on SR 405, then turn onto Space Commerce Way, (they moved the entrance). The water views are spectacular and the little ones can be put on gator and other wildlife sighting duty. You can see gators, Ibis, raccoons, turtles and many others on the canal banks.

The Visitors Center opens at 9 am every day and closing depends on the time of year. Admission is \$42.00 for children and \$52.00 for adults. There are discounts for military and seniors. Parking is \$10.00 for cars and \$15.00 for larger vehicles and RVs. This is not included in the reduced admission during the Salute to Brevard October 31st till November 3rd when residents are allowed reduced admission but encouraged to donate non-perishable foods, hygiene and baby products to be given to the Sharing Center.

Scooters, strollers and wheelchairs are available for rent and something called the KSC Smartguide - a handheld digital tour guide, and a Space Visor - a mobile reality headset. If you can't bear to leave Fido home there are kennels available.

Small soft-sided coolers are allowed. You can pack sandwiches, snacks or baby food and leave it in the lockers. There is seating at the Rocket Garden Café and picnic tables at the Apollo/Saturn V Center and just outside the front entrance. Several cafés and shopping are at almost every turn.



Younger kids will enjoy Heroes & Legends at the U.S. Astronaut Hall of Fame, Space Shuttle Atlantis including a lift off experience, Journey To Mars, and the Astronaut Playdome. There is also a slide, simulators and a crawl through International Space Station. Older ones will go for the Dine With An Astronaut (there is an added charge), Journey To Mars: Explorers Wanted, Cosmic Quest (there is an added charge) and everyone loves the IMAX theater.

The KSC Bus Tour that is included with admission does not stop outside the VAB, but the Explore Tour (additional cost) does stop outside the building. No tours go inside the VAB due to security and current operations taking place in preparation for future missions.

With the cooler weather and those shorter school weeks approaching, the Space Center Visitors Complex is a good way to enjoy family time.

If you have a little more time, a drive down Space Commerce Way leads past several awesome government contractor complexes - Blue Origin is new and huge - and the Florida Power and Light solar farm could lead to very interesting conversations with the little ones. Continuing all the way to Courtney Parkway you'll pass more swamp, canals and wildlife - quick glimpses into the Space Centers past.

We ended our afternoon with a stop at the drive in place that makes the worlds best milkshakes, enjoyed while each of us listed our favorite moments of the day. Perfect!


