Planning has begun for the 34th Annual Port St. John Christmas Parade. The parade will take place on December 16, 2023, 11 AM, in Port St. John. The parade route will be east along Fay Blvd. from Waterloo Ave. to Carole Ave. We are planning for 70-80 entries this year. Please send your entry in early.

This year's parade theme will be "The Wonder of Christmas Morning." Floats and decorations should be planned toward the theme. All entries will be judged and plaques awarded. Categories include Theme, Christmas Spirit, Creativity, Marching Musical and Marching Non-Musical.

Floats should be no more than 17' high to clear power lines, and be 8' wide or less to travel to and from the staging area. Marching groups should plan for a 20' wide roadway.

For everyone's safety, candy may not be thrown from the floats and vehicles.

There is a \$30 charge for any float or vehicle which advertises a business. The fee does not go up if there are multiple businesses on the same float. Nonprofit community support groups and public

schools are \$15, unless they display banners and logos for a business on their float or vehicle(s).

Titusville Business

A few interesting articles were in the October 23 edition of the North Brevard Business Review published by the North Brevard Economic Development Zone (NBEDZ). By their website, “The North Brevard Economic Development Zone is a special dependent district, created by the local governments of Brevard County (Florida) and the City of Titusville as a tool for stimulating business development in the northern area of the county.”

1. Draper (an engineering and research firm) is acquiring a 5-acre site in Titusville’s Riverfront Center business park (just north of Hyatt Hotel) on U.S. 1. They plan a 37,000 testing and production facility for guidance, navigation and control for missile systems.

2. Olympian LED, Inc. is moving their Hopkins Ave. lease when they construct a new 15,000 sq. ft. facility for production, fabrication and assembly on a 4.5-acre lot in Spaceport Commerce Park next to Titusville-Cocoa Airport Authority (TICO) airport.

3. Titusville has sent preliminary permitting to the KEY group for construction of a 259,000 sq. ft. industrial building on a site near Grissom Pkwy. and TICO airport. They plan to build at least two additional industrial buildings on the 50-acre parcel for leasing to flight manufacturing firms given the growth of the aerospace industry locally.

4. Florida Power & Light has given a grant to Titusville’s Economic Development Commission (EDC) of Florida’s Space Coast. The program is to improve an industrial site’s readiness for development and to assist the EDC with marketing for those sites.

It sure sounds like Grissom and U.S. 1 are going to be very busy in the not too distant future.

Titusville Right to Clean Water Amendment Fiasco

Back in 2020, a group of Titusville citizens started a petition drive for the Right to Clean Water Charter Amendment due to the number of manatee deaths and pollution in the lagoon from raw sewage at various times. In November, 2022, it went to ballot and over 82% of Titusville voters approved the amendment. Titusville’s charter

Section 7.5 and by Florida state statute, Titusville must accept all of the election results, but they did not.

Titusville decided to sue the citizens who brought the amendment forward. Titusville claimed the right to clean water amendment was unconstitutionally vague, violated state pre-emption law and was ‘confusing.’

Senior Circuit Court Judge Charles Holcomb wrote on 05/22/2023, the “... [1980] Florida Supreme Court confirmed that the citizens of Florida have been given the capacity to protect their rights to a clean environment, a right not previously furnished them directly, by enactment of sub-section 7 of 403.412 F.S.” So, “The laws now allow a private citizen to file suit to enforce environmental laws of the State.” As far as the charge of confusing references to the natural environment, Judge Holcomb stated that, “The term ‘Natural Environment’ defines itself and isn’t likely to confuse or deceive anyone of voting age with all their faculties intact.”

On June 5th, 2023, the City of Titusville filed a motion for a rehearing to question Judge Holcomb’s verdict. The Court of Appeals directed the City of Titusville charter amendment to be certified promptly. Titusville asked for another hearing, stating Judge Holcomb’s ruling did not provide required references. As Judge Holcomb was ill, Judge Paulk canceled the hearing on Judge Charles Holcomb’s calendar where it was initially scheduled, and rescheduled it for a later time, specifically August 24, 2023, at 12:15 pm, on his own docket.

The group being sued, “Speak Up Titusville,” stated Judge Paulk has a history of handling high-profile cases. In the past, he has been known to delay rendering verdicts, especially when the outcomes do not align with certain political agendas. Speak Up Titusville asked: 1. The removal of this case from the jurisdiction of Judge Paulk, and 2., The immediate return of this case to Judge Charles Holcomb to ensure an impartial and timely resolution.

I’ve been told the suit is still under Judge George Paulk and will be heard on November 16th, 2 p.m. at Titusville Court, Room 218 at 506 South Palm Avenue, Titusville. The Brevard County Clerk of Court Record gives this time and place:

Growth Myths

I wrote this back in Happenings in 2010. It is even more relevant in 2023.

We seem to be bombarded by State Representatives, County Commissioners and Town Councils giving breaks to development to provide more growth. Everyone seems to think growth is good. Growth will provide us with more jobs, while keeping taxes low. Unfortunately, it seems to be a myth. Our services diminish, our taxes seem to always increase and we never seem to get to the good side. I’ve been reading a number of books and articles that explain we need to be honest and debunk these grow mongers for what they are.

In Eben Fodor’s book titled, “Better, Not Bigger,” Eben debunks a number of myths concerning growth.

Myth: Growth provides needed tax revenue. He explains as a general rule, the larger the city, the higher the taxes. It always seems that if you have more development, you are going to need more water, sewage treatment, road maintenance, police and fire protection, and garbage pickup. Never do the new taxes seem to cover the cost required. Fodor says, “Growth rarely pays its own way.”

Myth: There must be growth to provide jobs. Fodor explained that there’s no guarantee that new jobs will go to the locals. Companies often bring in their current employees to fill many of the jobs. If you look at the 25 fastest growing cities with the 25 slowest growing, unemployment rates are similar. Fodor says, “If you create more jobs, you attract new people that require even more jobs.”

Myth: You have to subsidize growth to have good jobs. A “good growth climate” is one with little regulation, low business taxes and public subsidies to business. Fodor states that a study of states with good and bad business climates, and states with good business climate actually had lower growth per capita incomes than those with the worst. Fodor: “Surprisingly, this could be due to those states placing more emphasis placed on investing resources in businesses in those good business climate states rather than directly in people.”

Myth: If growth is limited, housing prices will go up. Does it sound logical to you in Brevard County? We have fantastic growth and it has caused housing prices to spike. Fodor said housing affordability is not so much housing cost as income level, so if you have low-paying retail jobs, housing will be unaffordable. In Brevard, we have high paying jobs and lack of housing, so there are bidding wars. I'm not sure how much longer that is going on. These reasons are probably why Florida passed a law going into effect in July, 2023 which allows developers to build housing in commercial/industrial zoned areas without a plan review as long as they have 40% for low income housing.

Myth: Protecting the environment hurts the economy. Bank of America did a study that showed states with high environmental standards actually grew faster than those with weak regulations. The Institute of Southern Studies ranked all states according to 20 indicators of economic prosperity and environmental health and found both rose and fell together. Vermont ranked 3rd on the economic scale and first on the environmental scale, while Louisiana ranked 50th on both scales.

Myth: Citizens don't support environmental protections. Fodor cites examples in Colorado, Los Angeles, Oregon and the U.S. as a whole that shows polls have disproved this for decades. Almost always over 70% say the environment is more important than economic growth.

Myth: We have to grow or die. What does that mean? Undeveloped land pays more in property taxes than it costs in services. Undeveloped land doesn't have kids in school and trees don't wear out our roads. Undeveloped land absorbs flood waters and recharges our aquifers. Trees clean the air and provide homes to wildlife. Undeveloped land increases the value of property nearby. We should be paying to have undeveloped land be there.

Myth: Environmentalists are just another special interest. Developers who directly profit from growth is a special interest. Citizens who don't make a cent on the growth are fighting for the public, and for the good of the community.

As with many other things, if you repeat the lies enough, it sometimes becomes truth. Not in growth case, just look around you. Do you feel good about the state of the Indian River Lagoon? Do you love the increased traffic and the state of our roads? Growth does not pay for itself, and we should not be encouraging it. It will probably come, but we should be doing it smartly, not just for the sake of growth.

I still have a t-shirt from nearly 30 years ago that says "Smart Quality Growth for Brevard." I wore it to County Commission meetings to advocate for its message as I could see what was happening and that we live in a natural swamp. Care is needed to deal with stormwater and one solid way is Low impact Development.

"Low Impact Development," also known by its acronym "LID," is design standards to ensure rainwater stays where it falls and is absorbed so that it doesn't go into our streams and canals taking along pollutants, eventually going into our Indian River Lagoon.

SB712 Clean Waters Act passed in 2020 instructed the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) and water management districts

to update stormwater rule making so it would include LID by January 1, 2021, to reduce stormwater pollution.

Cities in Brevard are starting to implement it, but most seem to only encourage the use of LID instead of requiring developers to use it. The only one that I know of that has made it mandatory is the Department of Defense (DoD). Developers will find it reduces land clearing and grading cost, reduces infrastructure costs (streets, curbs, gutters, sidewalks, retention ponds), and increases lot and community marketability. Cities will find it reduces infrastructure and utility maintenance costs and improves their residents' quality of life.

Hopefully, the cities and our county will wake up soon as with climate change, adding to this problem as well will be our dire straits.

Parrish Medical Center Board Votes No Taxes

For the 29th straight year, no taxes will be assessed to support operations of the North Brevard County Hospital District d/b/a Parrish Medical Center (PMC). PMC's Board of Directors voted unanimously during public hearings on September 11 and 25 to establish the millage rate and budget for fiscal year 2023-2024.

PMC is an independent, public, not-for-profit hospital, and state law gives the North Brevard Hospital District (d/b/a Parrish Medical Center) the authority to set a tax rate to support hospital operations. However, unlike most public hospitals,

the PMC Board of Directors has, for 29 years, voted not to use tax dollars as a means of funding the hospital.



“PMC serves the community's health through compassionate and exceptional care and is recognized as one of the nation's finest healing environments,” said PMC Board Chairman Robert Jordan. “We are pleased to continue to take

this position on behalf of the community we serve while also investing tens of millions of dollars back into North Brevard each year in charity care and services.”

Project Kuiper's Protoflight Mission Begins

On Friday, October 6, Project Kuiper sent its first two satellites into space from Kennedy Space Center on board an Atlas V rocket from United Launch Alliance (ULA). The launch kicked off the Kuiper Protoflight mission, a months long series of tests to validate the system design and network performance. Already, engineers have collected some of the most critical data from the mission.



"There's plenty of work ahead, but at this point in the mission, I'm thrilled to report that KuiperSat-1 and KuiperSat-2 are operating nominally," said Rajeev Badyal, Project Kuiper's vice president of technology. "The two satellites are stable in orbit, harvesting energy from the sun and communicating across all links from Earth to space and space to Earth. We're already learning a lot from this mission that will inform further improvements to our production systems, and the team should be very proud of this milestone."

In the next phase of the mission, Amazon will test the data network end to end. That involves routing data from the internet through Amazon Web Services (AWS)-powered ground network, from a ground gateway antenna up to the prototype satellites, and then down to customer terminal antennas at their test site, as well as sending data in the other direction.

Project Kuiper plans to begin satellite production in Kirkland, Washington, before the end of the year, in parallel with the Protoflight mission. Learnings from the mission will help refine the hardware, software, and infrastructure that underpin the Kuiper System. The first of these production satellites are on track for launch in the first half of 2024, and entering beta testing with early commercial customers in the second half of 2024.

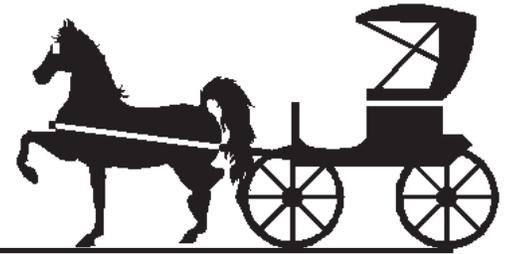

Is Your Smoke Detector Expired?

Like most electronics, smoke alarms don't last forever. The US National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) issued NFPA Standard 72, National Fire Alarm and Signalling Code (2010 edition), which states: "Replace all smoke alarms, including those that use ten-year batteries and hard-wired alarms, when they are ten years old or sooner if they don't respond properly when tested."

Not sure how old your smoke detector is? Look for the expiration date on the detector. To check, carefully twist the detector off its mounting plate. The expiration date is printed on the back of the unit. If you don't see an expiration date, it means the unit is too old to operate and needs to be replaced immediately.

If the date is within 10 years, you should also press the Test button to make sure it has enough power to sound the alarm. If it doesn't sound, replace the battery (batteries).

Don't be fooled by the test button. The test button only tells you that the battery, electronics and alarm system are working. It doesn't mean that the smoke sensor is working. Without a functioning sensor, the smoke detector is worthless. To test the sensor, use an aerosol can of smoke alarm test spray that simulates smoke. If the alarms go off, you're probably OK. But keep in mind, the older the alarms get, the more the alarm sensors lose sensitivity.

Most CO alarms expire after 7 years, so if you have a combo smoke and CO detector, you should replace it every 7 years.
