2025 Starts Strong With Space Exploration

Blue Origin's New Glenn launched for the first time ever, rising off a pad at Cape Canaveral Space Force Station on January 16th. The rocket's upper stage reached orbit — the main goal of the test flight, which the company called NG-1. Blue Origin also tried to land New Glenn's reusable first stage on a ship in the Atlantic Ocean, nicknamed Jacklyn after company founder Jeff Bezos' mother. The booster did not stick the landing. The company had stressed that this was a secondary goal that was unlikely to be achieved.

Flying aboard the New Glenn mission is a test version of Blue Origin's upcoming "Blue Ring"

spacecraft. This demonstrator is designed to validate Blue Ring's communications, in-space data collection, tracking and command systems while still attached to New Glenn's second stage, Blue Origin wrote in a NG-1 mission description in December. Blue Ring will function as a platform for other satellites, capable of carrying about 6,600 pounds across 13 different payload adapters. It will be able to transport payloads to geostationary orbit, orbits close to and around the moon, and even interplanetary orbits, according to Blue Origin.

Firefly Aerospace is a private company that NASA contracted to take science payloads to the moon. The Blue Ghost mission launched from KSC on a SpaceX Falcon 9 rocket. The company has dubbed mission number one Ghost Riders in the Sky. The lander is aiming for Mare Crisium, a dark plain you can see with the unaided eye on the right edge of a full moon. Blue Ghost will deliver 10 NASA CLPS science payloads to Mare Crisium that will provide invaluable data to the lunar science community by addressing topics like regolith behavior, interior composition and more. The mission will spend about 45 days getting to the moon. For the first 25 days, Blue Ghost will orbit Earth. Then it will head toward the moon, where it will orbit for 16 days. Once on the surface, it will operate for 14 days. On the moon, it takes 14 Earth days to go from sunrise to sunset, then another 14 Earth days from sunset to sunrise. When night descends on the lander, Firefly expects it to operate for the first five-plus hours of darkness before its solar-powered batteries run out.

Some of Blue Ghost's task will be to take soil samples, drill below the surface and capture images of the lunar sunset. NASA will also be testing a computer designed to withstand high doses of

radiation, measuring the solar wind's interaction with Earth's magnetosphere and analyzing the lunar dust that adheres to everything.

Food For Thought What To Do When Taste Fails You



Public Urged To Report Invasive Asian Swamp Eel Species

The University of Florida, in partnership with the U.S. Geological Survey, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and other agencies, encourages the public to report sightings of the invasive Asian swamp eel, first detected in Florida's waterways in 1997. Scientifically known as Monopterus albus, the Asian swamp eel is a unique, air-breathing fish native to Southeast Asia, thriving in muddy, stagnant waters. The species has established in numerous parts of the country, including Hawaii and Georgia. There is increased concern about their population growth throughout the southeast, particularly Florida.

People in Florida's waterways are urged to report through the USGS Nonindigenous Aquatic Species website, EDDMapS website or App or FWC's 888-Ive-Got-1 hotline.

Port St. John Wastewater Treatment Facility Update

There has been a development in the new PSJ Wastewater Plant the federal and county governments' need for the ability to serve Cape Canaveral Space Force Station. It is now in black and white on what they want in that plant. I read the following in the Brevard County Commission's 2025 Legislative Initiatives:

"Utilities:

SUPPORT funding for a new Advanced Wastewater Treatment facility to serve the Port St John service area. This new facility may serve as the treatment facility for future wastewater flow from Space Florida and potentially other wastewater utilities requesting to transfer their flows from the barrier islands to a mainland facility.

The new wastewater treatment plant will operate using Advanced Wastewater Treatment (AWT). AWT is the highest treatment technology available. AWT provides the highest removal of nutrients. This project's disposal will utilize 2 deep injection wells. In order to transfer wastewater flows from the barrier islands to a new facility in Port St John, a new force main transmission will need to be constructed going underneath the Indian and Banana Rivers.

Estimated construction cost is \$625 million."

The Sykes Creek plant is at capacity. I know Titusville and Cocoa don't want a large new sewer plant in their cities, I'm sure Brevard County is also still thinking of future sewer in Port St John and Canaveral Groves, even for the areas not within the Iindian River Lagoon watershed. It would be time well spent to read the entire Legislative Priorities in the reference link below. There is no telling what else they may have planned. It looks like the county taxpayer is expected to pay for the benefit of having SpaceX and other Space Contractors in the county. Why aren't these contractors paying at least a portion? Why don't they just rename this facility to the Space Force Station Wastewater Facility?

Space Force Infrastructure Plans

I told you about plans to build a regional wastewater facility near Port St John. I've found in the December 23 issue of SPACErePORT that Space Force is planning to spend billions on infrastructure projects at both Cape Canaveral Space Force Station and Vandenburg Space Force Base. Port St. John Wastewater Treatment Fa- Brig. Gen. Kristin L. Panzenhagen stated there are currently 192 projects across both coasts. "The projects run the gamut, including: Burying power lines at Cape Canaveral, expanding roads to accommodate larger rockets, wastewater treatment facilities to handle the large amount of water used for deluge operations, electrical and HVAC generators and systems that corrode faster in the humid, salty conditions along the coasts, and developing more land and relocating administrative facilities and warehouses so that they won't be inside the 'clear area' that people need to leave while rockets are fueled."

> The same issue stated \$65 million is allocated to a project known as "Project Hinton." The company hasn't been told, but the money is for a high-volume production facility, high bay and launch infrastructure at Cape Canaveral.

Orlando Utilities Commission Facility On Kings Highway

In January 2023, Orlando Utilities Commission (OUC) announced they were working with Massachusetts-based Malta Inc.to build an "energy storage power plant" at the site of the old OUC natural-gas plant on U.S. 1. It sounded neat. This sodium storage plant would take electricity generated by an OUC solar plant in Orange County and it would be converted to thermal energy and stored in molten salt and coolant. Then whenever it's needed, a generator would take the stored thermal energy to power a generator and return the electricity to their grid. There was a story in the Orlando Sentinel in the same month, and Florida Today had a short story in February and a detailed story in March concerning this new plant.

I hadn't heard anything concerning this project species' ability to fend off disease.

in over a year, so I called OUC and was told that I needed to send an email to their Customer Service email address so management could answer my questions. I sent the following:

Good Day,

On January 5, 2023 OUC put out an announcement on their website and the Orlando Sentinel newspaper that OUC was collaborating with Malta Inc. to put in a sodium electric storage facility at the Indian River plant. There were additional stories in the Florida Today in February and a very long Florida Today story in March that your company was in the final approval for a deal that would tear down the Indian River OUC plant and put in a Sodium Electric Storage Battery in that location. The Brevard County Commission even sent a letter of approval for the project.

I write environmental articles for the Happenings newsletter for Port St. John and Canaveral Groves here in Brevard County and I hope to write any progress on your project. I know the residents of Port St. John are very concerned with the dilapidated state of your Indian River plant and hope this eyesore will be eventually replaced. My deadline for the newsletter is November 16, and if I don't hear from you by then, I will report what I know as of now. I hope I can put in some good news to our residents.



Monthly Tax Update

Here we are again and tax season under way since the IRS started processing tax returns on January 27th. Now, shortly after January 31st, everyone should receive your tax Forms 1099-INT, 1099-R, W-2, and 1099-NEC, and by the end of February, your Forms 1099-S, 1099-DIV, and 1099-B.

Next, an important reminder for taxpayers with health insurance through the Marketplace: go online at Healthcare.gov, log in to your account, download your Form 1095-A, and provide the form to your tax preparer. Many tax returns have been rejected because Form 1095-A was not reconciled in the return.

Also, for taxpayers with a qualified child under 14 years old, don't forget to pick up your yearly statement from childcare, which will be used to claim the childcare credit.

In addition, taxpayers claiming Earned Income credit (EIC), child tax credits (CTC) and additional tax credits should file their tax returns before February 15th, 2025.

The Required Minimum Distributions (RMDs) are the minimum amounts you must withdraw from your retirement accounts each year; from your traditional IRA, SEP IRA, Simple IRA and retirement plan accounts when you reach age 73. Participants in a workplace retirement plan (for example, 401k or profit-sharing plan) can delay taking their RMDs until the year they retire unless they're a 5% owner of the business sponsoring the plan. If you reach age 73 in 2024: Your first RMD is due by April 1, 2025, based on your account balance on December 31, 2023, and your second RMD is due by December 31, 2025, based on your account balance on December 31, 2024.

Update for business in 2025: The IRS increased the standard mileage rate for automobiles driven for business. It will increase by 3 cents in 2025, while the mileage rates for vehicles used for other purposes will remain unchanged from 2024. Beginning January 1, 2025, the standard mileage rates for the use of a car, van, pickup or panel truck will be 70 cents per mile driven for business use, up 3 cents from 2024. Also 21 cents per mile driven for medical purposes, the same as in 2024. And 21 cents per mile driven for moving purposes for qualified active-duty members of the Armed Forces, unchanged from last year. The rate will be

14 cents per mile driven in service of charitable organizations, equal to the rate in 2024. The rates apply to fully electric and hybrid automobiles, as well as gasoline and diesel-powered vehicles.

For a leased vehicle, taxpayers using the standard mileage rate must employ that method for the entire lease period, including renewals.

Cost Management For Cold Weather

Cold temperatures can have a big impact on your energy use. Use these tips to keep your energy costs low:

Set your thermostat to 68 degrees or lower. Every degree below 68 saves you 5% on heating costs.

Seal doors and windows properly.

Use electric blankets or space heaters to keep warm in small areas. Turn them off before you leave the room. Keep children and pets at least three feet from heaters.

Avoid increasing your thermostat by more than two degrees at a time if you have a central electric-based heating system to prevent acciden-

tally turning on auxiliary heat. Using auxiliary heat for more than 12 hours a day can add up to \$15 per day, depending on your home size.
