# Disaster Recovery Center Established for Those Impacted By Hurricane Milton

A Disaster Recovery Center (DRC) has opened at 3695 Lake Drive, Cocoa, for Brevard County residents impacted by Hurricane Milton who need help with FEMA disaster assistance. Located in the UF/IFAS Brevard Extension Service parking lot, the center is easily accessible from I-95 and centrally positioned within the county. Hours are Monday–Sunday, 9 a.m. – 6 p.m.

# **Voyager 1, Phone Home!**

Voyager 1, which launched in 1977, is currently exploring the farthest edges of the solar system. After having recent communication issues that resulted in silence, NASA and Voyager 1 resorted to using a backup radio transmitter that has been inactive since 1981.

The interstellar explorer initially experienced a brief pause in communications after putting itself in a protective state to conserve power. The mission's flight team first realized there was an issue with Voyager 1 in October when the spacecraft failed to respond to a command. According to NASA officials in a statement on October 13, "The transmitter shut-off seems to have been prompted by the spacecraft's fault protection system, which autonomously responds to onboard issues. The team is now working to gather information that will help them figure out what happened and return Voyager 1 to normal operations."

After sending instructions to Voyager 1 on October 16th, the team expected to receive data back from the spacecraft within two days. It normally takes about 23 hours for a command to travel more than 15 billion miles to reach the spacecraft in interstellar space, then another 23 hours to receive a signal back. However, on October 18th, the team was unable to detect Voyager 1's signal on the X-band frequency that the DSN antennas were listening for.

The spacecraft's fault protection system had lowered the rate at which its radio transmitter was sending back data to use less power. The flight team located a signal later that day, but on October 19th, communication with Voyager 1 stopped entirely when its X-band transmitter was turned off. The spacecraft's fault protection system is believed to have been triggered twice more, causing it to switch to the S-band radio transmitter, which hadn't been used since 1981.

The spacecraft is located much farther away today than it was 43 years ago. The flight team was not sure a signal on the S-band frequency could be detected, especially because it transmits a significantly fainter signal while using less power. However, the team didn't want to risk sending another signal to the X-band transmitter and triggering the fault protection system again. Instead, a command was sent to the S-band transmitter. Two days later the team was finally able to reconnect with Voyager 1.

When Voyager 1 launched, it became the first spacecraft to cross the boundary of our solar system. Its time in deep space has taken a toll on its instruments and caused an increasing number of technical issues, but Voyager 1 continues to return vital data from beyond the solar system.


# Jess Parrish Medical Foundation Accepting Scholarship Applications for Students Pursuing Careers in Healthcare

Jess Parrish Medical Foundation (JPMF) has launched its 2025 scholarship application period and is now accepting applications from high school seniors and college undergraduate students who plan to pursue a career in a medical or healthcare field related to human health.

Scholarships will be awarded to graduating high school seniors and undergraduate students who reside in the Parrish Medical Center service area and are attending an accredited two- or four-year college/university. Students must have a 3.0 grade point average or higher, based on a 4.0 scale. Students who have been awarded a JPMF scholarship in previous years may reapply provided they are continuing in a medical/healthcare field and have maintained at least a 3.0 grade point average. Graduate students are not eligible to apply.

High school students who attend Astronaut High School, Space Coast Jr./Sr. High School and Titusville High School may obtain an application from the guidance office at their school. Others may obtain an application by calling the Jess Parrish Medical Foundation at 321-269-4066 or by visiting parrishmedfoundation.com/scholarships.

The number and amount awarded for scholarships will be recommended by the Foundation's scholarship committee with final approval by the Foundation's Board of Directors. The deadline for submitting applications is Friday, March 7, 2025. Scholarship award recipients will be announced in May 2025. To date, JPMF has awarded more than \$535,000 to 485 students, supporting future generations of healthcare professionals.
