Artemis I Lifts Off At Last!

At 1:47 a.m. on Wednesday morning, Launch Pad 39B at KSC turned night into day as NASA's SLS lifted off carrying the agency's Orion spacecraft on its way to the Moon as part of the Artemis program. The SLS rocket and Orion spacecraft were at Launch Pad 39B, where they rode out Hurricane Nicole last week. Following the storm, teams conducted thorough assessments of the rocket, space-

craft and associated ground systems, and confirmed there were no significant impacts from the severe weather.

An uncrewed Orion is on the first leg of a mission in which Orion is planned to travel approximately 40,000 miles beyond the Moon and return to Earth over the course of 25 1/2 days. The mission is part of NASA's Moon to Mars exploration approach before

flying astronauts on the Artemis II mission. The Artemis I mission is the first integrated flight test of the agency's deep space exploration systems: the Orion spacecraft, Space Launch System (SLS) rocket, and ground systems.

After reaching its initial orbit, Orion deployed its solar arrays and engineers began performing checkouts of the spacecraft's systems. About 90 minutes into flight, the rocket's upper stage engine successfully fired for approximately 18 minutes to give Orion the big push needed to send it out of Earth orbit and on toward the Moon. Orion continued its journey to the Moon powered by its

service module, which is the propulsive powerhouse provided by ESA (European Space Agency) through an international collaboration.

The journey isn't the only thing happening. A series of

10 small science investigations and technology demonstrations, called CubeSats, were deployed from a ring that connected the upper stage to the spacecraft. Each Cube-Sat has its own mission. They have the potential to fill gaps in our knowledge of the solar system or demonstrate technologies that may benefit the

design of future missions to explore the Moon and beyond. Photo credit - Bill Ingalls Orion is expected to fly by the Moon on November. 21, performing a close approach of the lunar surface on its way to a distant retrograde orbit, a highly stable orbit thousands of miles beyond the Moon.

> The Artemis missions are a beginning point, paving the way for a future lunar space station and serving as a stepping stone for astronauts on the way to Mars.

Announces Certified Technical Rescue Team

Brevard County Fire Rescue announces state certified Technical Rescue Team to better serve residents and visitors.

A state certified Technical Rescue Team (TRT) is a multi-disciplined unit capable of conducting search and rescue in a structural collapse, rope rescue, vehicle and machinery extrication, confined space operations, trench rescue, excavation rescue and water rescue operations. The team is also disciplined in large animal rescue.

In addition to being a first on-scene Brevard County asset, the team will also be available to lend assistance statewide when requested.

In early November, Brevard County Fire Rescue underwent assessment and evaluation by representatives from the State of Florida. During the evaluation process, the department was graded on three specific areas; personnel readiness, logistical readiness and management readiness. Out of a maximum of 100 points, Brevard County Fire Rescue received an evaluation score of 96, passing the evaluation and earning the designation of a state approved Type I Technical Rescue Team.

The team is comprised of members from Station 48, centrally located in West Viera. Members from this station also make up the county's on-call hazardous materials team and will continue to serve the community in this capacity. The team consists of eight members, ready to respond immediately, and can be scaled up to support larger incidents. Each member is required to complete a minimum of 360 hours of training to be considered for the team.

"It's an honor for Brevard County Fire Rescue to provide this service to our community. I am extremely proud of our hard working men and woman for achieving this goal and for strengthening the capability of our all hazard fire department," explains Fire Chief Patrick Voltaire.

New Brevard County Fire Rescue Rating May Decrease Resident Insurance Premiums

Residential and commercial property owners in Brevard County could potentially see lower insurance rates as a result of the county's latest public fire protection services rating from the Insurance Service Organization (ISO). Brevard County Fire Rescue (BCFR) is pleased to announce the updated designation from the ISO's Public Protection Classification rating of a Class 3/3X effective Tuesday, Nov. 1.

A Class 3 department allows residential and commercial property owners the opportunity to potentially obtain lower insurance premiums along with receiving exemplary fire protection services. The ISO rating is used to measure the quality and effectiveness of fire protection in a community. The rating scale ranges from one to 10 with a Class 1 being the best possible score.

As part of its evaluation, the ISO collects information on fire-protection efforts in communities throughout the United States. ISO's Public Protection Classification (PPC) Program helps establish appropriate fire insurance premiums for residential and commercial properties and provides insurance companies with reliable, up-to-date information about a community's fire protection services. The formal assessment process consisted of four major areas:

- Fire Department (staffing, equipment, training, and emergency response capabilities)
- Community Risk Reduction (Safety Education, Code Enforcement, Fire Investigations)
- Water supply system (highlighting the water supply a community uses for fire suppression).
- Fire alarm and communications system (which centers on facilities and support for handling and dispatching alarms).

BCFR has been working over the years to improve the services provided to the community by investing in personnel, equipment and communications. BCFR has improved from a class 4/9, to a class 4/4X, and now a class 3/3X. This rating reflects the hard work and dedication of the Board of County Commissioners, the men and woman of BCFR and the continued support of the community. This rating could bring about lower insurance premiums for businesses and residents in unincorporated Brevard County.

With this classification, Brevard is listed in the top 15% of fire departments across the nation, and is one of only 3,583 – out of 40,756 communities surveyed -- to achieve the Class 3 rating in the United States.

Disaster Survivor Assistance Teams to Focus on Central Brevard

As the Disaster Survivor Assistance Teams complete canvassing in north and south Brevard, efforts will continue in the Cocoa, Rockledge and Cocoa Beach areas. The DSAT will be equipped to provide residents with information on FEMA disaster assistance, provide guidance on the application process, provide basic information about application status and other eligible assistance, and collect new information or documents for case files. FEMA DSAT members will be identifiable by blue shirts, blue vests or both, and will operate between 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily.

Homeowners and renters in Brevard County who had uninsured losses from Hurricane Ian may be eligible for federal disaster assistance. FEMA may provide financial help with temporary housing expenses, basic home repairs and other essential disaster-related needs.
