

Spaceship Neptune Excelsior Completes First Full, Uncrewed Test Flight

Florida-based space tourism company Space Perspective has successfully completed the first full, uncrewed test flight of its luxury balloon-lifted capsule to the edge of Earth's atmosphere. Spaceship Neptune Excelsior, the first of the company's teardrop-shaped pressure pods, lifted off from Space Perspective's Marine Spaceport (MS) Voyager vessel off the coast of Saint Petersburg and completed its first full flight test from takeoff to landing. Space Perspective's ascent system carried Excelsior to an altitude of approximately 100,000 feet (30,480 meters) before its slow descent to a safe ocean splashdown and recovery.

If all continues smoothly through Excelsior's remaining tests, Space Perspective founder and CEO Jane Poynter says the first crewed test flights will begin in 2025, with her and her husband, Space Perspective co-founder and CTO Taber MacCallum aboard.

Unlike other space tourism companies strapping their passengers into capsules blasting off on top of rockets, Space Perspective offers a softer, much gentler ride to the

skies above our planet. Their Spaceship Neptune capsule hosts a luxurious interior where up to eight customers can relax, with a beverage service, as they slowly ascend to heights where the curvature of the Earth can be seen from their ergonomically cushioned seats.

Stretched to 600 feet (183 meters) above the Spaceship Neptune capsule, Space Perspective's balloon is pumped with buoyant hydrogen to ascend the pod to just 230,000 feet (70,100 meters) shy of the Kármán line — the internationally recognized boundary where space begins.

Upcoming Spaceship Neptune capsules are designed for the comfort of Space Perspective's customers, but Excelsior was instead outfitted for testing with a host of sensors and strain gauges to measure every detail of data during the vehicle's first flights.

The company currently has more than 1,800 ticket holders who have reserved seats aboard Spaceship Neptune, with customer flights expected to begin sometime late next year, or early 2026. Currently, a seat aboard Space Perspective's luxurious space-lift costs \$125,000, but future company plans for a larger capsule to accommodate a higher number of passengers may reduce that price "somewhere well below \$100,000," Poynter says.

Hurricane Milton Recovery Help

Operation Blue Roof

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) announced the start of the Operation Blue Roof Program on Tuesday. USACE is tasked by FEMA to assist eligible homeowners with temporary roof repairs. The Operation Blue Roof Program provides temporary blue covering with fiber-reinforced sheeting to help reduce further damage to property until permanent repairs can be made.

Operation Blue Roof is a free service to homeowners. The counties currently identified for the program include Brevard County. The initial sign-up period is set for 21 days and ends November 5.

Residents impacted by Hurricane Milton can sign-up at www.blueroof.gov, calling 888-ROOF-BLU (888-766-3258), or visiting an ROE collection center throughout the affected areas. ROE collection center locations are listed on the website www.blueroof.gov. There you can sign up for Blue Roof assistance using a Right of Entry (ROE) form, which gathers information about your residence.

ROE forms submitted by residents grant the government and its agents permission to go on individual properties to install the temporary roof.

Operation Blue Roof protects property, reduces temporary housing costs, and allows residents to remain in their homes while recovering from the storm.

This program is for primary residences or a permanently occupied rental property with less than 50 percent structural damage. Vacation rental properties are not eligible for this program.

Not all roof types qualify for the program. Roofs that are flat or made of metal or clay, slate, or asbestos tile do not qualify. The roof must be standard roof shingles, or similar material that will allow contractors to nail the tarp in place. Contractors will consider repairs to metal roofs and mobile homes on a case-by-case basis and will install the cover if possible.

Operation Blue Roof will remove homeowner tarps installed and minor debris to allow for proper installation. Any large items of debris, such as a tree, must be removed from the roof by the homeowner to be eligible for the program.



Creating Textiles with Soluble Stabilizer

The Space Coast Weavers and Fiber Artists will meet on Saturday, October 26 at 10:00 a.m. at the Merritt Island Public Library, 1195 N. Courtenay Parkway. Following a business meeting and member show and tell, Teresa Camarata will demonstrate "Creating Textiles with Soluble Stabilizer."

Teresa makes unique textiles by layering even the tiniest scraps of fabric, yarns, threads, ribbons or any other fiber between soluble stabilizer. After the fabric is stitched, the stabilizer is rinsed away. She uses the technique to create table runners, coasters, mug rugs, scarves, book covers, purses and really, most anything you can make with fabric. Most fiber lovers have a stash of fabric scraps and this is a clever way to use them.

Teresa is a multi-talented artist who credits her mother for nurturing her creativity. "She was in college when I started kindergarten and I always wanted to copy whatever she was doing for art classes. I earned a BA in Studio Arts at the University of West Florida. Although I spent my career in public service, I always made time for creative pursuits. I can't seem to pare down the mediums I enjoy; so be it!"

Since 1983 SCW&FA has been Brevard's go-to guild for fiber arts: spinning, weaving, basketry, rug hooking, and more. The guild helps fiber artists, beginning or advanced, learn through workshops and the informal exchange of ideas. They also work to educate the public about the fiber arts.
