Port St. John Christmas Parade



Planning has begun for the 35th Annual Port St. John Christmas Parade. The parade will take place on December 21, 2024, 11 a.m. in Port St. John. The parade route will be east along Fay Blvd. from Waterloo Ave. to Carole Ave. We are planning for a larger parade, 70-80 entries this year.

After all the school groups were forced to cancel all outdoor events last year due to an oncoming thunderstorm, this year's parade theme - again - will be, "The Wonder of Christmas Morning." Floats and decorations should be planned toward the theme. All entries will be judged and plaques awarded. Categories include Theme, Christmas Spirit, Creativity, Marching Musical and Marching Non-Musical.



The parade travels in the eastbound lane of Fay Blvd., so most of the floats are built to face the sidewalk on the south side of Fay. The county does not allow spectators to gather on the medians or in the cutouts in the center of Fay Blvd.

Please be respectful of the owner' property and do not leave candy wrappers or trash along the road. Bring a bag to collect your children's goodies.

Fay Blvd. will be closed from Waterloo Ave. to Carole Ave. from 11:00 a.m. until 12:30 when the parade ends.

For everyone's safety, candy may will not be thrown from the floats and vehicles.

Cocoa High School Wins Third Straight Class 2A Football State Championship

For the third straight year, the Tigers of Cocoa High School won the Class 2A football state championship, defeating Gadsden County 38-27 last Thursday night. The Tigers opened the scoring with quarterback Brady Hart



connecting with Jayvan Boggs, star wide receiver and recent Florida State Seminole.

Gadsden County dominated the run game with almost 160 total rushing yards. But a late rushing touchdown from Cocoa's Latrison Lane sealed the title. He finished the night with two touchdowns. Hart threw for 259 passing yards and also had a rushing touchdown. Boggs finished his senior season with 21 touchdowns and over 2,000 receiving yards.

"Best senior class in Cocoa history," Cocoa head coach Ryan Schneider said after the game. "We won three in a row, but we've been to four straight state championships. It's a class of winners. I'm more proud of the type of people they are off the field."

NASA Delays Artemis 2 Moon Mission To 2026

Artemis 3 Astronaut Landing To Mid-2027

We'll have to wait a bit longer to see the first crewed moon mission since the Apollo era. NASA has announced that it's delaying the planned launch of Artemis 2, a flight that will send four people around the moon and back, to April 2026. Artemis 2 had been targeted for September, 2025. And Artemis 3, a crewed moon landing that had been targeted for late 2026, is now scheduled for mid-2027. The extra time is needed primarily to finish prepping the Orion capsule for its first-ever crewed flights, according to NASA officials.

"Space is demanding," NASA Administrator Bill Nelson said during a press conference last week. "And we, and our industry and international partners, need this time to make sure that the Orion capsule is ready to safely deliver our astronauts to deep space and back to Earth."


Orion has completed two flights to date — a short flight to Earth orbit in 2014 and the 25-day-long Artemis 1, an uncrewed test mission that sent the capsule to lunar orbit and back to Earth in late 2022.

Everything appeared to go well on Artemis 1. However, post-flight analyses revealed that Orion's heat shield wore away more unevenly during its reentry to Earth's atmosphere than engineers had predicted. Temperatures inside Orion remained near room temperature, meaning that astronauts would have remained safe during reentry, but engineers needed to figure out what happened.

NASA officials said that they've now come to some conclusions at the press conference. The uneven ablation was a consequence of Orion's "skip" reentry trajectory, in which the capsule bounced off the atmosphere and then came back in again. This strategy is required to dissipate the tremendous energy associated with high-speed returns from the moon, but it had an unexpected downside on Artemis 1. "While the capsule was dipping in and out of the atmosphere as part of that planned skip entry, heat accumulated inside the heat shield outer layer, leading to gases forming and becoming trapped inside the heat shield," NASA Deputy Administrator Pam Melroy said. "This caused internal pressure to build up and led to cracking and uneven shedding of that outer layer."

Ms. Melroy and others announced during the press conference that a new version doesn't need to be developed for the coming crewed mission, but planners will alter the reentry trajectory to minimize the issues experienced during Artemis 1.

"For Artemis 2, engineers will limit how long Orion spends in the temperature range in which the Artemis 1 heat shield phenomenon occurred by modifying how far Orion can fly between when it enters Earth atmosphere and lands,""NASA officials wrote in an Artemis FAQ. That re-

vised trajectory will also bring the Artemis 2 Orion down in the Pacific Ocean closer to San Diego, meaning it will be easier to get help to the mission's four astronauts if anything goes wrong during reentry.

"The updated timeline for the Artemis 2 flight is informed by technical issues engineers are troubleshooting, including with an Orion battery issue and its environmental control system," NASA officials wrote in the same FAQ.

Artemis 3's timeline is likewise informed by numerous factors — perhaps even more of them, given the increased complexity of the mission. The current plan calls for the involvement of SpaceX's Starship megarocket, whose upper-stage spacecraft will serve as the Artemis 3 lunar lander. Starship is still in development, with just six test flights completed. The last few missions have gone very well.

Barnyard Challengers 4-H Youth with Disabilities Program

Youth will be paired up with mentors to learn about poultry with the opportunity to participate in the Brevard County Fair. Youth don't need their own chicken to participate.
